Here are the accepted rules for chick brooding and raising. You, no doubt, have read them before, but a review of them will help you to follow the correct steps with your flock. We suggest that you save this chart and check each step as the task is com-

To Prepare For Chicks:

Buy high grade chicks from well-bred, blood-tested stock. Order early.

Clean and disinfect all equipment, scrub brooder house with hot lye water.

Have one square foot or more of floor space for each two chicks. Under the hover allow a minimum of 7 sq. in. of brooder space for each chick.

Provide good absorbent litter-cover with newspapers first few days.

Place guard around brooder to keep the chicks near heat, Cardboard will do, Have one inch of feeder space and one half inch of waterer space per chick.

Operate brooder for several days to be certain it is properly regulated.

Provide ventilation without drafts. Have brooder warm .feeders and waterers full, and all preparations completed when chicks arrive

Do not chill chicks-take home at once and place under hover.

Temperature at outer edge of hover should be 95 to 100 degrees.

Feed immediately, Have feeders full-first few days provide additional feed in plates or on cardboard strips.

Arrange feeders like spokes of wheels extending out from the brooder. Provide lukewarm water first few days. Clean and refill waterers daily.

Stir litter often to keep it dry. Second Week:

Lower brooder temperature about 5 de-

Supply chick size grit either on top of mash or in separate hoppers.

Disinfect feeders and waterers each week. Dispose of dead chicks immediately and segregate sick ones.

Remove guard fence, Round off corners of house with cardboard, tin or wire to prevent corner crowding. Ventilate without drafts. Watch for carbon

monoxide gas if brooder is not electric. Keep feeders and waterers full.

Third to Sixth Week:

Continue to lower temperatures about 5 degrees a week.

Increase feeder space to about two inches per chick. Provide more waterers. Avoid overcrowding, Chicks need more space at they grow larger.

Provide roosts at 4 weeks if they are to be used later for hens. They are not necessary Replace or add to litter if it becomes too

damp or dirty. Stir frequently. Let chicks range on clean ground or runways in good weather. Ground should not have been used by poultry or livestock for one year. Keep feeders and waterers full and dis-

infect weekly. Seventh Week to Maturity:

Separate cockerals from pullets at about

Provide large feeders and waterers when needed. When on range move them frequently to avoid contamination of ground.

Let chicks range on fresh, clean soil, sown with forage. Provide range shelters.

Continue to feed grit, Change size as need-
