Mrs. J. E. Smith Nurse in Flint Writes of Storm

Mrs. J. E. (Lorene) Smith, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. H. L. Kyser of Lowell, writes to her parents from her home in Flint to assure them both she and her husband are safe though the tornado's path was within two miles of them.

Lorene was on duty at Hurley hospital when the storm hit Flint Monday night and she writes the big circular drive at Hurley was filled with ambulances and trucks. Injured were brought in on cots, beds, car seats, broken-off doors, improvised stretchers, any way to get the patients there for medical and surgical attention. Doctors and nurses came from Ann Arbor, Detroit, Bay City, Saginaw, Owosso and other nearby towns and cities, and even civilians who were able, joined in to help wherever their services might be useful.

The blood plasma supply was soon exhausted and a blood bank was set up in the nurses' residence across from the hospital where volunteers kept the raw blood coming. No one had to be asked to donate.

This is an experience no one is soon going to forget.

Lowell Nurses Called

The American Red Cross office in Grand Rapids called Mrs. R. G. Jefferies Friday afternoon asking her to report to Flint for nursing duty and also to call all trained nurses in this locality urging them to report at once in that city where a great emergency exists.

The call came because of the necessity to start operating on the injured children immediately since gangrene was setting in, and to assist other nurses who have been on duty almost constantly since the terrible storm in that area.

Eleven registered nurses have been contacted. Most of us here in Lowell did not know there were that many RN's residing in this territory.

NEW BOAT SAFETY LAWS. Michigan's new boat-safety laws are attracting nationwide attention. Hundreds every one of the many thousands of boats rented to the public must measure up to rigid specifications set up by the Michigan Waterways Commission. Regulations are going to be enforced, and inspectors will be local sheriff departments throughout the State. It's a big job, and one that is bound to result in some violation before successful application. — is widespread.

Specifications Detailed. The capacity of any given boat is determined by a well defined formula in which the length, width and depth of the craft are deciding factors. This passenger capacity is determined, a metal tag affixed to each boat will state how many people may be aboard. A "Certificate of Age" is issued to each boat which will carry a shield emblem on the side marking the waterline. If this marking is submerged the boat is no longer to be used. — Ourlocks must be attached to oars, and oars must be fastened to the boat proper by a length of line or chain—a regulation which will prevent the loss of an oar when such a loss might mean the difference between life and death.

Michigan's fire loss rose to a new high in 1952 when property valued at \$33,600,412.26 was destroyed. There were 163 fire fatalities, including 61 children and one fireman.

The information is contained in the annual fire loss report compiled by the State Police fire marshal division. The report is based on summaries submitted by fire departments throughout Michigan.

State Police Commissioner, Joseph A. Childs, who is also state fire marshal, pointed out that the 1952 monetary loss exceeded the previous high of \$28,700,609.98 in 1951 by \$5,890,802.28. The fire fatality toll, however, was below the previous three years. The all-time high was 297 deaths in 1950.

More fires were reported by local departments than in any other year. There were 61,229 as compared to the previous high of 59,338 in 1948.

Total loss on buildings, including 16,260 dwellings, was \$21,015,556.20. Contents of the buildings represented loss of \$13,424,156.02. Other fires, such as motor' vehicles, boats, machinery not in buildings, aircraft, gas fires, etc., amounted to \$1,160,297.84.

A breakdown of various types of fires listed 4,545 automobiles, 79 dry cleaning plants, 136 bulk storage plants, 245 house trailers, 101 schools and 57 theatres.

There were 4,016 fires caused by smoking and \$228 by other forms of careless use of fire. Additional leading causes were faulty electrical wiring and appliances and misuse of appliances, 4,088; defective chimneys, stacks and stove pipes, 2,143; overheated heating equipment, 1,632; and gas fires, 11,205.

Of 686 incendiary fires, 314 were set by adults and 372 by children.

Made-Over Duds

Look at some of those out-dated clothes in your closet with an eye to making them over for children, or grandchildren, suggests Lela Belle Green, clothing specialist at Michigan State College.

Consider the material in an old garment first, she advises. Is it suitable for the child in question and design? As a general rule, firm, closely-woven fabrics that are light in weight and soft to the touch are best for a child's clothing needs. Gay colors are much better than drab or harsh shades that adults sometimes wear (and shouldn't).

Check on the present condition of the old garment. Sometimes the old article is so worn it would not be practical to remake it for a child.

Miss Green recommends making the new garment along the lines of the old one if possible. A small boy's trousers can easily be cut from a pair of men's trousers, but you will have more of a problem cutting trousers for a woman's gored skirt.

Get a good, standard pattern for your make-overs, recommends Miss Green. And remember, child's patterns should be selected by measurement rather than by age.

Mops Outlining Value Of Michigan Railroads

Lansing—Maps distributed by the Michigan Railroads Association of Michigan and to each of the 83 counties are being distributed by the state's largest cooperative organization, the Michigan League of Railroad Employees.

