It remained for the State of New York to set up a conclusive experiment on this problem. They chose a 74,000 acre tract mostly surrounded by water, and with land connections closely guarded by trappers. Most important is this fact: An adjoining area of 71,000 acres of similar type land was set up for checking, and here no fox trapping was done at all. Both areas were in the best pheasant range in the State.

Foxes Counted

New York thereupon decided that a fox control program to improve pheasant hunting would not be wise even if the cost were low—and as Michigan has proven, the cost is anything but low, hitting close to \$100,000 annually. Nevertheless Michigan continues its bounty system on these animals, mainly because of public pressure. Perhaps a better-informed public may one day see fit to put that \$100,000 to far better use to improve our hunting. One of several complaints against the red fox in Michigan—complaints that have helped maintain a widely disputed bounty system—is the charge that pheasants are an important item in the fox diet.

Consistent analysis of the stomach contents of foxes taken in for bounty has failed to prove this charge—and Michigan biologists have published reports along this line from time.

Were carefully checked in and out, and, according to the New York Conservation Department report, "There was no noticeable difference in hunting success on the area where the foxes were trapped, and the area where they were left unmolested." It was obvious that factors other than the fox were responsible for variations in the pheasant population.
