





Soften yeast in water. Add scalded milk to salt, sugar and shortening. When lukewarm add yeast and 11/2 cups flour. Beat well and let rise until very light. Add egg yolks and remaining flour. Knead lightly and let rise until doubled in bulk. Roll out dough to 1-inch thickness and cut into rounds. Place 2 inches apart on greased baking sheets and let rise. Glaze the surface of each bun with a little egg white diluted with water. With a sharp knife cut a cross on top of each bun. Bake in hot oven (400 degrees F.) about 20 minutes. Just before removing from the oven, brush with sugar and water. Fill the cross with a plain frosting. A cup of raisins may be added to the dough if desired. Makes 21/2 dozen.




