Milton Fuller Dies Formerly of Lowell

News has been received in Lowell of the death of Milton Fuller, 75, of Topeka, Kansas. Funeral services and interment were in Topeka. He is survived by his wife, Mrs. Dorothy S. Fuller, and a sister, Mrs. Sadie Seagraves of Iowa.

His friends and acquaintances will remember that Mr. Fuller came to Lowell in June of 1945, to assist in the operation of the King Milling Company, after the untimely death of its president, William C. Doyle, on April 21, 1945. Mr. Fuller had been Executive Vice-president of the Thomas Page Mill in Topeka, Kansas, but had retired from active management of the business, and was therefore able to come to the aid of the King Milling Company. The president of the company, King Doyle, was then on active duty in the U. S. Naval Reserve, and did not receive his permanent appointment to inactive duty until September of that year.

Mrs. Montie M. Fuller, his first wife, died September 1, 1947, and in 1949, he left Lowell and returned to his former home in Topeka, Kansas.

Lowell Washday Hampered By 'Red Water'

"Red Water" again found its way into the Lowell water mains, and housewives were unable to do their Monday washing as usual. This rusty sediment, which began to appear Sunday evening, is caused by iron deposits from the "Foreman" wells, which have settled in the mains. "Red Water" occurs whenever a change is made in the regular pumping operations.

Last Sunday one of the pumps stopped, which necessitated turning on another well. All precautions were taken by the workers to first thoroughly flush the mains, and then turn on the new supply gradually. However, as the many calls by housewives to council members and municipal plant officials will testify, this was not effective.

At the regular Council meeting Monday this problem was thoroughly discussed. The only solution seems to be the installation of a rust-elimination program at the source of the water, that is, at the wells. A committee has been appointed to go into this matter further.

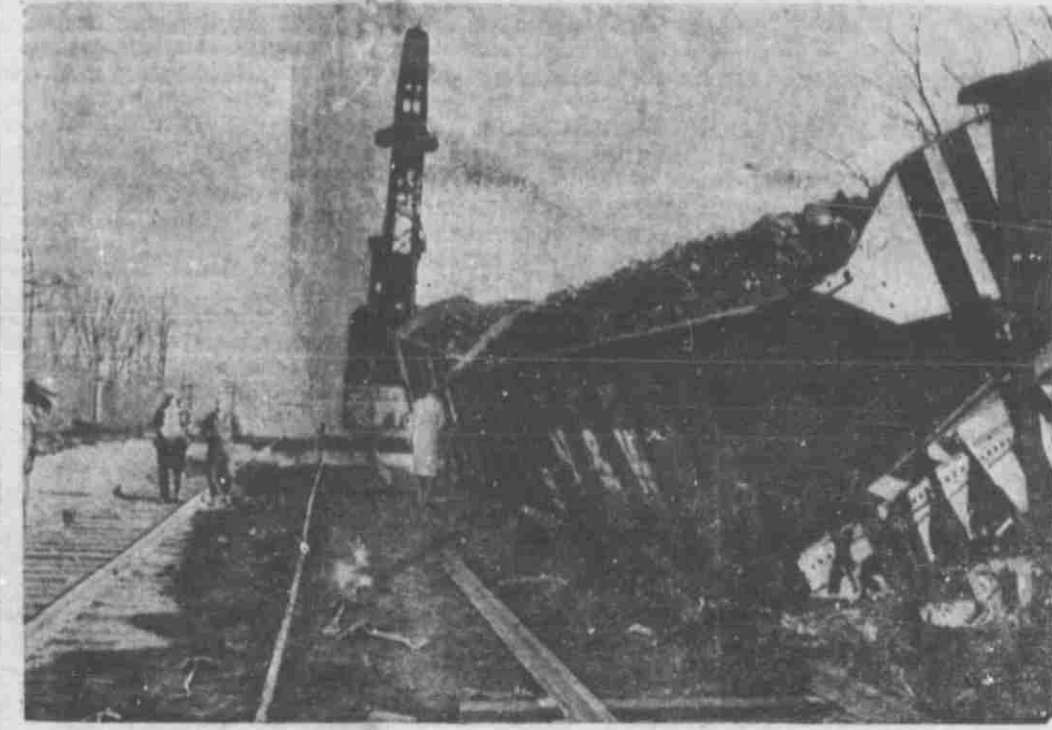

Broken Wheel Causes Train Wreck on Grand Trunk Track



The above photo was taken last Thursday evening at the scene of the train derailment on the Grand Trunk line. The accident occurred between the Lowell station and Malta tower, where the C & O tracks cross the Grand Trunk. A broken car wheel on Boat Train No. 513, running from Durand to Muskegon, with cars consigned to Milwaukee, caused seven of the cars to jump the tracks. About 100 yards of track were torn up, and a car standing on a siding was damaged. Repairs were still working on the damage the first of this week.

