## Dog Ordinance Will Force Owners To Keep Pets Home

At a regular meeting last Monday the Village Council members unanimously voted to pass an ordinance enforcing dog owners to keep their pets on their premises or under their immediate control at all times, to establish a dog pound, and to hire a dog warden.

This action was necessitated by the great number of complaints received about dogs running loose, and will give the Village authority to enforce a regulation which has been in effect in the State and also in Kent County for many years.

Hold Five Days  
A dog which is impounded may be obtained by the owner by the payment of \$2.00 if claimed the first day of impoundment, or an additional \$1.00 for each day after that. After five days the dogs will be turned over to the Kent County Dog pound for the usual action.

It is expected that the Lowell pound will be located in one of old horse barns on the 4-H property. Details of enforcement will be handled by the Lowell Police Department.

Authorities are required to notify the owner of any dog impounded, or, if such information is not available, to make a definite attempt to secure the name of the owner.

"Owner Defined"  
An owner is defined as any person on whose premises a dog remains for over ten days. All dogs over 3 months of age must have Kent County licenses, and must be kept on the owner's property, or under leash.

## S-D Day Slogan 'Keep Five Alive'

Sgt. Gordon Hanthorn, commanding officer of the Rockford State Police Post, has announced "Keep Five Alive" as the slogan of the Michigan State Police in connection with the National S-D day proclaimed for December 15. This day has been set up by the President's Action Committee as a challenge to motorists and pedestrians alike to go 24 hours without accidents.

The slogan is significant in that last year there was an average of five traffic deaths each day in Michigan. "We're calling on drivers and pedestrians to show that we can save these five lives by having a death-free day through careful driving and walking," Sgt. Hanthorn stated.

"We're asking them not to be involved in one of the more than 500 accidents that occur in our state each day, and to avoid being one of the 160 persons injured in them, or to cause the injury to anyone," he concluded. This may sound like a large order, but let's all make an extra effort to show him we can do it.

## To Hunt For Cougar At First Big Snowfall

If you are interested in hunting for something a little unusual perhaps you will be interested in the hunt that will be instigated at the first heavy snowfall in the area northeast of Lowell. There has been a lot of publicity in papers recently about the large foot print found by William Perry on his farm on North Montclair avenue. A cast made of this print, and examined by the Grand Rapids Public Museum preparator and chief taxidermist, Herman Hinrichs, has been identified as that of a mountain lion.

No one has seen the animal that made the large prints, but the same print has been seen in two other places in the woods across Montclair avenue from Perry's property, in Ionia county, and on the Clifford Hill property. Covered Bridge road. The footprints measure five and one-half inches from back to front and four and one-half inches across. All three prints have been found within a three-week period.

Carcasses of rather large animals have been found near White Bridge road. But, according to Lew Morse, local mail carrier, and conservation enthusiast, the cougar always buries its kill after satisfying its appetite. Mr. Perry stated he didn't worry too much about the print when he first saw it, but upon hearing from Mr. Hinrichs at the Public Museum he doesn't feel too casual about the whole matter, and stated that he is concerned about his three little boys, the eldest of which is seven.

## Moving Day Monday Music-Shop Depts. in New Quarters

Last Monday the new addition to Lowell High School was officially in use with the Music and Shop departments moved in and holding classes, and the new school bus service department installed and in operation. This fine new section will greatly alleviate the crowded conditions in the school, and help to facilitate the smoother operation of classes in the older building.

The last payment on this structure will be due and payable in the next thirty days, and according to W. W. Gumsier, School Superintendent, the total actual cost of the music-shop addition will be in the neighborhood of \$58,000.

Special feature of the new wing is the installation of the bus-service department under the direction of bus mechanic Joe Green. This department will service and repair the school buses, on the school grounds, a job which has been done in a rented garage in the past years. The school will also maintain their own gasoline supply, Mr. Gumsier stated.

Again we are trying something new. In the past few weeks we have had outstanding students who have excelled in their own fields of activity. They have been Teens either by themselves, or by sharing the spotlight with one other person. Recently, we even had a sub-teen, taken from the junior high. This week we are giving the honor to four students who have chosen music as one of their fields. Though each member of the trumpet quartet pictured above is technically only one-fourth of a "Teen," actually each deserves the honor in his own right. Pictured, standing from left to right are Jim Lind, Lee Walter, Jack Nash and Bernard Collins, the four who occupy the top chairs of the cornet section in the high school band.

It is interesting to note that these four players have amassed a quarter of a century of band experience ranging from beginners' to senior band.

Jim, 16, was born on October 22, 1938, to Mr. and Mrs. Harold Lind of Lowell. He has always attended the Lowell schools where he has been active not only in band but also in basketball for three years and tennis for two. He is a letterman in the latter sport. This year he serves the Junior class as vice president and representative to the Student Council. He was a Prom-server last year, has been on the Homecoming committee for two years, and was in this year's American Legion award after graduating from the eighth grade. ## Organize Police Unit For Kent Civil Defense

