Small Damage in Minor Accidents First of Week

A series of minor traffic accidents were reported here the first of the week but fortunately there was no serious damage in any of them. Officers who investigated report they were mostly unavoidable.

Truckload of Glass Tips

At noon Monday a truck loaded with half-gallon glass jugs consigned to the Kellogg Vinegar Co. overturned on M-91 south of Lowell, near the Timpson orchards. A front spring broke and the truck went out of control just as it was coming out of the curve in the highway, tipping it over on its side.

The driver, Thomas A. Gibbons of Columbus, Ohio, was not injured, and none of the truck's contents were broken. Traffic according to Deputy Frank Stephens, who answered the call, was not held up, although it was necessary to unload the trailer before uprighting it. Before this could be accomplished the insurance company had to be contacted for permission to unload the contents, which caused very little delay.

In an attempt to pass a slow-moving car on US-131 in Rockford early Sunday morning two cars met head-on slightly injuring four persons and wrecking both vehicles. State Police investigated the accident.

Local Boy Saved From Flat River

It was a close call for David, 7-year-old son of Mr. and Mrs. Mark (Roy) Osburn, Tuesday afternoon when he fell into a hole in Flat River back of Central Garage and was saved by men nearby.

David, with his brother, Jimmy, Bennie Ayres and Butch Babcock, had been playing in the water at that point when David fell in and failed to come up. Mike Lewis saw the boy disappear and called for help. Sam Quiggle and Clifford VanOcker, who arrived first, waded into the water and VanOcker dove into the hole bringing the boy out. The river was muddy after the rain and the boy could not be seen and could not have been found without a diver. Quiggle gave artificial respiration until the breathing started. Ron Fish of the fire department rushed to the scene with the Lowell rescuator but it was not needed.

Dr. Thomas Hill was called and gave the boy the needed treatment, after which the child was carried to the doctor's office by Lewis Phillips and Donald Kelly, the new shop teacher at Lowell high school, who happened to be there at the time. Later David was taken to his home on Grindle Drive by Police Officer George DeGraw.

Arthur E. McMahon, aged 86, of 937 Division ave., Grand Rapids, passed away Thursday in St. Mary's hospital, after a brief illness.

