Meetings were held in the Tent Cathedral, which seats 3,000 and which was filled to capacity every evening.

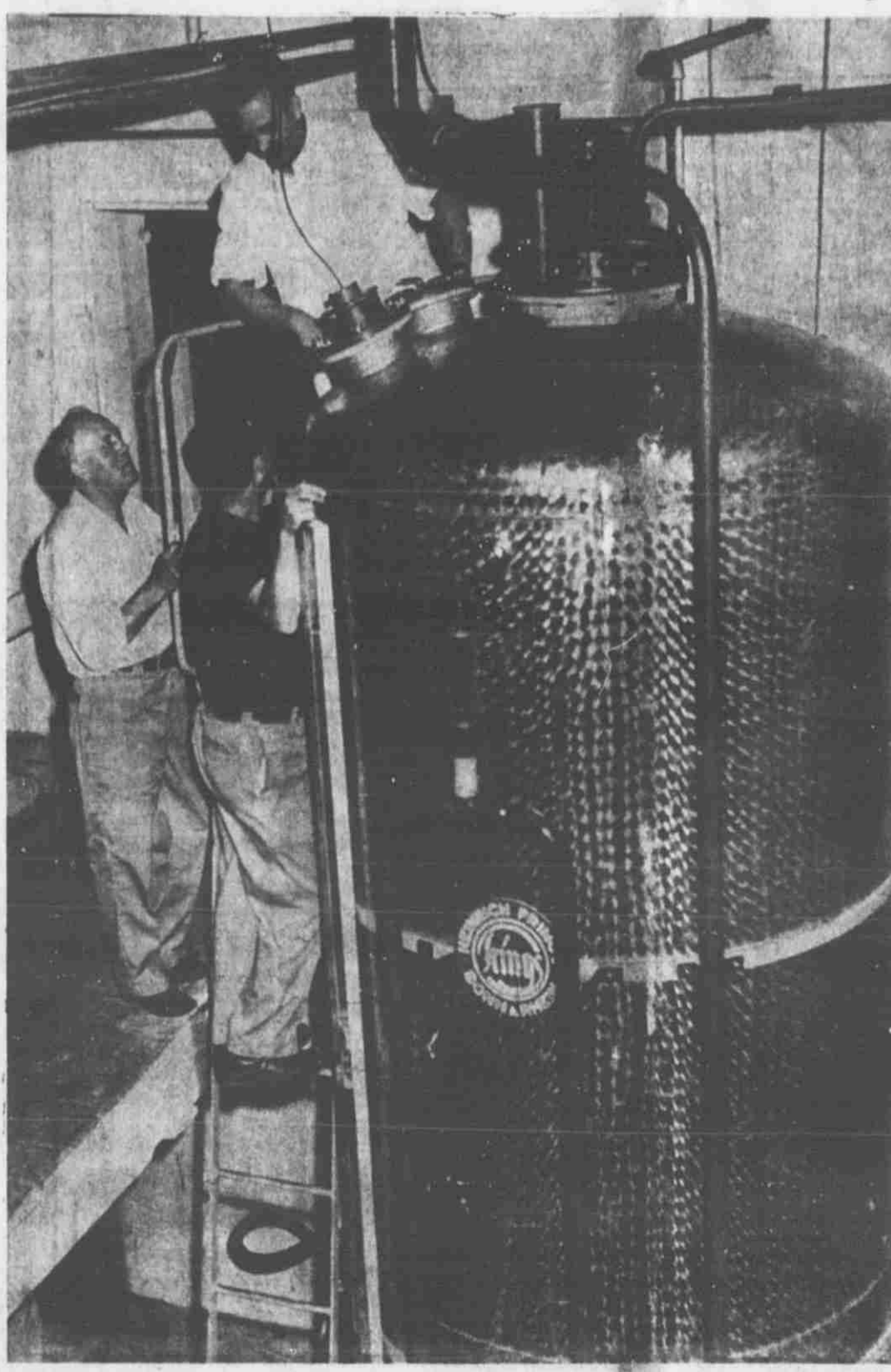
Surprise Stork Shower Honors Mrs. Thos. Hill

4-H Club Competition Will Be Keen As Fair Opens in Lowell August 18

Competition among 4H boys and girls at Kent County Fair, Aug. 18-21, in Lowell, is expected to be keener than it has been in several years, reports Ralph Kirch, 4H Club agent.

Entries are coming into the county 4H office at a faster rate than a year ago and indicate the number of entries will reach an all-time high, he said.

