January 17, 1955

It was moved by trustee Oatley that an advisory ballot be put on the regular election, March 14, 1955, as to the fluoridation of the Village drinking water.

Foreman Road
Mrs. Edna Taylor

This is the first of a series of historical articles which will appear in The Ledger as part of the commemoration of Michigan state College's Centennial year. The purpose is to better acquaint the public with the background of Lowell and Michigan state College's largest university.

An idea that changed the course of education in America and has had a resounding impact on the American way of life—will be 100 years old this month.

This idea is the belief that benefits of a college education should be made available to all and put to work for the good of people everywhere. It is the idea that education is a democracy should be democratic.

This new thought, that education should be available to all, was first applied at a time when university training was available only to the few. The date was Feb. 12, 1853—the founding of Michigan State College.

It was a logical step that this new educational belief should first be applied to the study of agriculture and related subjects. For a century ago America was an agricultural nation with 85 per cent of its population engaged in farming. The start of an educational program for the people, then, was a college for a farm country.

Once begun and pronounced successful, Michigan Agricultural College, as Michigan State was first called, became the pattern for a nationwide system of education—the land-grant colleges. This new educational force was put into motion in America through the federal Morrill Act of 1862. The act provided that money for these new schools should come from the sale of public lands.

Speaking in support of this national system of colleges, Congressman Justin Morrill of Vermont, author of the Morrill Act, pointed in 1876 to the Michigan College as being "in the full tide of successful experiment."

Passed by Congress and signed by President Lincoln, the Morrill Act opened the entire nation just as Michigan State had opened its doors to the citizens of Michigan.

As America grew from a farming nation into a country with many different jobs, education expanded its outlook and courses. Today, for example, half of America's working population is producing things unknown in 1800. Thus the challenges issued by the "Michigan experiment" are bringing technical help to people in Brazil, Colombia, the Ryukyus Islands, Indo-China and other lands.

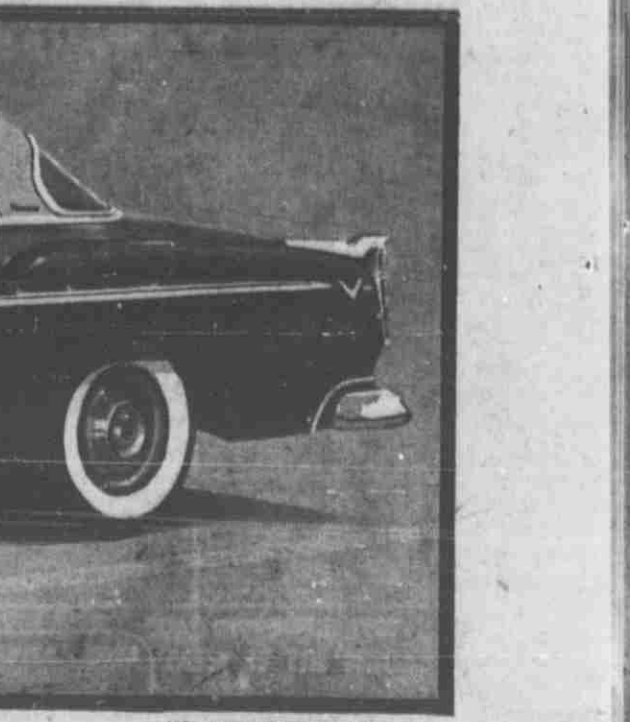

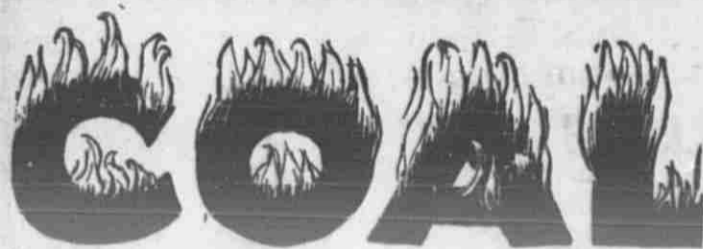
