Ellison, who arrived on the peninsula last April, had been serving as a mechanic with the 45th Infantry Division, which is being returned to the U. S. He will finish his Korean tour of duty with the 7th Division, now training to maintain combat efficiency. The sergeant entered the Army in July, 1952, and completed basic training at Fort Leonard Wood, Mo.

## W. V. Burras Home Leveled Tuesday In \$15,000 Blaze

The home of Mr. and Mrs. Wilbur V. Burras on 36th st., 6 miles south and west of Lowell, was completely destroyed by fire Tuesday forenoon at an estimated loss of well over \$15,000.

The house was a modern two-story structure with glassed-in porches and an attached garage. All was lost including all furnishings and a new automobile in the garage. Mr. Burras discovered the house ablaze when he came out of his barn. A neighbor living in the Seymour Hesche tenant house, saw the smoke and called fire departments at Lowell, Ada and Cascade who responded promptly but the fire had gained such headway it was impossible to save either the house or contents.

Lowell Fire Chief Dave Clark believes the fire started around the furnace.

Mr. and Mrs. Burras are staying with their daughter, Mrs. Florence McFall at the present time and are undecided as to whether they will rebuild.

## Mother, Daughter Narrowly Escape As Fierce Windstorm Uproots Tree

Paul Murray, his father, Claude Murray, and a neighbor are seen viewing the destruction caused by windstorm Thursday afternoon. The tree which smashed through the roof was later cut away and tarpaulin put over the building to help keep out the storm.

Mrs. Paul Murray and 8-year-old daughter, Alice, narrowly escaped serious injury Thursday afternoon when a high wind uprooted a tree and it went crashing through their home on Pleasant St., literally cutting the small house in two. Mrs. Murray had just returned from fastening the front door which was slamming against the side of the house when the crash came wrecking the door. Mr. Murray was not at home at the time. The tree, a 100-foot poplar, had been dead for several years.

The Murrays spent the night with their uncle and aunt, Mr. and Mrs. James Ward, while tarpaulin was brought and spread over the roof, the rooms were not habitable. Later when some of the debris was cleared away and some minor repairs were made they were able to return to the house to sleep. They also spent some time with Mr. Murray's father, Claude Murray on East Main St.

There was insurance covering the damage and it is expected the building will undergo major repairs immediately. Other damages are reported throughout the area, all of less serious nature. Insurance companies received a large number of claims.

Superintendent W. W. Gumsier this week announces the honor students of the Class of 1954 of Lowell High School. Bruce Clemenz with a scholastic average of 89 of a possible 100, is valedictorian, and Shirley Colby is salutatorian with 86. There are 77 in this class. Bruce Clemenz who has won the honor of valedictorian, is the son of Wesley and Esther Clemenz, was born in Lowell and received all of his education in this school. Bruce is a member of the H-Y of Lowell High School, is a two-letterman in both baseball and basketball; was a member of the Cross Country team for two years; was treasurer of the sophomore class; Student Council representative in the junior class; member of the Senior play cast, playing the leading male role, as the play is presented April 1 and 2; was Junior Rotarian last year and attended Boys' State in 1952.

When Bruce graduates he plans to continue his education at the University of Michigan in the engineering department but has not yet chosen his specific course.

Shirley Colby, salutatorian of the Class of 1954, is the daughter of Charles and Thelma Colby, received her early education in Alto schools, coming to Lowell in the 9th and 10th grades.

Shirley was president of the Horizon Club in the 9th and 10th grade, was representative of this club to the Grand Rapids City Board of Horizon Clubs and was chosen to represent that board to the Horizon Club meeting in Chicago. She was a member of the Girls Club, treasurer in her junior year, Editor-in-Chief of the Annual Staff, and is make-up chairman for the senior play this spring.

After her graduation Shirley plans to attend Junior College in Grand Rapids for a business course.

## Kent Will Vote On Jail Monday

Kent County voters will be asked to go to the polls on Monday, April 5th, to vote on the proposition of increasing taxes one mill for three years to build a new county jail. Property owners may vote on the proposition to authorize taxes and all registered citizens can vote on the building of the jail and raising the millage.

This will be the third time Kent county voters have been asked to raise taxes to build a jail, the first two votes turned down this increase of taxes. It was rejected for the first time in 1925 and the second vote was only a year and a half ago, in November of 1952.

The present jail was built in 1871 and was first pronounced totally unfit and inadequate in 1913. It was condemned by the Board of Corrections in 1924. The same board has been threatening to condemn the jail every year since but by remodeling work the building has been used. The jail is overcrowded and in poor shape to take care of the 100 or more prisoners that are regularly housed in the jail.

The vote to raise one mill a year for three years would bring in about 1.8 million dollars, the proposed jail which would be equipped with a modern laundry to do washing for other county facilities and a garage to do maintenance work on county cars would cost 1.5 million dollars. The building would contain 65,000 square feet of floor space and would house 238 inmates.

