- I Cake Yeast 1/4 c. Lukewarm Water 1 t. Sugar 11/2 t. Salt
- 4 T. Shortening 4 T. Sugar 2 c. Scalded Milk 6 c. Sifted KING FLAKE FLOUR, Enriched

Add yeast to lukewarm water and 1 t. sugar and let stand 5 min. When mixture of salt, shortening, remaining sugar and milk has cooled to lukewarm, add softened yeast and 3 cups flour. Beat well. Use rest of flour to make soft dough. Knead until smooth and elastic. Let rise in greased bowl until doubled in bulk and very light. Divide into 2 balls and let rest 10 minutes. Shape into rolls. After dough is again doubled. Bake rolls 15 to 20 minutes at 425° F.




