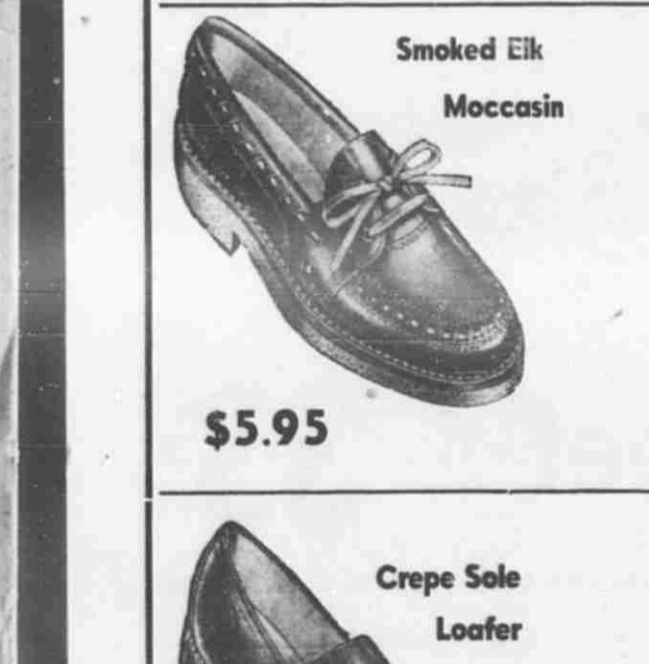

The close association of children in the classroom and on the playground increases their chances of exposure to communicable diseases, and all parents should see to it that their youngsters have booster shots against smallpox, diphtheria and lockjaw before school starts.

No thoughtful parent would allow his child to enter school without this protection, but some may forget that the immunity the child received as an infant may have "worn off" by the time he enters school.

August 3, 1953

A regular meeting of the Council of the Village of Lowell was held in the Council Rooms of the City Hall, Monday evening, August 3, 1953.

The meeting was called to order by the Village President, W. A. Roth, at 8:20 P. M.

The special minutes of July 27, 1953 were read and it was moved by Trustee Oatley, seconded by Trustee Munroe that due to the change in circumstances the action taken at the special meeting of July 27, 1953 be rescinded and the minutes stricken from the records.

It was moved by Trustee Oatley, seconded by Trustee Christiansen that the engineering, supervision and of pipe and fittings be furnished by the Village for the Water Main in Spring Street from Vergennes to Armit Street.

Roll call: Munroe yes; Foster yes; Elzinga yes; Christiansen yes; Oatley yes; Yea 5, Nays 0, Carried.

The Clerk reported receiving monies in the following amounts: General Fund: \$105.00; Intangible Tax: \$3,264.59; Library Rent—Aug. & Sept. (Mary Horn): \$30.00; Road Fund: Interest on U. S. Gov. Bonds: \$62.50.

Trustee Rutherford now present.

The President called on Fire Chief Dave Clark, who informed the Council that there were several business places in the Village that were accumulating trash to such an extent that it was becoming a fire hazard. Mr. Clark asked the Council to take action on the violators on fire regulations who were creating fire hazards. This was referred to the Fire Committee for study.

Dr. Hill, Health Commissioner, asked the Council to enforce the ordinance on dogs within the Village and also to have all dogs vaccinated for rabies. No action was taken but Dr. Hill was informed that the ordinance would be studied for further regulations.

Dr. Hill also asked to have a more rigid health inspection of food establishments and food concessions within the Village. Dr.

Michigan Ranks Third In Fur Animal Harvest

Michigan ranked third nationally in 1953 in the total number of fur-bearing animals taken by trappers and hunters, the conservation department notes.

According to a U. S. Fish and Wildlife bulletin, Louisiana topped all the states with a take of 1.3 million pelts. Minnesota was second with 1.25 million and Michigan third with 929,000.
