Chief of Police Frank L. Stephens was host last Thursday evening to a group of some one-hundred members and guests of the Western Michigan Law Enforcement Association, at a dinner at the Masonic Temple.

An after-dinner program was presided over by Attorney George R. Cook, toastmaster, who introduced Stuart Hoffius, Kent County Prosecutor, as speaker of the evening. Hoffius told his listeners that "Enormous strides have been made in criminal investigation during the last 25 years, especially the investigative procedures as set up by the Federal Bureau of Investigation and the state criminal laboratories," and he urged the group representing city, county, state and federal law enforcement officers to take advantage of these facilities, which are available to them.

Supt. of Lowell schools, Walter W. Gumsier, in his remarks, suggested that closer co-ordination between the schools and the law enforcement officers might lead to better records and less delinquency in the younger set.

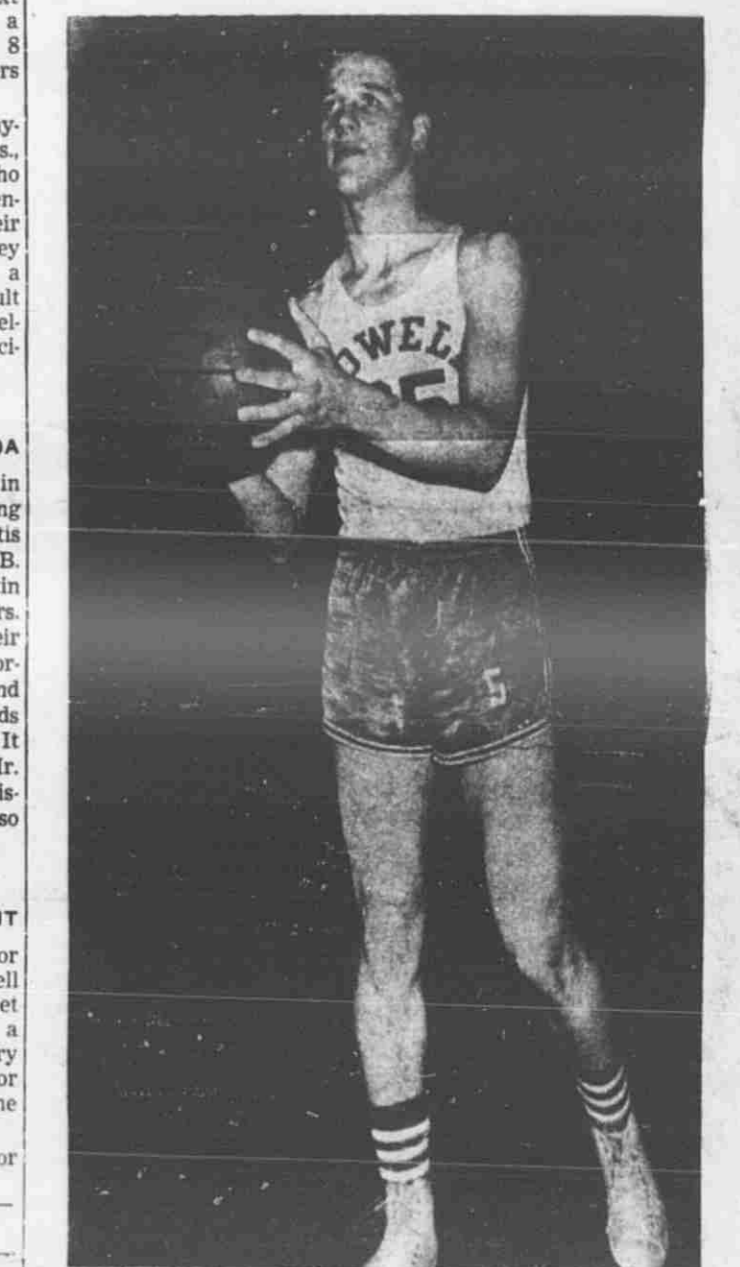
Other guests of the Association were Wesley A. Roth, village president, and Wendell A. Miles, U. S. District Attorney.

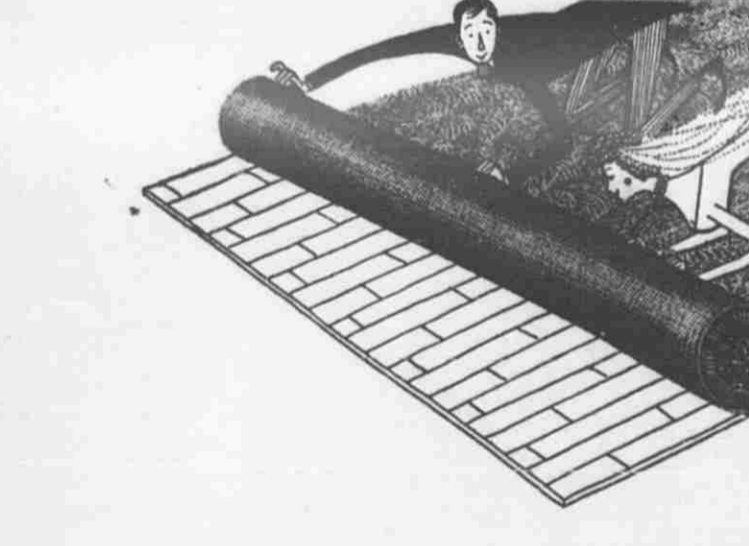

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LETTER TO THE EDITOR

Grand Rapids City Attorney Writes in Favor of Jail Proposal

In your March 18 issue of the Lowell Ledger there appears an editorial entitled "We Need a New Jail, Don't We?"

The present Kent County jail was built in 1871. As early as 1913 it was pronounced totally unfit and grossly inadequate.

The State of Michigan has stated the present jail must be closed at once if the voters decide to accept the new plan beyond the April 5th election.

It is closed by the State Board of Corrections, the County faces the unthinkably task of "farming out" prisoners to other County prisons from 40 to 150 miles away.

It is true that there is a chapel in the proposed jail structure. If a chapel, where men convicted of crime can go to worship their God, is a "frill" then on that point only must the Board of Supervisors be guilty of providing "frills" in the new jail.

We do, however, quote a part of a letter received from a Mr. G. Gillam, a Ledger reader, who writes:

"Did God send a hailstorm to warn of a greater judgment soon coming?"
