Fluoridation Adds Nothing New to Water State Decist Says

Fluoridation seldom adds anything new to a municipal water supply, a recent Michigan study shows.
The study, evaluated by Dr. Fred Wertheimer, showed that fluoridation, to prevent tooth decay, merely adds a little more of an element already there.
Dr. Wertheimer, Chief of the Public Health Dentistry section of the Michigan Department of Health, says the fact that fluoride is present in small quantities in most water systems is not generally known. Actually, Dr. Wertheimer continues, analyses of public water supplies in Michigan for natural fluoride content prove that most in Michigan have trace amounts of fluoride present in the water supply. But, he emphasizes, not enough to give adequate protection against tooth decay.
In three Michigan communities, he continues, the water supply have more than 1.5 parts per million of fluoride, and the fluoride concentration should be reduced to prevent possible mal-treatment or staining of the teeth.
Dr. Wertheimer concludes, fluoride added to a municipal water supply to bring the content to 1 part per million is a safe, inexpensive and very practical way to protect dental health in communities that nature has not adequately supplied with fluoride.

The average pregnant woman should have from 2,500 to 3,000 calories a day. 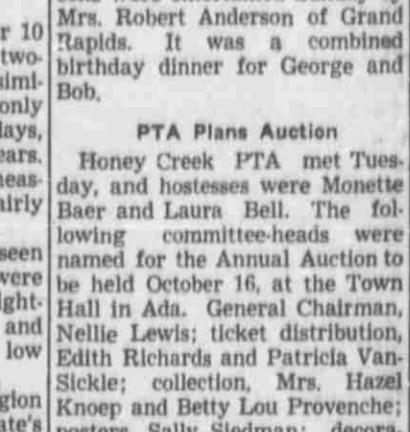

Read Label When Buying Raincoat

Girls who are starting to collect a school wardrobe for fall probably have "raincoat" down on that shopping list.

Clothing specialists at Michigan State College offer these tips to help you select the kind of rainwear you want:

If the label says "waterproof," you'll know that the fabric has been treated to shed water completely...even in a driving rain. Plastic coats and "slikers" come in that class. But, remember...that treatment also closed the "pores" of the fabric so no air can penetrate. And some people find this type hot and uncomfortable.

"Water repellent" raincoats are comfortable because they maintain their porous quality. They have been chemically treated to make them resistant to wetting. They shed water satisfactorily except in a prolonged, hard rain.

The MSC clothing specialists urge you to look for a close, firm weave if you buy a water repellent raincoat—whether made of cotton, rayon, silk, nylon or a blend of fibers. Look too, for the tag that indicates whether the water repellent finish is durable or non-durable.

A non-durable water repellent finish would mean you must have the finish restored with each dry cleaning or laundering—an expensive process.

Take time to read the labels before you buy—your raincoat is a year-round investment.
