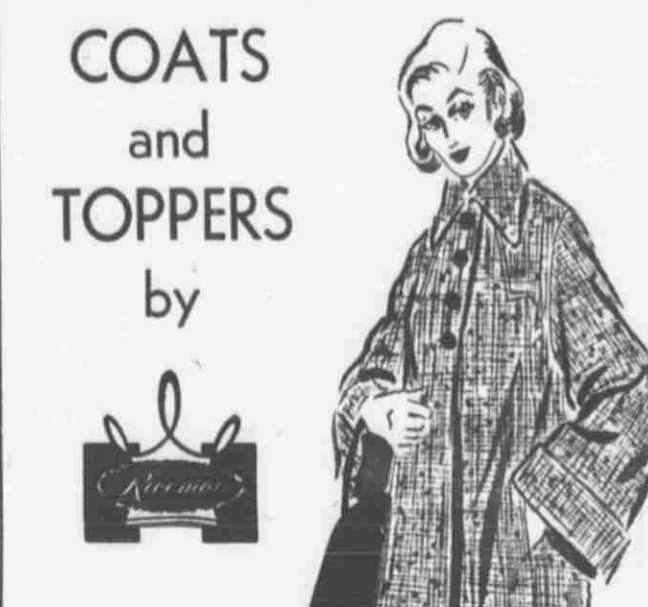

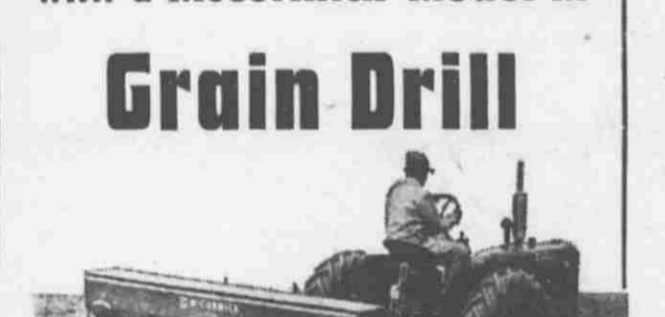

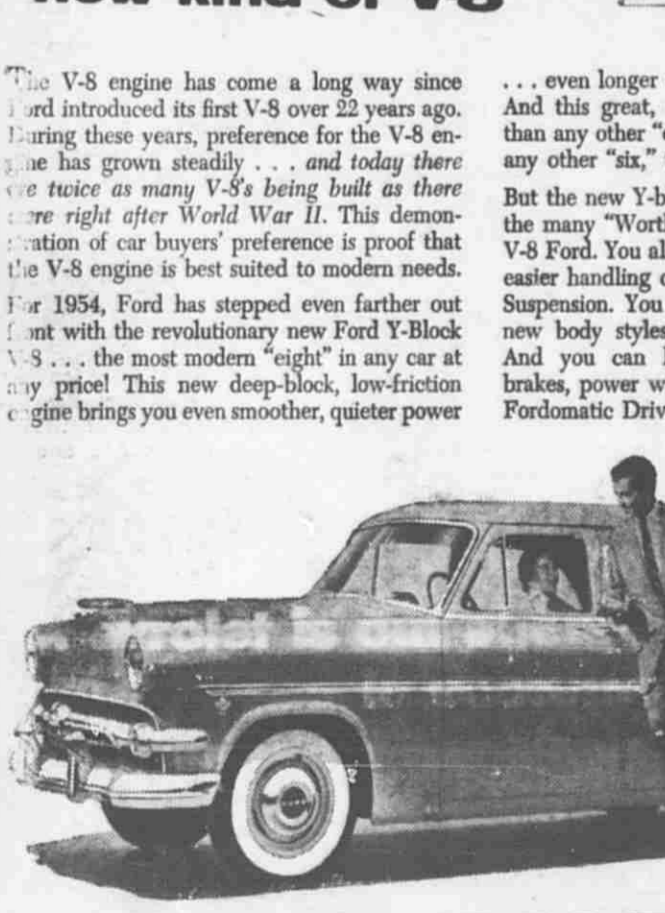

| 1 1/2 cups Sugar | 2 Eggs |
| | 1/2 teaspoon Vanilla |

Place shortening in mixing bowl. Add self-rising flour and sugar which have been sifted together. Add 3/4 cup sweet milk and the flavoring. Beat 2 minutes. Add the eggs and remaining milk and beat 2 minutes more. Pour into three eight-inch cake pans and bake in a moderate oven (350 deg. F.) 20 minutes. Yield: three eight inch layers.