Conflicts in State Election Law Discussed by Township Supervisors

A misunderstanding on the part of a reporter for a Grand Rapids paper, writing last week on township election violations, caused embarrassment to Grand Rapids City Clerk R. Stanton Kilpatrick and threatened to strain city-county relations.

Mr. Kilpatrick was concerned by a statement, wrongly attributed to him by the paper, that 19 Kent county precincts had violated election laws in the recent general election.

"Actually," Mr. Kilpatrick told the Ledger, Friday, "the reporter asked me what the Michigan law was on the maximum number of voters allowed in a precinct using paper ballots. I showed him a copy of the election law, merely pointing out that two sections conflict, and suggested he read them for himself, which he did. I did not state that any townships had violated the law. Not only had I no figures on their voting records, but I would not consider it within the province of a city official to criticize township procedures."

Mr. Kilpatrick, who is a member of the State Election Law Advisory Committee, then quoted both paragraphs of the existing law, and outlined the recommendations the committee is making which it hopes will erase the conflict, as well as be more workable. He emphasized that the recommendations are not directed at any situation in Kent County, all precincts of which, city and township, carry out their elections in an orderly manner. However, there are some areas in Michigan where size of paper ballot precincts makes elections unwieldy at present, and liable to become more so with future population growth.

The present election law referring to paper ballot precincts states that such a precinct shall be divided into two or more precincts "when in any election precinct of a township, ward, or village 650 votes or more shall have been cast at the last preceding election therein, or when from an examination of the registration book, or for any other reason it shall be evident that there are more than 650 voters in any precinct," and specifies that the township board, or the legislative body or other officials charged with the performance of such duty by the charter of any city or village as the case may be, shall by resolution divide such precinct.

Marcus L. Putnam, 55 Dies Suddenly at Home

Marcus L. Putnam, 55, a former Lowell pharmacist, died unexpectedly last Thursday at his home in Eaton Rapids, after only a few hours illness following a heart attack. Funeral services were held Sunday at his home, with interment in Oakwood cemetery, Lowell.

Mr. Putnam, who was born in St. Johns, August 30, 1899, lived in Lowell in the twenties, and worked as a pharmacist for the D. G. Look store and later the John M. Hilderly Drug store. He made many friends in the few years that he lived here. From Lowell he moved to Charlotte, and later to Eaton Rapids. At the time of his death he was a pharmacist in a Lansing drug store. He was a member of the Masonic Lodge, Order of the Eastern Star, and the Methodist church.

He is survived by his wife Mrs. Neva Coons Putnam, a daughter, Mary Odiorne of Eaton Rapids, and two grandchildren.

Board Members Vote Sale Of Saranac Firm

Members of the board of directors of the Universal Metal Products Corporation of Saranac have voted to accept an offer made of the Air Control Products, Inc. of Coopersville, for their stock, and have recommended that other stockholders of their company accept the offer. The board of directors control 51 per cent of the stock of the corporation and it is hoped that the completion of the transfer of the other 49 per cent will be effected by November 29.

The Saranac firm manufactures commercial and household sprayers and dusters, and sells its products throughout the nation. They also own the Acme Line Manufacturing Co. of Traverse City, believed to be the oldest sprayer manufacturing company in the United States, and completed transfer of this firm's facilities is expected by March 30 of next year.

Robert Leigh, president of Air Control Products, Inc., stated Monday that his company hopes to continue to run the Saranac corporation with the plant and management personnel intact. He also voiced the hope that the company can obtain the full 100 per cent of stock in the corporation in order to obtain full ownership of the real estate. That would then be in a position to expand the facilities and incorporate a plastic division similar to that which they are developing at this time in their Coopersville plant. Air Control has been in business in Coopersville since 1941.

Officers and directors of the Universal firm are President, Wayne H. Young of Grand Rapids; Vice president, C. H. Runciman of Lowell; secretary-treasurer, Robert Hahn of Lowell; sales manager, J. C. Armstrong of Grand Rapids; general manager, John Arehart of Lowell; E. C. Foreman of Lowell, Frank Newell of Lowell, John Adgate of Saranac and W. A. Roth of Lowell. The late Paul Kellogg of Lowell, also was a director, that vacancy not having been filled.

The Universal firm was started in 1934 with virtually the same board of directors it has today.

