New Cascade Christian Reformed Church Dedicated



Dedication services for the newly-completed Cascade Christian Reformed church, Cascade Ave., were held in the auditorium of the building Tuesday evening at 8 o'clock, with three clergymen officiating.

Standing on the rostrum banked with flowers, before a gathering made up of members of the congregation and guests which filled the spacious room to capacity, the Rev. Bernard A. Vansomer, pastor of the Ada Christian Reformed church and Counselor of the Cascade group, gave the invocation and scripture reading. He also presided over the presentation of the keys of the building by Gerrit Baker, chairman of the building committee, and their acceptance by Mr. Kleinheksel in behalf of the Consistory.

The building committee, besides Mr. Baker, was Everett Marsman, Alfred Scott, Andrew Vandenberg and William Wiersma.

The dedication service was in charge of the Consistory members are Albert Bishop and Daniel Vandenberg with Mr. Kleinheksel.

Pastor-elect Jacob P. Boonstra conducted the services of dedication, with the congregation giving the responses in the presentation of the church to Christian use. The Rev. Frederick W. VanHouten, pastor of Sherman Street Christian Reformed church, Grand Rapids, gave the address: "How Amiable Are Thy Tabernacles."

Greetings from neighboring Christian Reformed churches were given by the Rev. Vansomer for Ada, by John VanderLaan for Dutton, by Gerrit Veltmaat for East Paris, and by Rev. Morris Faber representing the Classes, Grand Rapids East. Seminary John Hulst, who has conducted services this summer at the church, gave the closing remarks and prayer.

A potluck and meal were played by Miss Ethel Lucas, church organist, who also accompanied Frank Hollemans in two solos, and the congregation singing three hymns and the Doxology which closed the service.

At an open house following the dedication, the assembly was invited to view the building and to partake of refreshments served in the church basement.

The congregation of 35 families organized only in April, 1952 might justifiably have felt a sense of accomplishment in the completion of the building since they had bought the 4 1/2 acres on which it stands, designed, and largely built it themselves. Construction on the handsome 70 by 37 ft. structure of fire-resistant red brick over cement block was begun last December; carpenters, painters, plumbers, furnacemen and electricians of the congregation gave their labor, working evenings and Saturdays. Cost of \$25,000 for building and furnishing is thus very low and indebtedness is held by members except for a small loan.

Main floor of the building has 33 by 70 ft. auditorium with soft green walls, natural birch trim and louvre-type indirect lighting. Sound is controlled by an acoustical tile ceiling with beams that serve to stop echoes and a sound chamber above and behind the rostrum for total purity of the music from the new Baldwin electric organ. Seating is individual theatre-type chairs in birch; floor is oak with rose-belve Wilton needlepoint carpeting.

The entrance hall with coat racks to left has floor of hark-brown asphalt tile, extending to the soundproofed "Cry Room" on the right, where mothers with babies may hear the services over a loud-speaker and see the auditorium through a large Thermopan window. The Consistory room and a second exit and stairway to the basement are beyond the auditorium.

Basement includes lavatories, a room for the oil-burning furnace with air-conditioning unit, a large area for Sunday School and a library, and the big, sunline yellow kitchen with red ceramic countertop, backed by a continuous strip of outlets for electrical appliances. Special feature is the placing of two double sinks in an island in the room's center, to facilitate large-scale dishwashing.

Basement includes storage, laundry and dressing rooms; for the pool, laundry and fruit closet.

