Ford Reviews Joint Resolution to Defend Formosa; G. I. Bill Extension

The Ghost of War and the Spirit of Peace again haunted the hall of the House of Representatives the past week. Your Congressman was one of the 409 Republicans and Democrats who voted to approve the Joint Resolution on the defense of Formosa. Let me assure you that I did not take that stand lightly nor in ignorance of the implications. It is the consensus of the best-informed authorities here that this is a step away from, rather than toward, war.

By definitely announcing our intention of securing and protect-

ing Formosa and the Pescadore we dispel any false notions by the Chinese Communists. The United States will not defend these islands. Our military experts contend that if Formosa falls into the hands of Red China, the Free World will inevitably lose the Philippines, Japan and other Pacific allies. The loss of this valuable territory means the ruthless and dangerous enemy is thousands of miles closer to the shores of America. We are one united nation in our determination to halt the march of the Godless Communist aggressors in the Kremlin or Peking.

Not a "Blank Check"

Some Americans have expressed the fear that we are giving Chiang Kai-shek a "blank check," encouraging him to attack the mainland and thus precipitate a general war. As your Representative here in Washington, I am convinced that our government has a firm assurance that no such action will be taken.

To strengthen this confidence, the Congresswoman from Illinois, Mrs. Marguerite Church, a member of the Committee on Foreign Affairs, gave personal testimony in favor of the Resolution on the floor of the House. Among other things she said: "I have lived through three major wars. I want no more war. I have practically stated that only over my dead body and my lost hopes would I ever vote for war. I voted therefore to make this action unanimous only because I became convinced after 5 hours of careful testimony and discussion—the main tragedy being that we cannot tell you all of the facts in the case, ever—that this resolution was a measure not for war but a step that I do to prevent war. Only for that reason did I find the courage to take a step that I know is so momentous."

Furthermore, the President asked the United Nations to work out a cease-fire order between the warring Chinese camps. The Formosa Resolution is not too definite as to the position of Quoy and Matsu in all this. The fate of these islands undoubtedly is not being sealed at the moment in an effort to bargain effectively in the cease-fire negotiations.

It is conceivable that these islands will have to be sacrificed to obtain a cease-fire order. Should that order be effected, Chiang would have less reason to insist upon keeping Quoy and Matsu, and peace would be more firmly established.

We have taken our stand. But the tragedy and frustration which we all feel was well expressed by Representative Jackson of California, who in the course of the debate stated:

"The question of war or peace is not for us to determine. A handful of men a half a world away hold the key to that grave question. We should be greater than gods if we could insure a just and lasting peace among men and, by the same token, we would be less than men if we failed to meet this clear challenge in this fateful hour."

Set January 21st Date
Your Congressman was also one of the 365 Representatives who last week voted for the bill permitting any person serving in the Armed Forces on January 31st to continue to accrue educational benefits under the G. I. Bill of Rights. Not only did many men volunteer for service with the understanding that they would be eligible for educational benefits, but thousands of veterans have proved that they have a serious approach to education and that the training they received is enabling them to make a constructive contribution to the welfare of their country. The President agrees that these educational benefits should continue for those in the Army, Navy, and Air Force prior to January 31st.

Lowell Methodist Church to Hear Major Thomas Doyle Sunday Morning

As part of the Centennial Celebration being observed this year at the Lowell Methodist church, Major Thomas L. Doyle, Army Chaplain, and life-member of the church, will deliver the message at this Sunday's services. Major Doyle is the son of the late Remis Doyle, and a brother of Earl Doyle of Lowell.

He will also officiate at special baptismal services which have been scheduled this Sunday for children of his Lowell relatives. A graduate of Lowell high school Class of 1934, Major Doyle obtained his A. B. degree from Simpson College, in Iowa, and was ordained to the ministry from the seminary at Northwestern University. He also has done graduate work at Heidelberg University in Germany and Harvard University in Boston.

His first parish in the ministry was at Lanark, Illinois; he was later transferred to Des Moines, where he became a member of the Iowa National Guard. He has been in military service 14 years, including this Guard membership.

Major Doyle's first active military duty was at the Brooklyn Port of Embarkation in New York, where he served as chaplain; later he served aboard troop ships returning servicemen from overseas. After cessation of hostilities of World War II he was assigned in Germany for three years, and while there was known as "the flying parson" inasmuch as he traveled to many military outposts in a small 2-passenger plane.