E. C. Foreman will be toastmaster for the occasion introducing the speaker and the various features on the program.

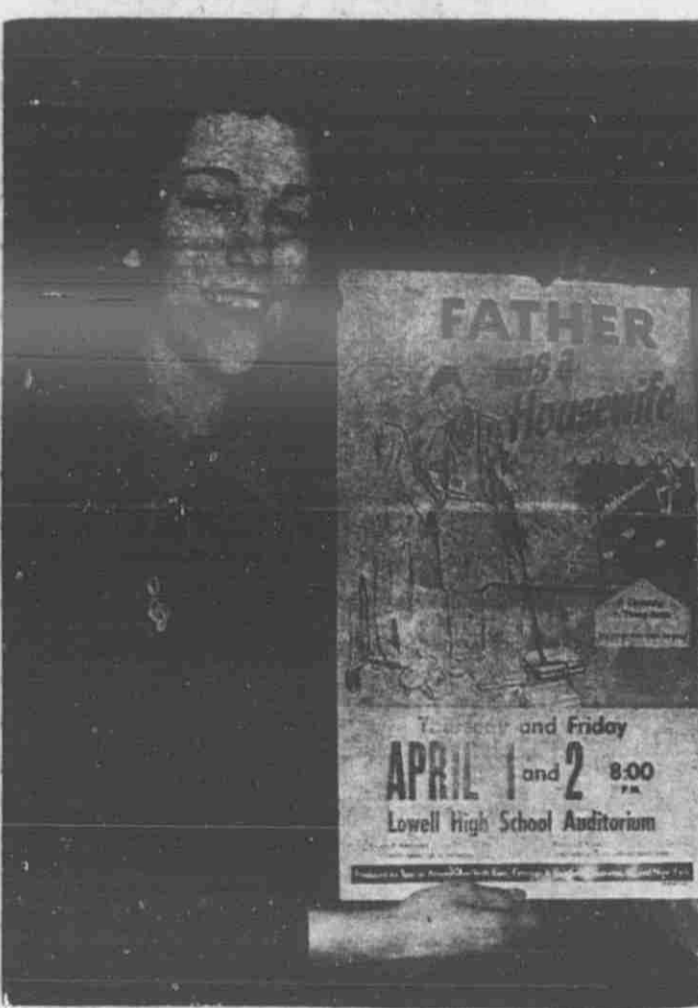

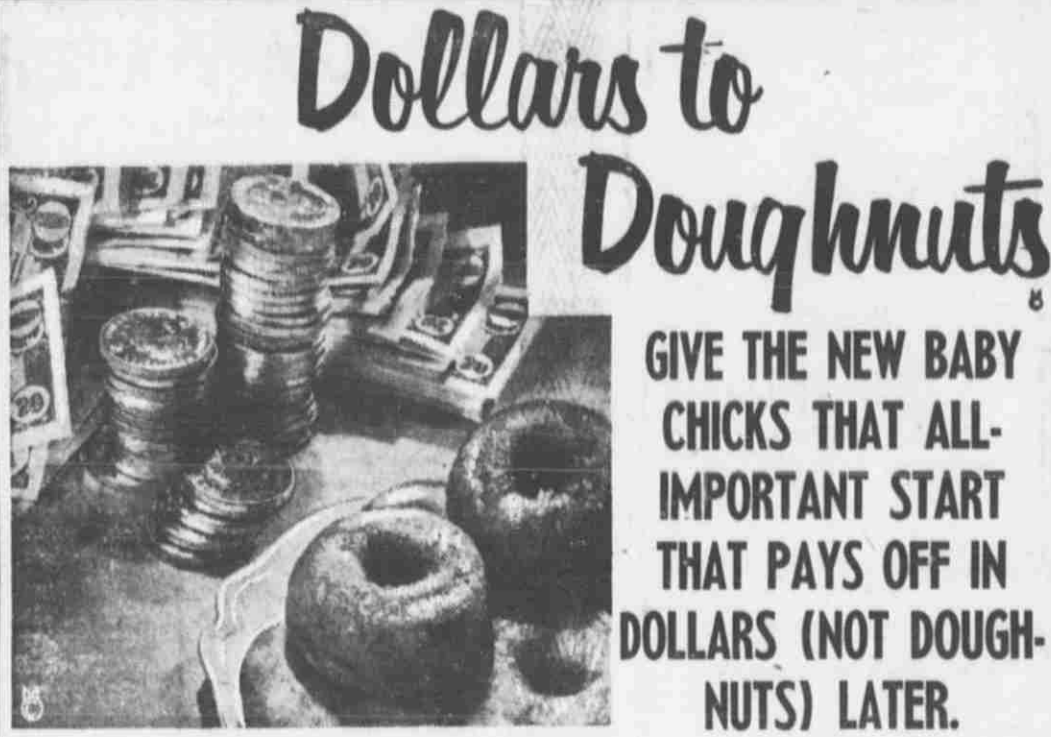