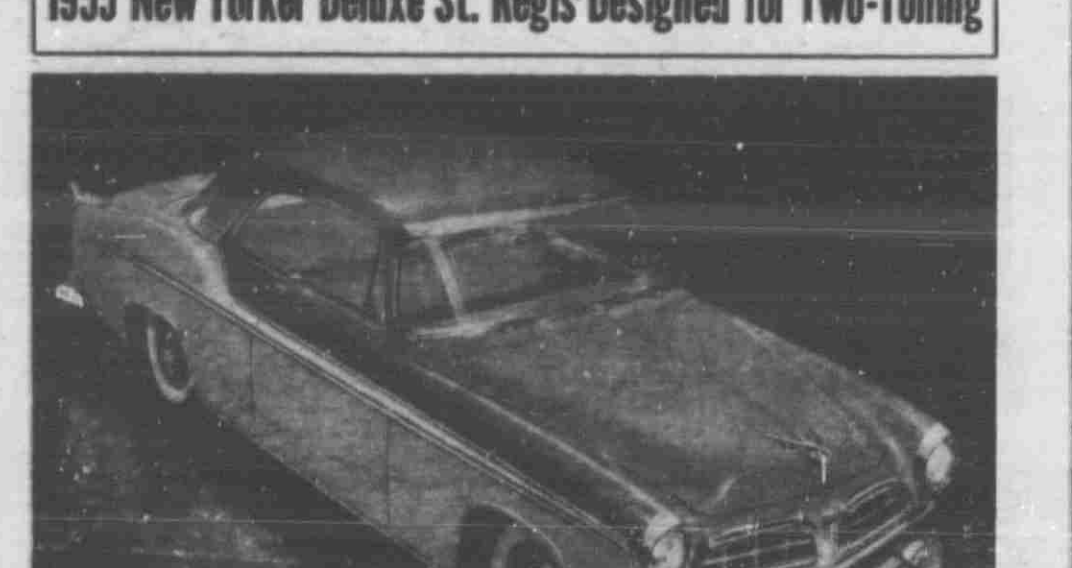

Lowell Council Proceedings

A regular meeting of the Common Council of the Village of Lowell was held in the Council Chambers of the City Hall, Monday evening, November 1, 1954. The meeting was called to order by the Village President, W. A. Roth, at 8:05 p. m. Trustees present: Munroe; Fonger; Elzinga; McKay; Oatley; Johnson. Trustee absent: None. Village Attorney, R. M. Shivel, also present.

The minutes of the last regular meeting of October 18, 1954 were read and approved. The report of the Police Department activities for the period of Oct. 18 to Oct. 31, inclusive, as submitted by Chief, F. L. Stephens, was read and placed on file.

The clerk reported receiving monies in the following amounts: F. L. Stephens, Drivers License Fee \$ 218.50 Fair Association, Rent on 414 Grandview \$ 625.00 The clerk read a letter from the Globe & Rutgers Insurance Co., in forming the Council of the anticipated merger with the American Home Association Co.

Because of an increased rate for insurance on the Lowell Stamping Co. located outside the Village limits; the Council was requested to enter into a fire protection agreement with the Company which would allow them to buy insurance at the same rate as if they were in the Village. It was moved by Trustee McKay, seconded by Trustee Elzinga that the Council adopt the Resolution submitted by the Michigan Inspection Bureau with the following addition:

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED, that the Lowell Stamping Co. shall pay the Village of Lowell One Hundred Dollars (\$100.00) per call, plus overtime pay of firemen and Apparatus and in addition to one hour for each fire call. Yeas 6, Nays 0. Carried.

Superintendent Thomas Moore reported that the State was ready to start putting catch basins where needed on M-91. Mr. Moore also reported that the new lights at the football field were completed and the total cost was \$12,448.18.

