Primary School Fund Receives Large Sum From Michigan Bell

The Michigan Bell Telephone Company again last year was the largest single contributor to the state Primary School Fund with a payment totaling \$7,086,904.

According to figures released today by Kenneth L. McKee, manager here for Michigan Bell, \$2,796 of the total was allocated to the public school system of Lowell.

Schools throughout Kent County, including the city of Lowell, received a total of \$309,524 from the company's tax payment.

McKee said the payments were based on a school census of 627 in Lowell and 69,400 in Kent County as compiled by the State Department of Public Instruction.

The company's tax payment last year amounted to \$4.46 for each of the 1,589,923 youngsters in the state between the ages of 5 and 19 who are on the census rolls.

Michigan Bell, in common with railroads, Pullman, railway express, telegraph, and other telephone companies, pays a state property tax earmarked for the Primary Fund in lieu of other property taxes.

\$3,039.99 for Lowell Of Motor Vehicle Fund For Fourth Quarter '53

Net receipts of the State Motor Vehicle Highway Fund for the Fourth Quarter of the calendar year 1953 amounted to \$27,084,596.71, and this money is now being distributed to the State Highway Department, the Counties, and the Cities and Incorporated Villages of the State. Net receipts of the Motor Vehicle Highway Fund for the Fourth Quarter of 1952 were \$23,831,962.81.

Kent County's share is \$382,588.58. Ionia county's share is \$82,195.38. Lowell will receive \$3,039.99.
