Mr. Moritz, who was at work nearby, was notified by telephone and returned home.

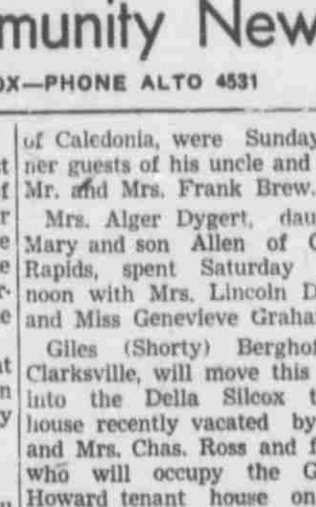