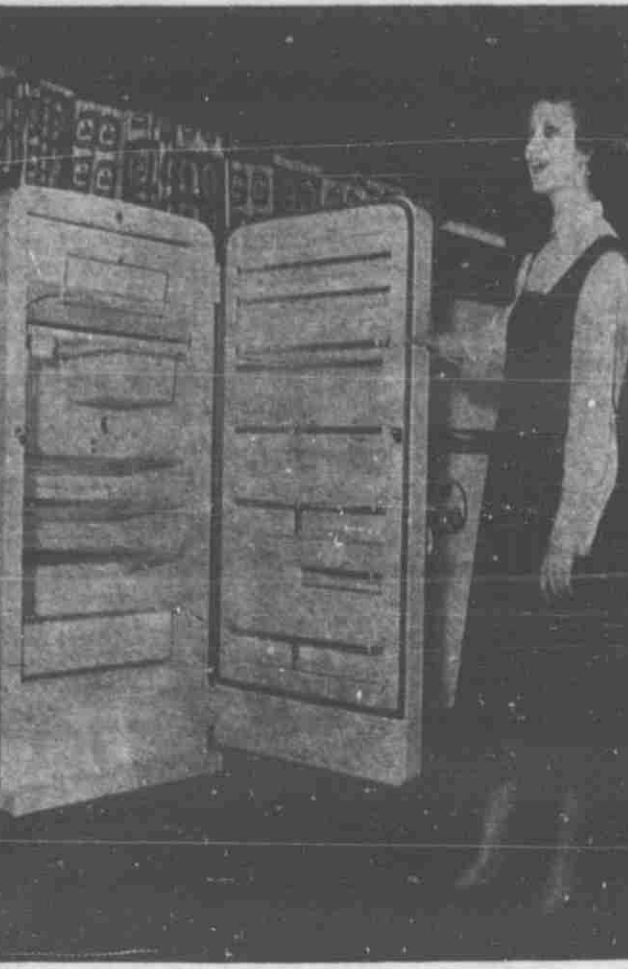

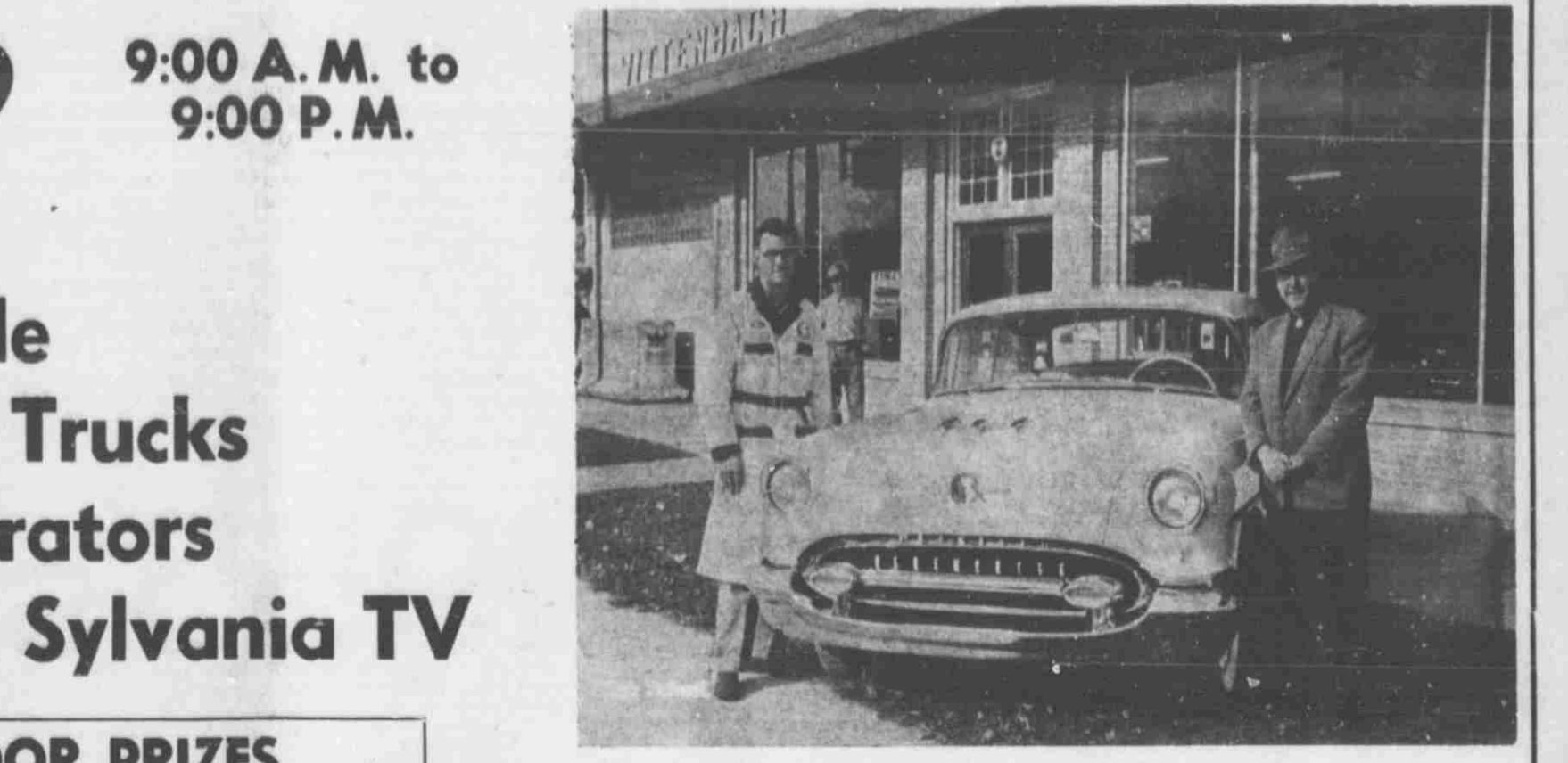

