Worst Storm in Michigan History Takes 112 Lives

The worst storm in the history of Michigan which mowed down buildings in an eight-mile swath in North Flint Monday night, claimed the lives of 112 in that city and injured at least 650 persons. The swirling black funnel-shaped twister literally chewed up homes and rained bricks and timbers for miles as it tore along Coldwater Road.

Property damage will run well into the millions of dollars. Some 800 are left homeless and Wednesday morning there were still unidentified and unclaimed children in the Detention Homes where they were being cared for awaiting their parents or relatives calling for them.

The twister lifted only to settle down again striking Milford and Erie, Mich., and on into Ohio, before wearing itself out.

Organized Civil Defense

Those working in the storm stricken areas report that well organized Civil Defense and Red Cross units have done much to alleviate the suffering of victims and to help reunite families.

Most persons in this community have been filled with anxiety while awaiting news of some relative or friend in the Flint or Milford area and communications were cut off for hours.

It gives us an opportunity to think again whether we should keep our Civil Defense organization in Lowell up to standard. It could happen here next time! Also it might be well to learn the condition of those over there and share their disaster by helping them to rebuild their homes and recover from the terrible experience.

Michigan Bell Asks for 3-Cent Rate Increase

The Michigan Bell Telephone Company has asked for a general rate increase throughout its territory which would boost charges for residence service from 1 to 3 cents a day in Lowell.

In its application with the Public Service Commission at Lansing, the company also asked that individual line flat rate business service rates here be raised about 9 cents a day.

The company asked for no increase in long-distance rates.

The message unit allowance on individual line measured business service would be increased from 75 to 80 per month.

Kenneth L. McKee, manager here for Michigan Bell, termed the proposed rate increase "essential if we are to continue to maintain a high-quality service."

He emphasized that "even with the proposed increase, telephone service still would be a bargain."

Pointing up the company's progress in expanding and improving telephone service here, McKee said that Lowell customers can now call nearly 87,000 telephones on a local call basis compared with 860 in 1946.

"This increase in the number of telephones subscribers can reach on a local basis has been due largely to the inauguration of extended-area service—a service of particular benefit to rural users because it provides toll-free access to their trading centers."

"Between 1946 and 1952, Michigan Bell spent \$20,000,000 to expand and improve service in rural areas. As a result of that huge expenditure we have added more than 97,000 rural telephones, reduced the number of lines with more than eight stations from 44 per cent to 7 per cent, reduced the number of rings heard by rural users, converted 12,000 "crank-type" magneto instruments to dial "lift-the-receiver" type operation, inaugurated extended-area service in about 200 exchanges, and are now serving about 76 telephones per 100 rural establishments compared with approximately 60 in 1946. In addition, dial service has been inaugurated in scores of exchanges, including Lowell."

More than 1,000 boys, intent on learning the principles of good, sound government, will converge on Michigan State College Campus, East Lansing, June 18, for an eight-day session of Wolverine Boys' State. The annual event is sponsored by the American Legion, department of Michigan.

Steve Myers, Chad Walter and Jack Alexander are being sponsored by Clark-Ellis Post American Legion of Lowell, and Jack Bergin, also of Lowell is being sponsored by the Alto Post, and will be in attendance throughout the session.

Youths attending will come from all sections of Michigan and will represent every type of community and school.

On Sunday memorial services will be held for past Boys' State citizens who have died in service of their country, by the Legion's honor society, the 40 et 8 Vulture of Detroit, followed by American Legion Zouaves of Jackson, who will exhibit split-second drilling. June 25 the boys will receive diplomas and awards of merit at their commencement exercises, and at noon Saturday they will march to the State Capitol where newly elected Boys' State "Governor" and his staff will "take over" the operation on Michigan's Capitol while sessions are being held by Senate, House and Supreme Court in State Chambers.