Some of the increase in fair entries is due to the greater number of 4H members this year over last, but the competitive spirit is also accounting for its equal share.

"We've been watching the 4H boys and girls feverishly preparing for this fair and we feel that they will help to make this one of the best," Kirch said.

The fair opens Wednesday, Aug. 18, with horse judging starting at 10 a. m. and that evening, the tractor rodeo and horse show will be the main events.

Thursday is dairy day. And it is this day that all the dairy livestock will be judged as well as contenders for dairy showmanship honors.

During the afternoon there will be half mile bicycle races for boys and girls 10 years old and older. They'll compete for prizes ranging from 25-cents to \$1.00. At 4 p. m. the popular pet parade will take place followed by the first round of the baseball tournament.

Thursday evening, Buck Barry, radio and television star, will conduct the evening program of entertainment.

Friday is general livestock day at which swine, sheep, and beef animals will be judged. Here too, champion showmanship awards will be made. That evening all the champion livestock will be on review in the livestock parade.

Highlights of the last day of the fair include the auction of gifts that have been donated to the 4H fair by merchants throughout the county. During the day, baseball finals will be played off while champions in archery will be selected.

The fair is free to everyone attending, as are the entertainment features each evening, Kirch said.

4-H'ers Advised to Practice

Katherine Stencil, assistant Kent County 4H Club agent, stresses the need for 4-H'ers to practice several times before making their final county fair exhibits.

The number of entries in the 4-H home economics division of the Kent County Fair, Lowell, Aug. 18-21, will be very large, she said. There will be more than 250 food entries. Competition will be keen. \$187 will be given in prizes. First place winners will have their exhibits entered in the State 4-H Club Show Aug. 31, through Sept. 3, in East Lansing.

Home economics 4-H demonstrations will be made by club members on how-to-do subjects, such as baking, preparing food, sewing, gardening, handicrafts, and handling livestock. Most of the entries in the baked foods class will be donated to the baked foods auction which will be Thursday evening.

This class is open to all 4-H Future Homemakers of America, extension women, and anyone who wishes to enter.

MacDonald-Osmer American Legion Post auxiliary has volunteered to conduct the emergency polio fund drive in Cascade township.

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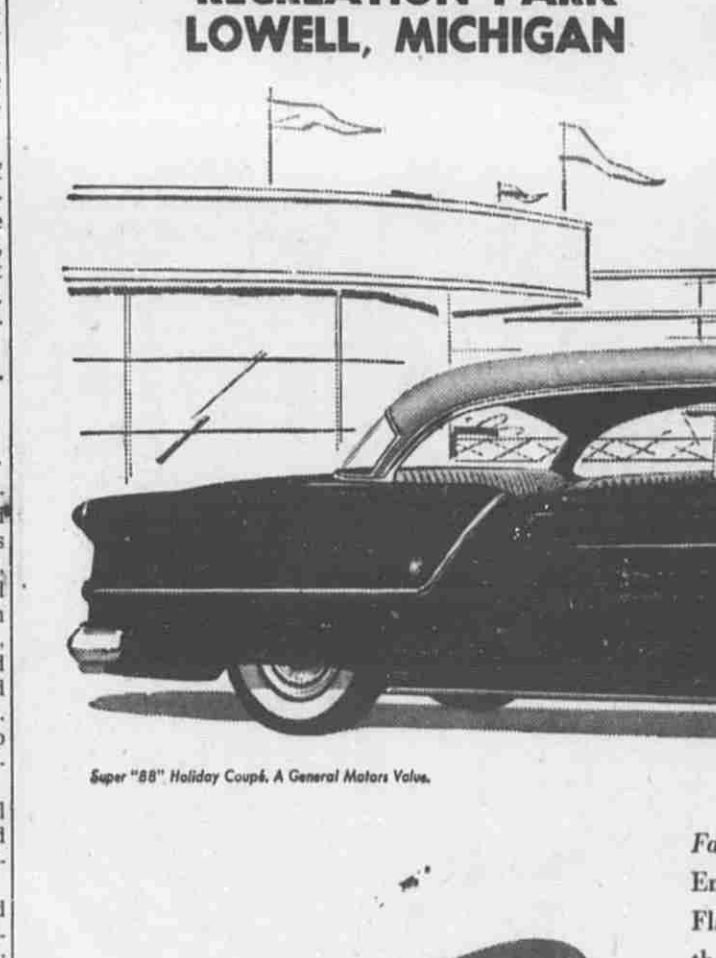
