Will there be another wide-spread legalized kill of "any deer" in the lower peninsula? Will the "any deer" areas be specially designated? Or will we go back to the one buck regulation?

The Conservation Department's game biologists will probably come up with some recommendations soon. Chances are specific areas will be chosen for some kind of an "any deer" season in critical spots where food is short and deer are too plentiful. Such a "season" might be shortened to one day rather than three.

FRESH COCONUT CAKE

(Recipe For King Flake Self Rising Flour)

21/4 cups sifted King's Flake Self-

Rising Flour

1/2 cups sugar

nut milk if desired)

(If coconut milk is used, reduce sugar to 1 1/4 cups) I cup sweet milk (or use half coco-

1/2 cup soft shortening 11/2 teaspoons flavoring (half almond, half vanilla) 4 egg whites (1/2 cup)

Sift together the flour and sugar. Add shortening and half of the milk and beat 2 minutes. Add remaining milk, flavoring and unbeaten egg whites and beat another 2 minutes. Pour into two 8-inch layer cake pans and bake in a moderate oven (350°F.) 30 to 35 minutes. Cool and frost with fresh coconut Frosting.

Fresh Coconut Frosting

11/2 cups sugar 1/4 teaspoon cream of tartar 2 egg whites 1/3 cup cold water

Dash of salt I teaspoon flavoring Fresh coconut, grated (or canned coconut)

Place all ingredients except flavoring and coconut in double boiler; mix thoroughly. Cook over boiling water, beating constantly with rotary or electric beater until mixture forms peaks, about 7 minutes. Remove from heat, add flavoring; beat until of spreading consistency. Use as filling and topping for fresh coconut cake. Sprinkle top and sides with grated coconut.
