Bruce Clemenz Teen of the Week Highly Honored

Last Thursday evening in the Lowell High gym, seventy-three members of the class of 1954 received their diplomas. At the close of the impressive, though warm exercises, Bruce Clemenz, pictured below, delivered the valedictory address on behalf of his class.



Bruce was born in Grand Rapids to Wes and Esther Clemenz on March 3, 1936. All of his education was received in Lowell. While in the eighth grade he received the American Legion award for being an outstanding member of his class. In high school Bruce was especially busy with extra-curricular activities. He participated in four years of basketball and baseball, winning two letters in each, and was on the cross country team for two years. Bruce served his class as treasurer in his Sophomore year and as an active Student Council representative in his Junior year. He was a member of the Hi-Y club, a Junior Rotarian, and a representative to Boy's State.

In his senior year Bruce was on the editorial staff of the school newspaper and was one of the stars of the Senior play. And all through his high school years he maintained his high scholastic standing.

Receives American Legion Cup
At the graduation exercises Bruce received the American Legion cup for being the outstanding member of the class of 1954. He also received a scholarship to the University of Michigan where he plans to study engineering.

Aside from these many and varied activities, Bruce is probably best known as the Teen of the Week reporter. Park Vandalism Still a Problem

Vandalism continues in this area in spite of the special alertness of the officials and residents. Just what satisfaction a youngster gets from such malicious destruction is a quandary, and what kind of men and women they will grow into is still another problem.

This week Recreation Park was the scene of malicious destruction. Bases and the pitcher's mound on the ball diamond were torn up and the rest rooms were the grandstand broken into and the pipes torn out causing a flood, wasting water needed for sprinkling during the dry weather.

A reward of \$25 is offered for information leading to the arrest and conviction of the person or persons causing the recent damage at Recreation Park, according to Chief of Police Frank Stephens.

Windows Broken Accidentally
In Howard Rittenger's court 2 youths accused of being involved in a glass-breaking spree on Lowell's Main street were adjudged not guilty of malicious breaking of windows. It was an accident, he claimed. The lads were accompanied in court by their fathers. This left the store owner holding the bag for \$130 which was the cost of replacing the windows, plus court costs.

Dog and Cat Census

At the request of the Village Council the Boy Scouts of Lowell have been taking a dog and cat census calling at each home in a systematic manner. The listings must be completed and papers turned over to Scoutmaster Gould Rivette by the end of this week.

The Scouts have met with cooperation from most of the animal owners and in a short time all will be notified that dogs can be brought to the city hall for vaccination at a given date unless the animals have already been treated. This service will be practically without cost to the owner.

While most housewives have given information to the boys without reserve, one Scout reports a door was slammed in his face as soon as he mentioned census of dogs and cats.

Award Contract For Constructing School Building

On Tuesday morning of this week the Board of Education awarded the contract for the construction of the building to house the shop and music departments to John VanMaldegen, Jr., of Grand Rapids.

The three lowest bids were as follows: John VanMaldegen, Jr. \$57,673.00; Beckering Construction Co. \$59,000.00; Strom Construction Co. \$60,780.00. Other bids ran as high as \$69,746.00.

In accordance with the terms of the contract the structure must be ready for occupancy within ninety days. Building operations will get under way immediately. The structure will be 140 ft. x 44 ft.

It was reported that the Building and Site Fund now consists of \$38,000.00 and two more payments will be made. In the meantime it will be necessary to transfer funds from the General Operating account to the Building and Site fund, in order to pay for the structure upon completion.

By moving the shop department out of the high school building, it will be possible to arrange two additional grade rooms to take care of increased enrollments. This will postpone the need for a grade building for a year.