The maps, which indicate, are the state's third largest industry and taxpayer. They operate in all but three counties, through their taxes go into those counties through the State Primary School Interest Fund.

On a statewide basis the railroads employ 39,021 workers, exceed in this category only by the automobile industry. These workers draw an annual wage of \$126,108,583.00. There are 9,117 miles of railroad in the state and the lines' yearly tax bill reaches the formidable total of \$7,107,855.12 or about \$780 for each mile of track.

The importance to Kent county of the railroad as a transit agency, as an employer and as a highly important payer of wages and taxes is indicated by the figures for this county: Employees, 2281; payroll, \$7,613,302.00; miles of track, 249; and taxes, \$307,438.36 all of which, by constitutional provision, go into Kent County's school system.

NON-FARMERS GO RURAL - FEDERAL CENSUS REPORTS

Rural residents who do not farm are more numerous than they were ten years ago. Paul Miller, Michigan State College extension sociologist, says.

In 1940 there were about 100,000 people living on farms in Michigan whose chief source of income was not farming. But in 1950 this figure jumped by four times—about 400,000 Michigan people living on farms but not earning a majority of their income from agriculture.



WORLD'S BIGGEST FLAG—This is the inspiring sight that will greet visitors to downtown Detroit on Saturday, June 13, when the largest flag in the world is displayed by its owner, The J. L. Hudson Company. Measuring 235 feet long by 104 feet high, it towers seven stories. Each star is 5 1/2 feet high and the stripes are eight feet wide. Fifty-five men will raise the flag, while color guards from the Army, Navy, Marine Corps and WAC stand at attention.

G.O.P. Program Aids Schools
Public school officials who had their school membership rolls in order to be included in the State aid are in for severe punishment under a new law passed by the 1953 Republican-controlled Legislature.

The law provides that anyone found guilty of such practices shall be liable to a \$2500 fine, two years in prison and five-year suspension of his teacher's certificate. The severe penalties were provided because such cheating on school aid effects every other school district in the State by lowering the amount of money available to them.

That new bill was one of several delayed state-aid payments if such situations arise. School boards may provide voluntary machine facilities. The Ferris Institute at Big Rapids was authorized to borrow money for housing and social centers and may charge fees for student activities.

School districts were empowered to refund old bonds to provide for expansion programs. Political subdivisions may provide for library facilities. The Detroit Board of Education must submit referendum questions 60 days before an election. Detroit school system must have an annual audit and may issue its own warrants. Schools may pledge their full credit to borrow in anticipation.

Protect Legumes In Weed Control
You don't want to get "clipped" but when it comes to pasture it's a good method of controlling a number of weeds. Inadequate weed control can clip you. Weeds like yellow rocket and enslave bromo grass are best controlled by preventing seed production. Early cutting before seeds form and putting the crop in the silage helps control these weeds and store feed to use when pasture is short. This is not the best thing for legumes but is better than weeds.

Good pastures can be maintained through proved management practices. Clip new seedlings to prevent weed seed production. Mow fields infested with spring weeds like yellow rocket and enslave the crop. Re-establish pastures with less than half legumes in the stand. Prevent overgrazing and use chemicals as a last resort.

Chemical weed control is difficult because it's hard to find a material to control weeds and not injure legumes. M.C.P. shows promise for yellow rocket control in legumes applying not more than a half pound per acre in early spring but testing is not complete. T.C.A. shows promise in controlling downy brome grass but will temporarily injure legumes like alfalfa.

Rhubarb Lattice Coffee Cake

1 pkg. Yeast, compressed or dry
 1/4 cup water (lukewarm for compressed yeast, warm for dry)
 1/2 cup Milk
 1/4 cup sugar
 1 teaspoon Salt
 2 tablespoons Shortening
 2 1/2 cups sifted Enriched King Flake Flour (about)

1 Egg
 Melted Butter or Margarine
 Cinnamon Sugar

Soften yeast in water. Scald milk. Add sugar, salt and shortening. Cool to lukewarm. Add flour to make a thick batter. Mix well. Add softened yeast and egg. Beat well. Add enough more flour to make a soft dough. Turn out on lightly floured board or pastry cloth and knead until it is smooth and satiny. Place in greased bowl, cover and let rise until it is doubled (about 1 1/2 hours). When light, punch down. Let rest 10 min. Pat 3/4 of dough in bottom of well greased 9-inch round baking pan. Brush with melted butter or margarine and sprinkle with cinnamon sugar. Spread Rhubarb Filling evenly over all. Roll out the remaining dough 1/4 inch thick and cut into strips 1 inch wide. Arrange strips of dough over Rhubarb Filling to make lattice. Let rise until doubled (about 45 minutes). Bake in moderate oven (350°F.) about 35 min.

RHUBARB FILLING

1 1/2 cups Rhubarb, cut into 1-inch pieces
 1/4 cup Sugar
 1 tbs. King Flake Flour
 2 tablespoons Water

Combine sugar and flour in saucepan. Add rhubarb and water and cook until rhubarb is tender (about 10 minutes).
