HOME MADE Ginger Snaps 🕻

2 cups sifted enriched KING FLAKE FLOUR 1/4 cup sugar I teaspoon soda 1/2 teaspoon salt I tablespoon ginger

1/2 teaspoon cinnamon 1/2 cup dry bread crumbs 1/2 cup molasses 1/2 cup melted shortening 2 tablespoons cold water

Sift together flour, sugar, soda, salt, ginger and cinnamon. Add crumbs, molasses, shortening and water. Mix thoroughly. Roll thin on lightly floured board or pastry cloth. Cut with cookie cutter. Bake on ungreased baking sheets in moderate oven (375°) 10 minutes.

NOTE: Dough may be shaped in roll, wrapped in waxed paper and stored in refrigerator. Slice thin for baking. (Makes about 7 dozen 2 inch cookies).


