Local School Supt. Takes Jet Air Ride



Supt. Walter W. Gumser pictured above, is prepared to step aboard the Jet Propelled Aircraft at Randolph Field, Texas, for a ride over several Camps in the southwest. During his ride he learned firsthand much that our boys in the service are taught in the Air Force, and why the flying is so attractive to them.

During his summer vacation W. W. Gumser, superintendent of Lowell Public Schools and president of Michigan Association of School Administrators, in company with a group of educators, took a jet ride at Randolph Air Force Base and other camps in the southwest. The purpose of the tour was to become better acquainted with air force procedures and training of

personnel. The department expressed a wish that school people encourage enlistment.

In presenting the certificate to Mr. Gumser, the commanding officer said: "As a memento of your first jet aircraft ride on the occasion of your visit to this headquarters in connection with the Michigan Educators' survey of selected Air Training Command bases, I am pleased to present to you the Certificate. It was most appropriate for you to participate in a flight of this kind, for, as you know, practically all of our training is conducted in this type aircraft."

High Spot of Trip
Gumser reports that the high spot of the trip was a visit to restricted areas where he watched the direct radar landing of planes and their unloading and loading. He was permitted to enter and inspect the largest plane in the world at Kelly Field. The capacity of this plane is 400 troops equipped and supplied for battle.

The jet ride covered about 200 miles and cruised at a speed of 500 mph and in a dive attained even greater speed.

While at Scott Field it was Mr. Gumser's privilege to meet Robert Eickhoff of Lowell.

