





"Doc" Says . . .

Treat the newly housed pullets gently-Don't scare them. Enter the house quietly. If you knock before opening the door they will know you are coming. Newly housed birds are nervous and are easily frightened. Keep the youngsters, strangers, dogs and cats out of the hen house.



Storage holdings of shell eggs on June 30th were the lowest on record for that date. Stocks of frozen eggs on the same date were seven million pounds below the figure for one year ago. Then, to make the picture more favorable, the egg-feed price ratio is the most favorable since 1949.

The hog does not lick block salt as do cattle and sheep and therefore loose salt should be used. One half per cent (1/2 lb. salt in 100 lbs. feed) in the complete feed mixture will satisfy hog's salt requirements. Salt can be fed free-choice if the practice is started when pigs are young, but it may not be safe practice after pigs have been salt starved for a long time.