Peter Speerstra Starts Building Modern Garage

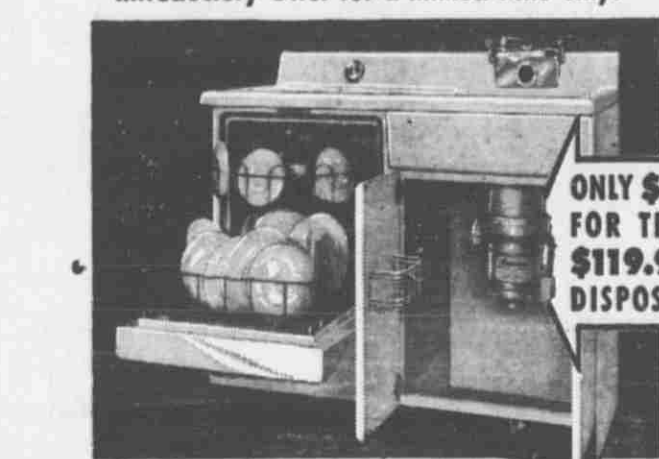

Hormone Spray Helps Tomatoes Ripen Early

Use of a hormone spray may help your tomato plants produce ripe fruit two or three weeks earlier, reports R. Michale, Kent county agricultural agent. He says hormone sprays have been working well in counter-acting the effect of low temperatures at night. Fruit set, he explains, depends on the presence of a hormone or growth controlling chemical. There isn't enough of the chemical in the tomato flower at temperatures below 60 degrees. The chemical is available at most seed stores.

S. H. Wittwer, Michigan State College horticulturist, advises applying the spray to the tomato plants, completing a most pleasant afternoon. We will have our vacation through July and August and the next meeting will be held Sept. 7.

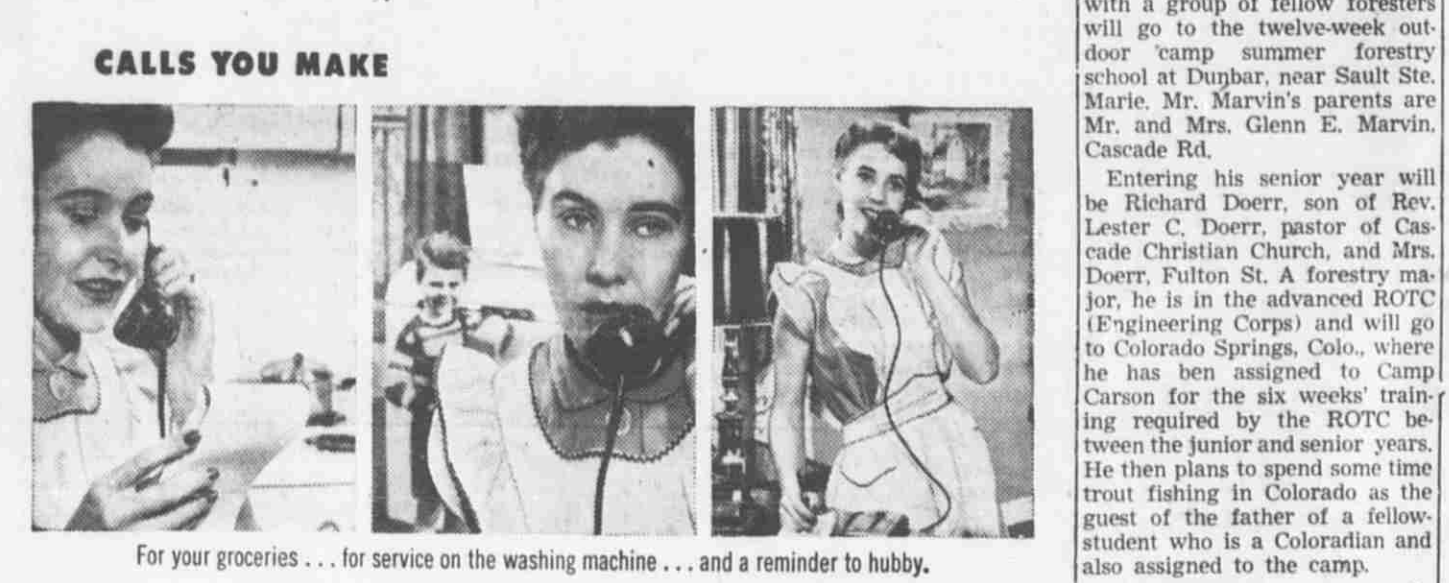

FRESH COCONUT CAKE (Recipe For King Flake Self Rising Flour)

2 1/4 cups sifted King's Flake Self-Rising Flour
1/2 cups sugar
1 cup sweet milk (or use half coconut milk if desired)

1/2 cup soft shortening
1/2 teaspoons flavoring (half almond, half vanilla)
4 egg whites (1/2 cup)

2 egg whites
1/2 cup cold water

Dash of salt
1 teaspoon flavoring
Fresh coconut, grated (or canned coconut)

Place all ingredients except flavoring and coconut in double boiler; mix thoroughly. Cook over boiling water, beating constantly with rotary or electric beater until mixture forms peaks, about 7 minutes. Remove from heat, add flavoring; beat until of spreading consistency. Use as filling and topping for fresh coconut cake. Sprinkle top and sides with grated coconut.