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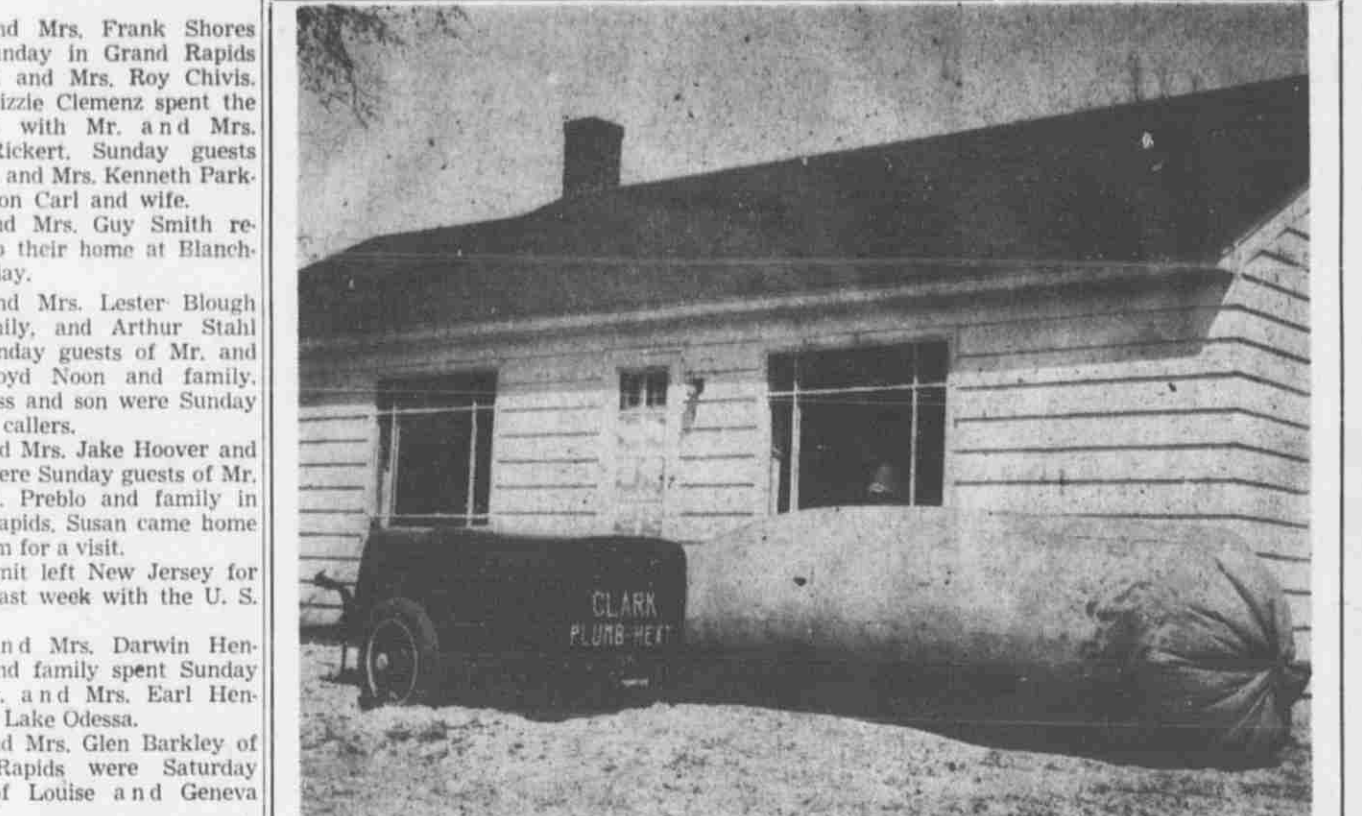

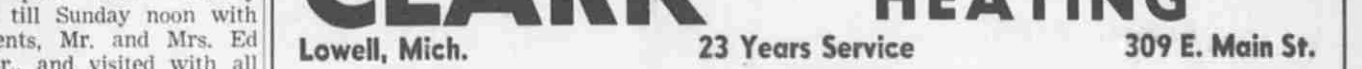

TB Contagious Find It Early

"I'd rather not know," said the ostrich hiding his head in the sand when he saw the hunters. Sometimes you will hear a man who is a good citizen in every other way say that he would rather not know whether he has tuberculosis.

You can't imagine his saying he'd rather not know he has mumps or smallpox or the plague. Of course, the symptoms of those diseases would make him uncomfortable and he would head for the nearest doctor to find out what the trouble was. Our good citizen can have TB for some time without feeling or looking sick. So he is likely not to know, until the disease has made serious inroads on his constitution and he is a very sick man indeed, according to Leo T. Moteski, M. D., director of the Kent County Tuberculosis Society.

While his head has been in the sand, he has lengthened the odds on his recovery. It will take him longer to get well when he finally begins to feel sick. And, worse, he has endangered the health, the very lives of people near him—his wife and children, his neighbors, the people with whom he works.

Tuberculosis is contagious. It isn't difficult to find out the truth. If you will go to your doctor for a regular physical examination with a chest X-ray once a year, or as often as he advises, you can be sure that any signs of illness will be found. If TB should strike it will probably be discovered before it has had a chance to do irreparable damage. In Kent county anybody may step into the Christman Seal X-ray bus which is operated by the local society and ask for a tuberculin skin test and chest X-ray at no expense to him. Dates are published in local newspapers. It takes only a few minutes to find out for sure that you don't have tuberculosis.

Other things being equal, that is the best government which most liberally lets its citizens alone. Through the whole range of authority, he governs best who governs least.