After being stationed at Mercy Army Hospital, Waltham, Mass., he went to Korea during which service he was awarded the Bronze Star Medal for heroic achievement in conflict. Returning in the fall of 1953 he has since been chief of chaplains at Ft. George G. Meade where, with the help of his nine assistants, he serves the needs of 30,000 men stationed at this base.

Major Doyle's wife and two children live in Freeport, Illinois. Mrs. Doyle plans to visit Lowell this week, and be present on Sunday at the special services.

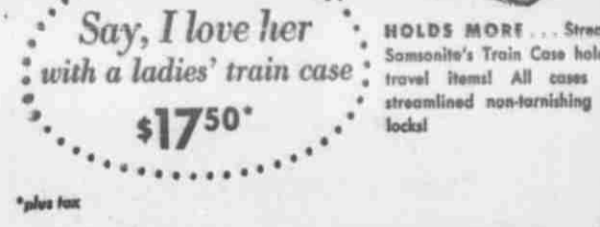

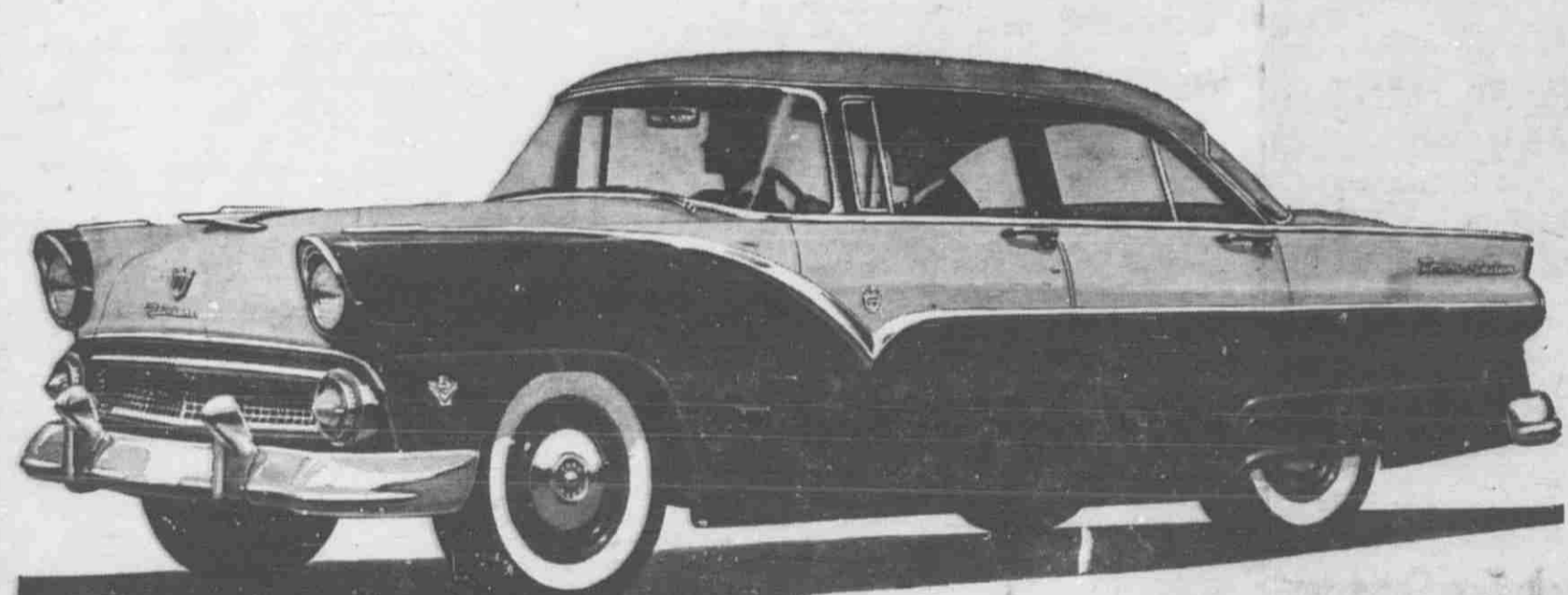
