Senior Hi Band Wins Second in State Festival

Lowell's Senior High school band won a second division rating at the State Festival sponsored by the Michigan School Band and Orchestra Association, held at East Lansing last Saturday.

The bands are rated in the following manner: 1st division, "best conceivable performance"; 2nd, "a distinctive performance"; 3rd, an "average performance"; 4th, an "inadequate performance"; and 5th, "much room for improvement."

From this district which includes Ottawa, Kent, Ionia, Montcalm, the southern part of Newagen, and Muskegon counties, Grand Haven and North Muskegon were the only class B schools to receive a first division rating. Lowell was the only one in 2nd division, and Coopersville and Fremont were placed in third division. Second division winners receive plaques and medals.

The cheering section for the Lowell band consisted of Mrs. Orval Jessup and Tom Morse, last year's drum major of the band.

Grand Valley Festival

The Lowell High school band will participate in the Grand Valley Band Festival to be held at Lee High school next Thursday, May 6. This festival is not a rated festival. Each band plays two numbers and then a select band of one hundred musicians plays a group of numbers which they have rehearsed together during the afternoon. The guest director is William Stewart, director of instrumental music at Muskegon High school. Fifteen members of the Lowell band are in the select band.

It is hoped a goodly number of Lowell people will attend this festival to hear this fine music by the various bands. Tickets are twenty-five cents for students and thirty-five for adults.

This week Wednesday, the Lowell High band played in the 4-H Panorama parade in Grand Rapids.

Good Facilities Moves '53 Wheat Out of Storage

Wheat has been leaving Lowell the past few days at the rate of one or two carloads a day, destination Philadelphia, the government having called in the 1953 crop held under the loan program. The good handling facilities available at King Milling Co. has made a quick job of this wheat shipping procedure. Farmers experience no waiting.

On May 1st those growers who are holding wheat in storage on the purchase agreement program will begin shipping their crop of 1953 wheat.

Agriculture Secretary Benson told senators last week that handling this year's crop surplus will be the "biggest storage job this or any other country ever undertook."

Price Propping Program Benson blamed the huge pile-up on the present system of rigid high price supports, which the Administration seeks to replace with a flexible price-propping program.



State Highway Project Connecting M66 - US131 To Be Finished July 31

Work has started on two state trunkline highway construction projects and three others have resumed. Highway Commissioner Charles M. Ziegler announced.

The state trunkline projects started are: 5.9 miles of bituminous concrete surfacing on M-91 and M-44 in the city of Belding in Ionia county, and in Grattan township in Kent county. General Paving Construction Company, Grand Rapids, is the contractor for this project at the contract price of \$173,283.20. M-44 is an important connecting trunkline between M-66 and US-131. The completion date for this project is July 31, 1954.

Most Farm Fires Are 'Inside Jobs'

How do most of Michigan's farm fires get started? Statistics prove that they are "inside jobs," six out of eight times, says David G. Steinkne, extension farm safety specialist at Michigan State College. He and the Michigan Rural Safety Council are promoting a cleanup campaign this month to cut down on fires and accidents on farms and in homes.

When fires start on the outside of a building, he points out, they are usually due to lack of lightning rod protection and roofs of inflammable material. But for the most part, he suggests, these fires can be a big job of prevention. Above all else, practice good housekeeping. Disorder and dirt near heating plants, incubators and brooders will cause a rapid spread of fires even if they are not the cause.



New Type Aerosol Bomb May Blast Strep Germs

Another type of bomb may play a significant role in exploding difficult health problems. The small, compact "bug bomb" which fills the breezeway with a fog of DDT may be used to blast strep germs right out of the respiratory system.

Research now under way at the University of Michigan's College of Pharmacy on aerosol bombs and their adaptability to internal medicines offers possibilities for more effective approaches to old and difficult ailments.

Albert M. Mattocks, professor of pharmacy, reports that "the principle of the aerosol bomb may be applied to nose sprays, adrenalin, even antibiotics." He says, however, that research in this area is very much in its infancy, and that although the principle of the fine mist is being tried in hospitals, no efficient way has been devised as yet to "package" medicines in a hand spray resembling the currently popular aerosol bomb.

A heating pad developed by industrial research includes a special harness so that a farmer may strap it on his back to keep warm while running tractors in winter.