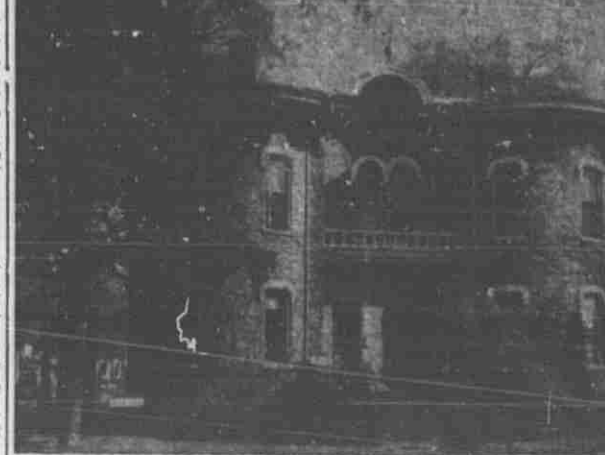

## Heirs Present Library Site to Lowell



Last Monday at the regular meeting of the Common Council of the Village of Lowell, a resolution was passed unanimously to designate the present library building as the "Robert W. Graham Memorial Library" inasmuch as the Village has acquired the title of the Myrtle S. Graham and Herbert E. Graham heirs to this property. It was also voted to erect a plate on said building reading, "This corner to the public use as a library in memory of Robert W. Graham, by his children."

Lowell's first library record is mentioned in minutes of a school meeting on June 18, 1878, at which a motion was made that the library money on hand (\$53.79) be supplemented by an additional \$50 to purchase new books. At this time the library was housed in the east room of the central school building and R. W. Graham was librarian at a salary of \$50 per year. Hours were 10 to 12 Saturday forenoons.

After numerous moves about Main street, and short-time librarians, it was not until 1922 go, extended the use of the west department of the Graham-home, corner of Hudson Avenue and Main St., rent free, for library purposes, in memory of his parents under the direction of Mrs. Ella C. Post and Audie E. Post. This was the beginning of the library as we know it today.

### Village Ordinance

AN ORDINANCE RELATING TO THE OPENING AND KEEPING OF DOGS REGULATING THE RUNNING OF DOGS AT LARGE, TO ESTABLISH A DOG FOUNDRY, TO REGULATE THE OFFICE OF DOG WARDEN AND TO REGULATE THE DUTIES THEREOF, AND TO PROVIDE PENALTIES FOR THE VIOLATION THEREOF. THE VILLAGE OF LOWELL, ORDINANCE:

SECTION 1. Definition of Terms: For the purpose of this ordinance the following terms shall have the following meaning: The term "dog" shall include all dogs, male, female, and unsexed. The term "owner" shall include any person who has the right of property in such dogs, and every person or corporation who harbors such dogs or have the same in their care.

SECTION 2. Dog license. It shall be unlawful for any person or corporation to own, possess or harbor a dog of the age of three months or over without a license. The license shall be obtained by the owner of the dog and every person or corporation who harbors such dogs or have the same in their care.

SECTION 3. Possession and ownership. Every person in possession of a dog or who harbors any dog or who shall suffer such dog to remain about his premises for the purpose of this ordinance, shall be deemed the owner thereof.

SECTION 4. Dogs Running at Large. No dog shall be allowed to run at large in the Village of Lowell unless such dog is under the immediate control of the owner. For the purpose of this ordinance, a dog shall be deemed under immediate control:

(a) If such dog is with the owner or some member of the owner's family, firmly attached to a leash.

(b) If the dog is on the premises of the owner and not with the owner or some member of the owner's family.

SECTION 5. Operation of the Office of Dog Warden and Establishment of a Dog Pound. The Common Council may by resolution appoint a dog warden who shall hold office at the pleasure of the Common Council and whose salary shall be fixed by the Common Council. Any person so appointed shall be sworn in by the Chief of Police of the Village of Lowell.

SECTION 6. Powers and Duties of the Dog Warden. The Dog Warden shall have the same authority as any member of the police department relative to the picking up of the dogs anywhere within the limits of the Village of Lowell.

#### Play Santa and Shop for Vets

More than 30,000 members of the Michigan American Legion Auxiliary this week are bringing to the Christmas shopping season a special gift to the veterans who are unable to go to stores to do their gift hunting for relatives and friends back home.

Repeating a service started seven years ago, the auxiliary members have set up a shopping center in each of five Veterans hospitals located at Dearborn, Saginaw, Battle Creek, Iron Mountain and the new Ann Arbor.

The unique difference between these shopping centers and other stores where Christmas gifts are selected is that veterans don't pick for the gifts they select for their families. What they choose is the gift of the auxiliary. Each veteran is entitled to select three gifts, with a value of \$1.50 to \$3.00 each.

After the selections are made, volunteer auxiliary members assigned to these hospitals wrap them as gifts and then prepare each package for parcel post. Hospital orderlies and nurses bring veterans bound to wheel chairs and stretchers to the shopping centers.

Altogether, 805 counties in 21 States are included in the area for 1955, compared with 834 counties in 22 States for the 1954 corn crop.

Under a corn-allotment program, compliance with farm allotments is a condition of eligibility in the commercial corn producing area for price supports. The non-commercial corn area is exempted from allotments, but the county loan and purchase agreement rates in such areas are 75 percent of the rates in the commercial corn area.

By law (Agricultural Act of 1954) marketing quotas do not apply to corn. Last year, 30,000 farms complied with their allotment and are eligible for price support on corn now being harvested.

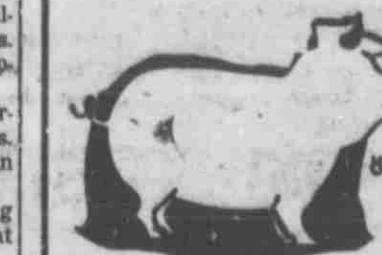
