4-H Club Cake Walk
 The Kent County 4-H Service club will have their annual "cake walk" on Monday night, May 17, at Bostwick Lake. Bernard Smith of Dutton and George Johnson of Clarksville, are co-chairmen for the event. All girls who come are asked to bring a cake which will be bought by the boys during the cake walk. This is one way that the 4-H Service club has for making money.
 One of the popular 4-H projects carried by the girls in the summer program is food preparation. In their first year the girls learn how to measure ingredients, to recognize the seven basic foods, and also how to prepare the foods which are eaten for breakfast.
 The second year they prepare foods for lunch and third year it is the preparation of complete dinners. Because this is a summer project they will exhibit at the 4-H fair August 18 to 21. First year girls exhibit three muffins, second year they exhibit three cookies and three plain unfrosted cup cakes for third year.

HOME ECONOMICS
 Have you had your first rhubarb pie of the season? Rhubarb and asparagus are among the spring fruits from our gardens—sort of appetizers or samples of things to come. When you have eaten them fresh to your heart's content you may want to preserve some for future use by freezing. These methods are recommended by MSC.
Rhubarb
 Pack early in the season while color is best and the stalks are not stringy. If it is your supply, harvest it early in the morning for best results. Trim off the leaves and bases of stalks. Wash and cut into pieces to fit container. Do not pile. Pack dry without sugar.

Asparagus
 Avoid small and woody stalks. Handle quickly. Trim off the tough portion at the base and wash thoroughly. Do not use iron utensils. Blanch in boiling water according to the size of the stalk. (For small, blanch 2 minutes; for medium, 3 minutes; for large, 4 minutes.) Pack in a 2 per cent brine or dry pack.
 (You can make a 2 per cent brine by dissolving 1 teaspoon of salt in 1 quart of water. Cool before using.)

- 1/2 teaspoon cinnamon
- 1/2 cup dry bread crumbs
- 1/4 cup sugar
- 1/2 cup molasses
- 1 teaspoon soda
- 1/2 cup melted shortening
- 1/2 teaspoon salt
- 2 tablespoons cold water
- 1 tablespoon ginger

Sift together flour, sugar, soda, salt, ginger and cinnamon. Add crumbs, molasses, shortening and water. Mix thoroughly. Roll thin on lightly floured board or pastry cloth. Cut with cookie cutter. Bake on ungreased baking sheets in moderate oven (375°) 10 minutes.

NOTE: Dough may be shaped in roll, wrapped in waxed paper and stored in refrigerator. Slice thin for baking. (Makes about 7 dozen 2 inch cookies).
