DHHA Cow Groups High Producing

Cows in Dairy Herd Improvement Association groups in Michigan turned out an average of 3,000 more pounds of milk during 1952 than the average Michigan cow...

The average of 41,856 cows enrolled in the program was 2,999 pounds of milk and 374 pounds of butterfat, Johnson reports.

This compares with an over-stated average of 2,470 pounds of milk per year—about 246 pounds of butterfat, according to Michigan Crop Reporting Service estimates.

High-producing cows return more income over feed costs, even though they cost more, explains Johnson. A 200-pound beef cow costs \$199 to feed but returns \$469 above feed cost.

DHHA locals with cows averaging about 600 pounds were Ingalls, William, Isabella No. 1, Shiloh, and Mrs. J. S. Suro. Cows producing less than 250 pounds of butterfat a year do not qualify.

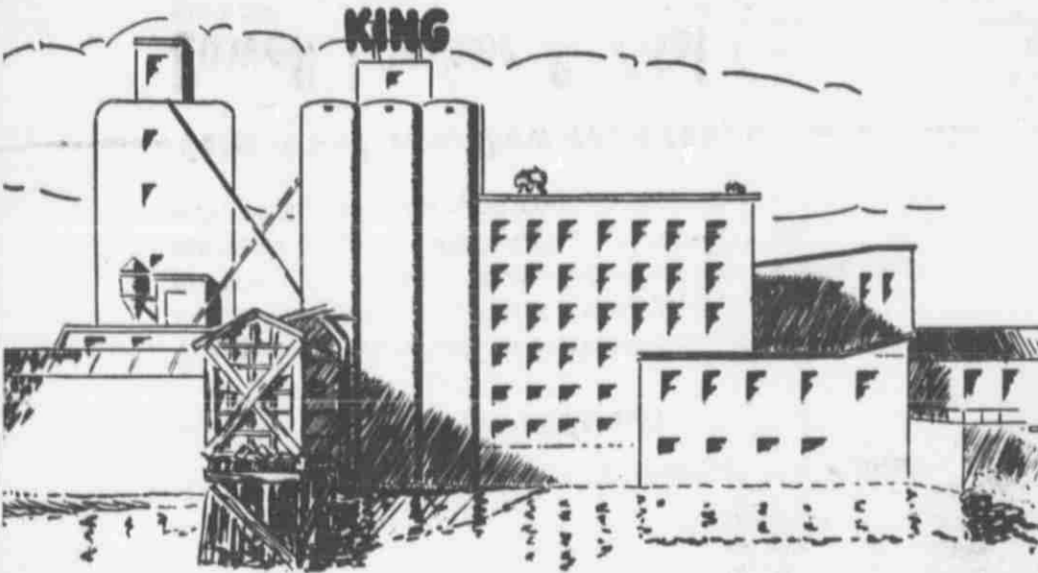