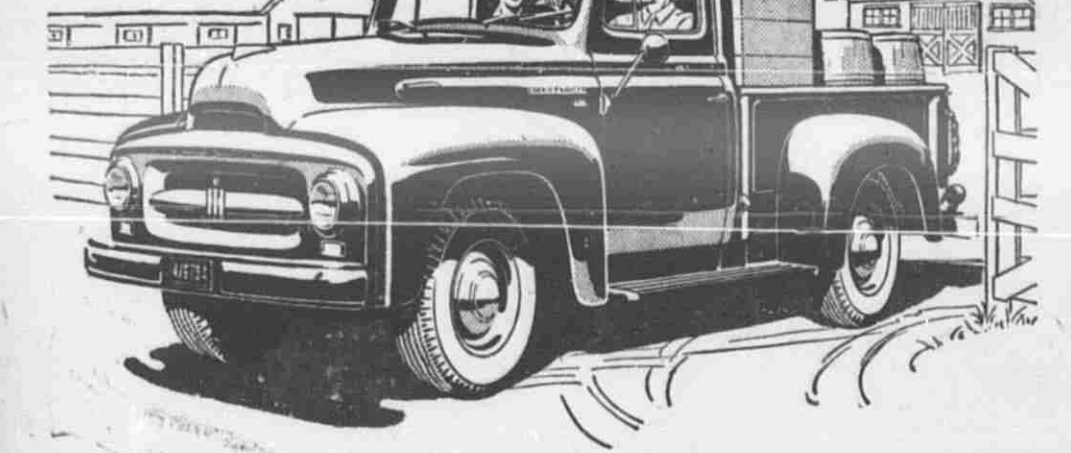

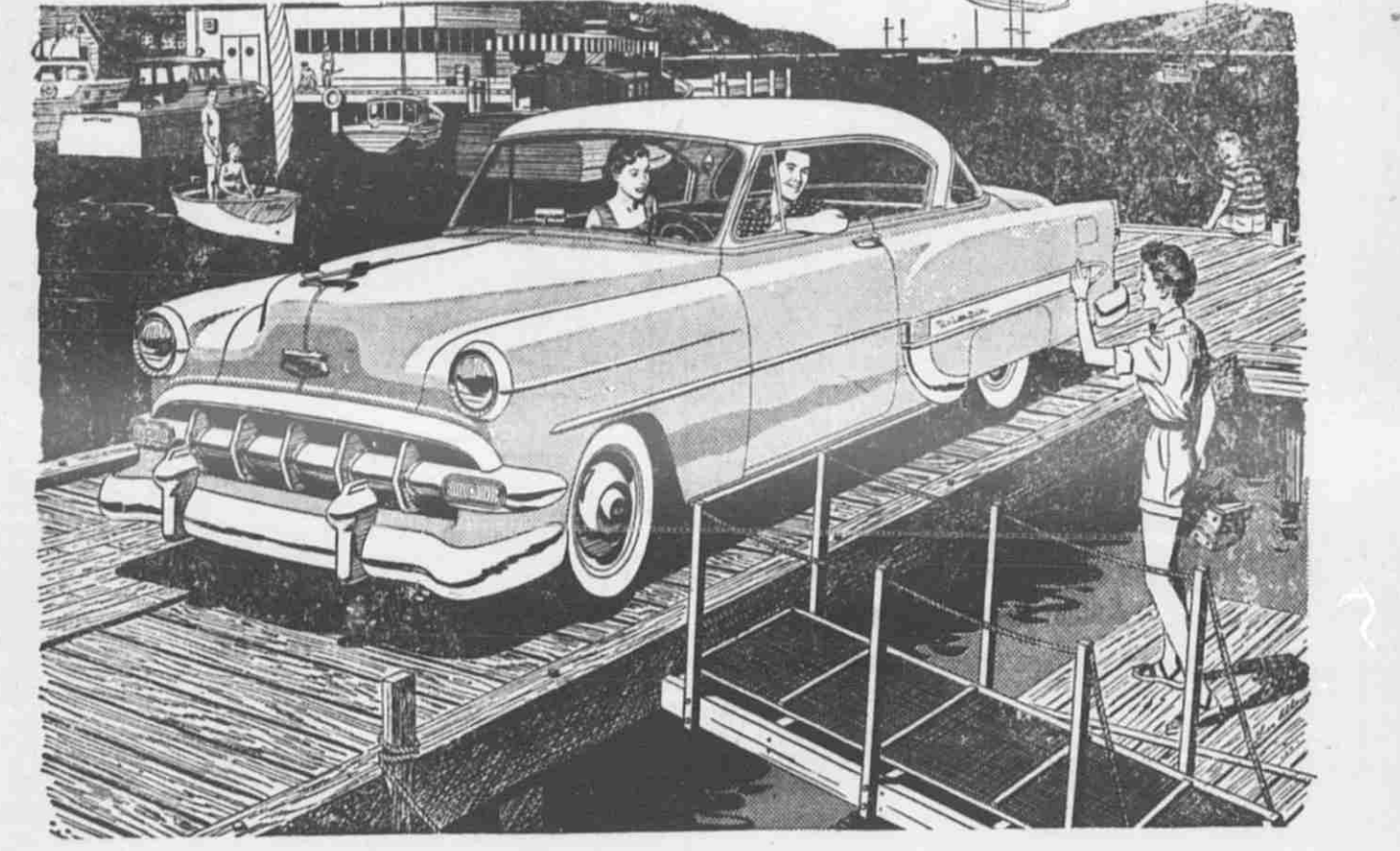

QUICK CAKE INGREDIENTS
 1 1/4 cups KING FLAKE Self-Rising Flour
 1/2 cup Sweet Milk
 -1 Egg
 3/4 cup Sugar
 1/4 cup soft Shortening
 1 teaspoon Vanilla

PEANUT BUTTER TOPPING
 3/2 cup Brown Sugar
 1/4 cup Soft Butter
 3 tablespoons Evaporated Milk or Cream
 1/4 cup Peanut Butter
 1/2 cup Chopped Peanuts if desired

Sift self-rising flour and sugar together and add soft shortening and milk. Beat 2 minutes; add egg and vanilla and beat another 2 minutes. Pour into flat cake pan, greased and lightly dusted with flour. Bake in moderate oven (350 deg. F.) 30 to 35 minutes. Prepare the peanut butter topping while the cake is cooling. Cream together brown sugar, butter, peanut butter and evaporated milk. Add chopped peanuts, if desired. Spread mixture over cake, and broil until bubbly and brown. Serve warm or cold.

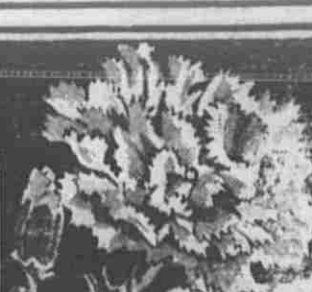