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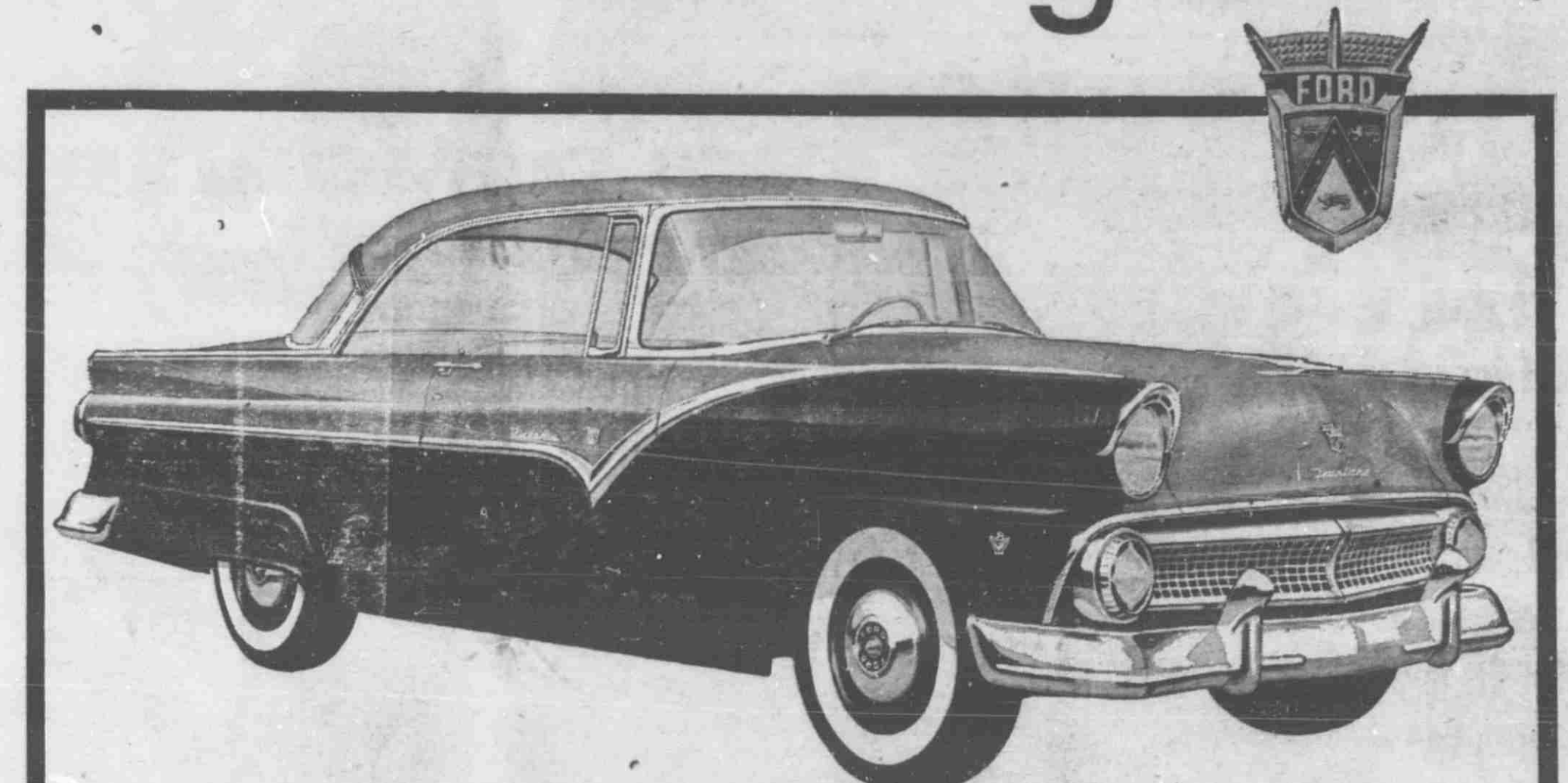