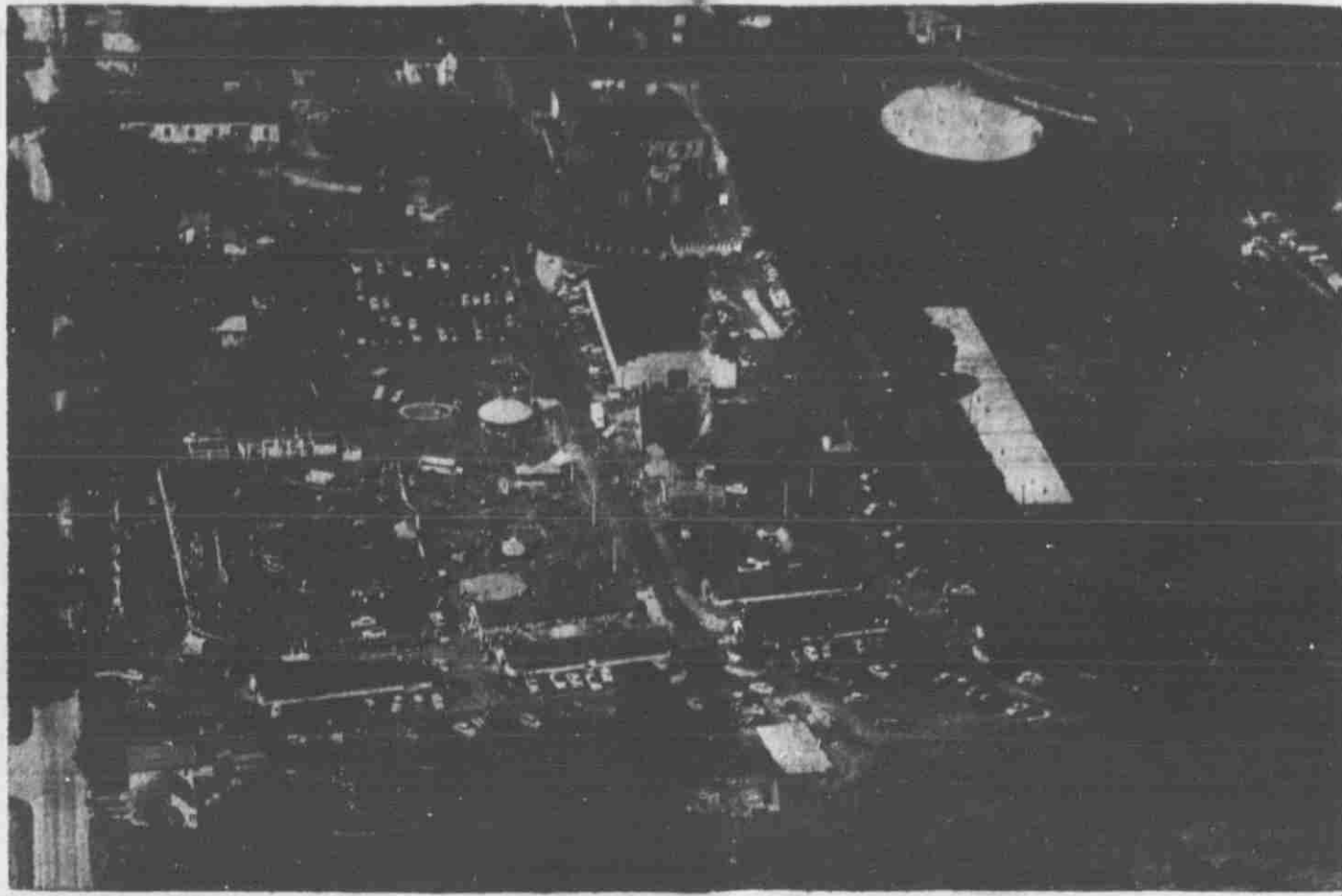

The above aerial picture of the Kent County 4-H Fair grounds at Lowell, taken while the '54 Fair was in progress, gives our readers an insight in the magnitude of the 4-H Fair. The area comprises upwards of sixty acres, including Recreation Park and the Fair grounds, 36 acres having been acquired last year for expansion. There are five stock buildings which have been erected by the 4-H besides the quonset which was originally the only shelter, and the new \$40,000 Exhibition Building erected by the Showboat. This year the number of entries far exceeded any former record and tents and pens had to be borrowed to take care of the situation.

The Twentieth Kent County 4-H Club Fair

was brought to a close Saturday with the archery and softball tournament, events of the closing afternoon. From a standpoint of attendance and number of exhibits entered, this has been the most successful in history. More than 200 entries in the dairy division kept the judges busy all day Thursday.

It took two long hours of slow, scoring, and "fine-point" judging to choose the winner of championship showmanship, and when the decision was finally made it was found that the former champion, George Baker, 15-year-old Ada farm boy had regained his showmanship title from Leon Snyder of Grandville, who unseated Baker last year. Baker was showing his 7-year-old Jersey cow, his original 4-H animal. Snyder was showing his aged Ayrshire cow which made a closely matched contest.

Junior champion showmanship went to Roger Keeney of Grand Rapids, who has been working on the Baker farm this summer and was coached by young Baker. In second place for junior honors was Michael Bird of Cedar Springs. James Vredenburg, 17-year-old Ada farm boy who was named senior beef showman, was the last of the county's top livestock showmen chosen and will be with the others on the trip to Chicago in November to the International Livestock Exposition.

Jimmy VanderLaan, 16-year-old lad from Grand Rapids, who has been virtually blind since birth, won the ribbon two years in succession with his Angus bull and last year took showmanship honors, failed on the showmanship this year.

Village Council Votes Purchase Of Two Engines

After several months of investigation, the Lowell Village Council voted Tuesday afternoon to purchase, subject to financial arrangements, two Fairbanks-Morse 1600-horse power 10-cylinder 1136 kilowatt Diesel Electric Generators. The cost of two units will be \$120,850.00 delivered in Lowell.

The purchase was made after bids had been submitted by five companies, and complete investigation of all engines by Superintendent of the Municipal Utility, Thomas Moore and members of the Village Council. The bid of the National Metal & Steel Corp., of Los Angeles, Calif., was accepted. This bid was for Fairbanks-Morse units that have been re-manufactured and modified.

The full cost of these generating units will be paid from revenues of the Lowell Municipal Utility the same as all other improvements to the plant and they will fill an important need as stand-by units. With over 2,000 k. w. generating capacity in these two new engines the Municipal Utility will be able to carry on a proper maintenance program and have a reserve of power that is expected to last seven to ten years. There is sufficient room in the southwest corner of the plant to install these two machines so no capital expenditure for a building will be necessary.

The council members have spent many hours on the decision to buy two re-manufactured units instead of new. The savings of 60 to 70 thousand dollars will enable the utility to make the hydro-generating plant, nine miles north of Lowell, automatic and make improvements in the present distribution system.

Two questions asked most frequently along Main Street: "Who paid for the council members' inspection trips to Texas, California and Minnesota?" ANSWER: Members of the Council took time off from their own businesses to look over these generating units, expenses of the trip were paid by the companies who had the diesel engines for sale. The other question involves the noise that will be made by these two high speed generators? ANSWER: The new units, although they will operate at 720 revolutions per minute, while the present engines run at 300, are of the opposed piston type which are much smoother operating units. Special residential mufflers and air-intake silencers will be used to keep the noise at a minimum.
