The basic allotment to Michigan is enough to treat approxi-

The Department also points out that globulin will not prevent polio, but can, if administered under favorable circumstances, prevent the development of paralysis in those who get the di-

supply in the most effective way the Department has set up priori ties. The bulk of the available globulin will be distributed to those who run the greatest risk of being infected—the members of a household where a case of polio is diagnosed. Inoculations will be limited to household members who are 30 years of age and under and to pregnant women of

persons outside the household who have been in close contact with the polio case will receive injections, and special allotments of globulin may be obtained from the national supply for mass inouclation in areas with an unusually high number of cases.