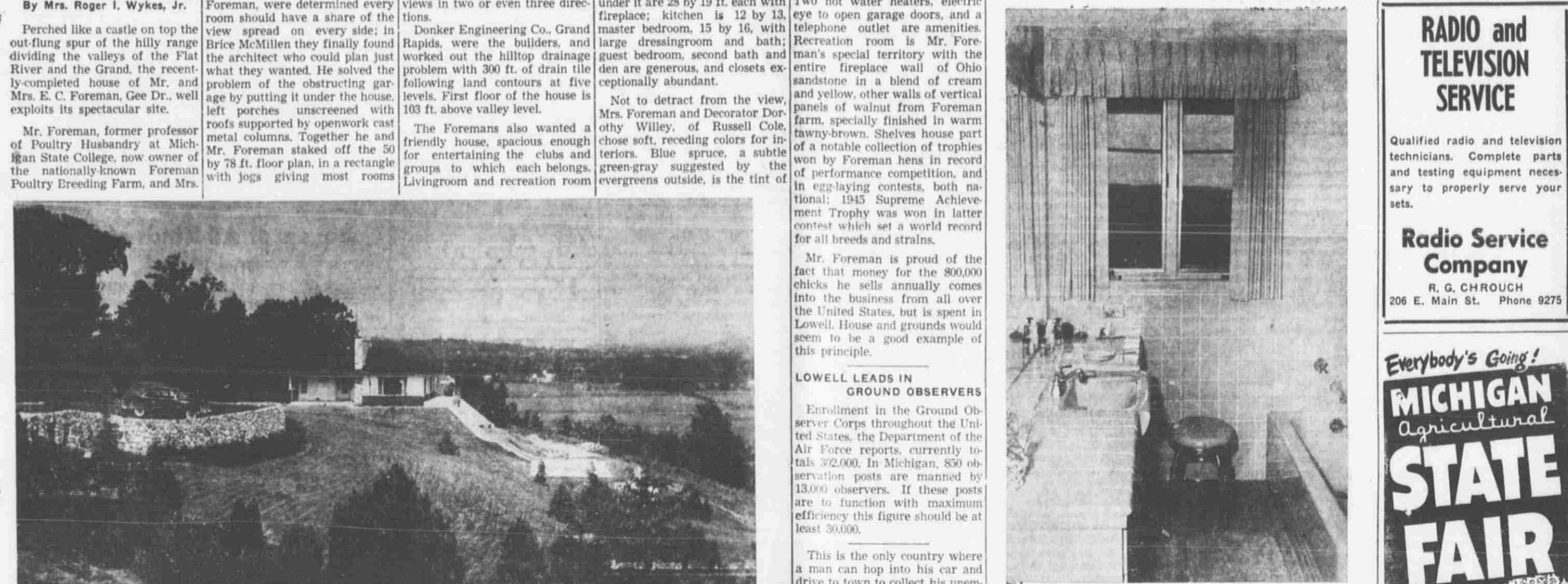

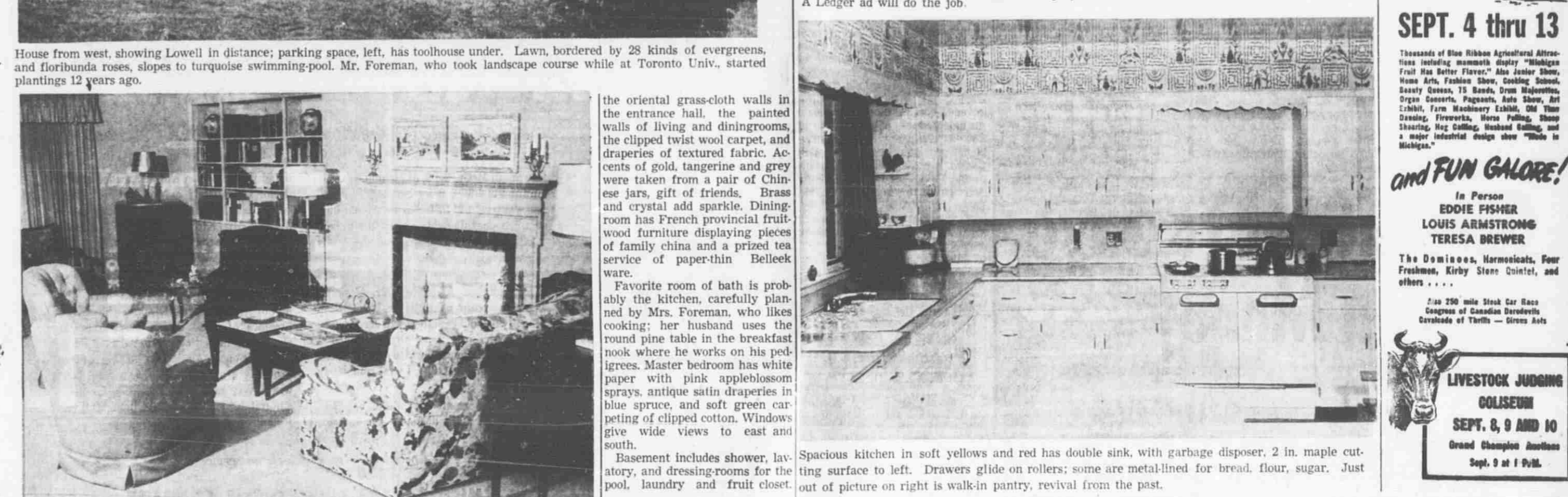
