Well, boys its time to settle down to our "Hot Stove" sessions. The first thing we want to "harp" on is the poultry house.



FEEDER SPACE - A minimum of 32 linear feet of feed hopper space for each 100 layers should be allowed.

WATER SPACE—A minimum of one gallon waterer or equivalent for 100 layers.

ROOST SPACE—A minimum of 50 to 58 feet per 100 birds should be allowed.

FLOOR SPACE—A minimum of 300 to 400 square feet should be allowed when birds are in continuous confinement.

NEST SPACE—A minimum of 20 individual box type nests should be allowed per 100 birds.

BOB-Good advice "Doc" and another important thing is ventilation.

DOC-That's right Bob. Sometimes we forget that chickens need fresh air. We make the mistake of sealing them in tight in the winter.
