Hundreds of Citizens Attend Cascade's VJ-Day Flag Dedication

Summoned by the fire siren Wednesday evening, Sept. 2 the expectant people of Cascade gathered to watch the first parade the community could remember, inaugurating the dedication of the flag of the MacDonald-Osmer Post, American Legion. While deputy sheriffs kept traffic on US16 in order, the procession formed at the Legion clubhouse, and at dusk, with the explosion of a torpedo it started.

Led by a Sheriff's Department car, the parade went east on Orange St., south on Hurley, and west on Thornapple to US16, where it turned south again to cross the bridge.

The Color Guard from Alto Post came next, followed by cars carrying members of the MacDonald and Osmer families, for whose sons, Edward MacDonald and Curtis Osmer, the post is named. Valley City drum and bugle corps were trim in gold jackets and blue trousers with brass helmets and had two majorettes. Comstock Park Post 47's uniforms were red and white. Cascade fire truck No. 1 with full crew was preceded and followed by delegations from Edward Leonard Post, 830 Post and the Alto Post, and the Rockford drill team. The locomotive and box car of the 40 and 8 brought up the rear, its occupants firing Roman candles and tossing firecrackers.

Large Crowd Attentive

An attentive crowd of several hundred surrounded the bunting-draped and floodlighted platform beside the war memorial with its wreath placed by the Cascade Post, to hear Commander James C. Dunne as he stepped to the microphone and called on Chaplain John Zoodsma for a prayer. Commander Dunne then made a brief but eloquent speech.

"We have come together on this memorial VJ Day to dedicate this flag," he said "in the name of those who offered their lives for their country, and to dedicate this Post to the faithful service of the country for which they died."

Chaplain Zoodsma gave the benediction prayer.

Mr. and Mrs. Charles S. MacDonald and Mr. and Mrs. Rye Osmer and their daughter, Phyllis, were introduced and seated on the platform. Commander Dunne introduced the speaker, Atty. Leon B. Buer, Senior vice-commander of the Michigan Department of V. F. W., who called for individual responsibility in seeing that the Korean war should end in a good and lasting peace. He asked community backing for the new post, which has already begun to serve the community, and said this was the first official observance of VJ Day he had heard of anywhere.

The concluding ceremony was impressive and moving, when, as the flag was lowered, the notes of Taps on the bugle at the flagpole were echoed by a second bugle, the music floating down from a distant hilltop.

Open house was held at the clubhouse for everyone afterward, where Mrs. Dunne, Mrs. Wayne Fellows, Mrs. A. E. Rodgers and Mrs. Blaine, served refreshments to about 600 people. The drum and bugle corps gave an impromptu concert out of doors.

Legion Flag at Half Mast

The flag on the Legion flagpost at the Bridge was flown at half staff for General Jonathan Wainwright, until his funeral, Tuesday noon.

Snow Community Drive-In Services Popular All Summer to Close Sunday

Lowell community has been privileged in having Drive-In service's this past summer sponsored by the young people of Snow Methodist Church. These services have been well attended and special music has been brought in to thrill many who have come out and sat in their cars in the beautiful setting overlooking Grand River Valley.

This Sunday night will complete the series of meetings with their greatest of all service. The Methodist Men of the Church are to be sponsors, and they are bringing special music as usual, and for an added feature will show the colored sound motion picture "GOD is My Landlord." This picture covers a period of more than 6 years in which Perry Hayden, "the Quaker Miller" of Tecumseh, Mich., who planted a cubic inch of wheat in 1940 which grew in the 6 years to cover 2,666 acres of land, producing a harvest of 72,150 bushels of wheat worth \$150,000. The late Henry Ford after hearing about this became very much interested in the project.

Sow 360 Kernels of Wheat

The inspiration for Mr. Hayden's experiment was the text of a sermon John 12:24 which spoke of wheat. It attracted Mr. Hayden, head of a milling firm in Tecumseh. He decided to take God at His word, see what would happen by planting, harvesting and tithing wheat. That very week Hayden planted those 360 kernels, one cubic inch of wheat, in a tiny plot of land 4 by 8 ft; he determined to pay a tithe of the crop, and plant the remaining nine-tenths, repeating this for 6 years as God commands in Lev. 25:3.

The 1941 harvest was one quart; the 1942 crop was 70 pounds; the 1943 harvest 16 bushels; 1944 harvest, 370 bushels; the 5th harvest in 1945 amounted to 5,555 bushels, all grown on land furnished by Henry Ford who said this will go around the world.

The 6th and final harvest in 1946 required 2,666 acres of land supplied by Christian farmers of 30 denominations, Protestant and Catholic, and multiplied to 72,150 bushels of "Dynamic Kernels" of wheat. Robert Ripley stated that if the project were continued until 1950, it would require all the land in the United States and in 1953 would cover the globe.

Henry Ford brought much of his antique farming machinery from Detroit and he, himself, ran many of the steam and hand tools.

The public is invited to come and see this wonderful picture which is shown free to all. Just follow the river road west from Lowell South side to Snow Ave., then up the hill, all paved roads.

Service starts at 7:15 p. m. Sunday, Sept. 13. Come early and enjoy the chimes that come over the new public address system, which was installed this past summer. The service is in charge of Mr. Sid Baarda, pastor of the Snow Methodist Church.

Cribbing Corn Half As Wet As For Silo

Silage corn and cribbing corn are only a few hot days apart, but the moisture difference is an important one, stresses E. G. Rossman, corn researcher in the Michigan State College farm crops department.

For the best quality corn silage corn should be cut when the grain is in the hard dough stage—when most of the kernels have started to dent. At this stage, Rossman explains, the ears will contain 45 to 50 per cent moisture and the fodder will have 75 to 80 per cent moisture.

It Isn't True TB Is Not Inherited

"TB runs in his family." When you hear anyone make that statement, speak right up and say, "It isn't true."

Tuberculosis is not inherited. It is a disease caused by a germ which is passed on by people who have the disease to those about them, according to Leo T. Moleski, M. D., a director of the Kent County Tuberculosis Society.

You may have known of families where TB seemed to be inherited, passed down through the generations like the family silver. Grandfather had it, and his sons, and his sons' sons. But it was not because of anything in the family blood.

Tuberculosis seems to run in families because, naturally, family members come in closest contact with a TB patient. If anyone is going to catch the germs he coughs up, they are the most likely victims.
