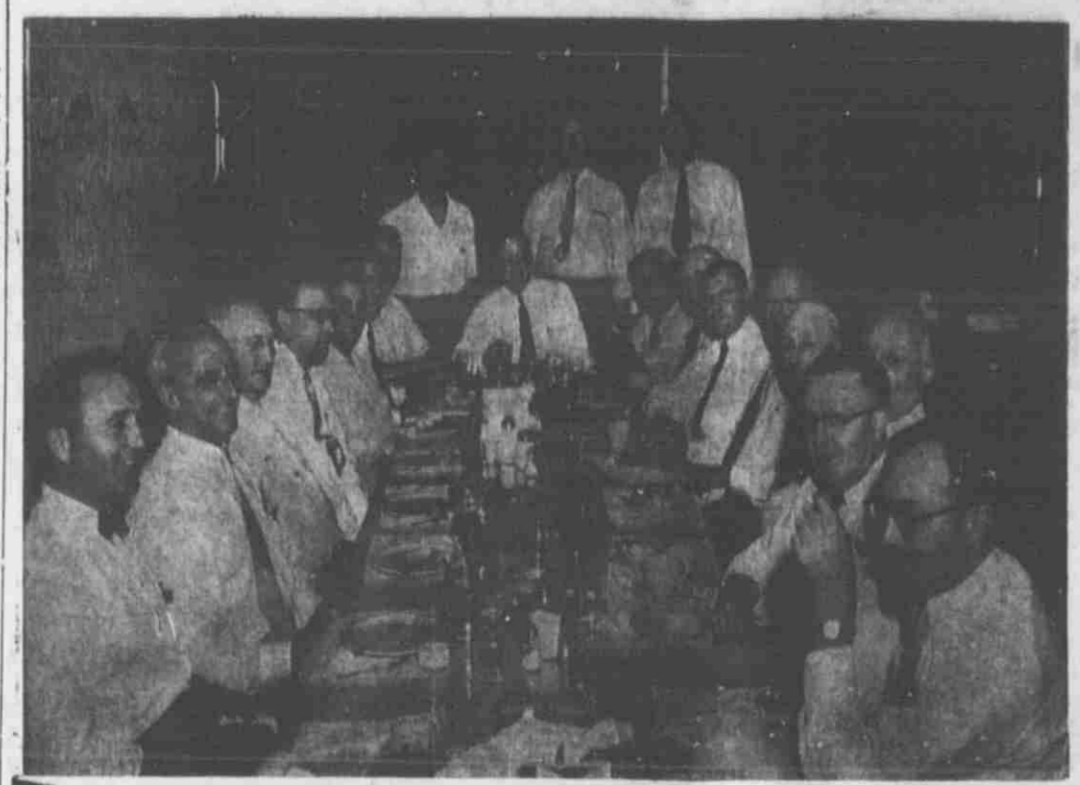


Lowell Men Dine with 'Brake-for-Governor' Boosters

If a 3-Year-Old Child Simply Will Not Mind Concentrate on Why Your 3-year-old child simply will not mind if this is your problem, concentrate on WHY the child does not mind—instead of merely on the FACT.

Approach the problem much as you would the problem of the cake that failed to rise, suggests Mrs. Lenah Backus, extension family life specialist at Michigan State College.

What is the cause? That is really what you need to know. Begin asking yourself these questions:

In the child world does he get enough sleep? Well-fed children have more energy to cooperate and trained children are more willing to take suggestions.

When asking your child to do something, do you allow time for the request to "get through" to him? Children are sometimes so engrossed that they need a moment to turn from one activity to another.

Just what do you expect of your child? Are the things you ask within his ability—or does he give up in despair and refuse?

In your 3-year-old refusing to mind in order to gain attention? If you suspect this is the case, try not to plan to give him more of your time and the feeling that he can gain your attention in more desirable ways.

Such questions will help you plan wisely to solve the "simply will not mind" problem, says the family life specialist.

Trim Hedge Bottom Wider Than at Top If you trim your hedge with the way many people trim—with the top wider than the bottom—you won't have the nice hedge you should have.

That's because the top shades the bottom of the hedge and the lower part doesn't thicken properly. Joseph T. Cox, extension landscape specialist at Michigan State College, suggests that a hedge should be about six inches wider at the bottom than at the top—that's three inches wider on each side. That will let the bottom fill out and you'll have a better looking hedge.
