Other farm work is not pressing now, he explains, and some improvement-cuttings can be made in the woodlot. It's a good time to get out some logs to be buzzed up for wood-to keep the maple sugar boilers fired up, but not this coming season-in 1955. Wood must be cut at least six months ahead of time to be dry enough to use, Robbins explains. It's a practical fuel and cutting it out will improve the stand.


