Improvements directly affectng Lowell community include a wo-mile stretch on Lincoln Lake Av. from Three Mile Rd, to Five Mile Rd.; one and three-quarters miles on 48th St. from Thornapple River Dr. east to the present blacktop; one mile on Honey Creek Ave, from Conservation Dr. south to the present blackon, and one mile on Vergennes St. from Parnell Ave to Cumber and Ave.


