Sheep Rescued as Fire Destroys Farm Building

Lowell Fire Department responded to a call at the Clyde Fairchild farm, 11504 McPherson road, early Saturday morning, when a fire started in a tool shed where sheep were being housed. Fire Chief Frank Baker stated he thought the blaze may have started from an electric heat lamp igniting straw.

The shed was destroyed. However, Mrs. Fairchild, who was home alone at the time, as her husband works nights in Grand Rapids, discovered the blaze and tore down the gate and let the sheep out of the burning building.

The flock of 12 4H lambs belonging to the Fairchild children, had just been sheared, and were being kept in the shed because of the extremely cold weather.

Alto Firm Sued For \$450,000 Crash Damages

Bergy Brothers of Alto have been named defendants in 2 suits filed in Kent County Circuit Court by a woman widowed as a result of a traffic accident April 13, 1954. Mrs. Cora Taylor, of Owaso, is asking \$50,000 for injuries she contends to have suffered in the accident, and in a second suit asks \$400,000 as co-executor of the estate of her husband, Wayne E. Taylor. Mr. Taylor died about two months later, at the age of 67; he was president of Indian Trails Bus Company, and the suit contends he was earning a yearly salary of \$40,000.

The incident occurred on M-21, just east of the East Beltline. The Bergy truck, driven by Charles Deming, of Alto, was traveling west, and made a left-hand turn into the driveway of the Forrest VanDusen property. The Taylor auto, apparently attempting to pass, struck the truck just behind the front door. The truck was actually party in the drive, and the car was on the left side of the highway. The truck, according to Bergy Brothers, sustained very little damage, and in fact has never been repaired; however, the auto was badly wrecked.

Sunday Crash Takes Life Driver Dies in Fiery Crash at Ada But Passing Motorists Rescue Wife

His car apparently went out of control, left the road, and crashed into a stone wall, hitting a tree, and bursting into flames. Mr. VanWagoner was trapped in the car, but passing motorists were able to rescue Mrs. VanWagoner from the flaming car. They were the only passengers in the vehicle.

Mrs. VanWagoner was rushed by ambulance to Butterworth hospital, where it was found she was suffering from third degree burns, fractured leg and jaw, and hip injuries. Her condition was reported as "not good" by hospital authorities Wednesday.

State Health Department Inspects, Approves of Lowell Sanitary Fill

The biggest controversy yet to arise over the new Lowell Sanitation Department is the "sanitary fill" operation that Lowell is undertaking to dispose of refuse it collects. The town of Lowell has taken an option on the "Henry Mulder" farm at the edge of Boston township and present operations call for the disposal of all refuse there in accordance with state regulations and recommendations.

In a visit to the site last Wednesday, Fred W. Kellow of the Michigan Department of Health, accompanied by Superintendent of Lowell Public Works Tom Moore, inspected the premises and found the Lowell operation very satisfactory.

Mr. Kellow, who came at the request of Boston Twp. residents, answered several objections voiced by those on hand for his inspection. He explained that a properly administered sanitary fill operation presents no hazards to health and does not offer a breeding place to rats or vermin.

Basically, a sanitary fill operation is the systematic covering and packing with earth, all refuse brought in for disposal. Mr. Kellow recommends a six-inch layer of dirt be placed between the layers of refuse and then tightly packed through a bulldozing operation. When the full layer of refuse has been placed in any particular location, Mr.

Kellow suggests that a two-foot layer of earth be bulldozed over the site and all layers be further packed.

The systematic packing destroys openings that can be used by rats and the suggested earth covering minimizes odor. It can in no way be compared to an ordinary "dump" where garbage and refuse is thrown and allowed to rot and breed vermin.

In a sanitary fill operation, a land site consisting of hills and valleys offers the best natural location. The refuse can then be placed at the bottom of a valley and earth bulldozed in from the higher land around it.

View Other Operations

After viewing the Lowell operation Mr. Kellow accompanied Tom Moore on an inspection of dumping areas near the Lowell sanitary fill, including a neighboring community's garbage and refuse dump located approximately 2 miles from the Lowell operation.

Mr. Kellow stated that if any of the residents in the area affected have any further questions pertaining to the sanitary fill he would be glad to arrange to show a movie on the proper operation of one. He stated that several Michigan communities including Battle Creek, Sault Ste Marie, Jackson, Coldwater, Ishpeming and the So. Oakland Co. Authority (9 communities) are now successfully operating sanitary fills.

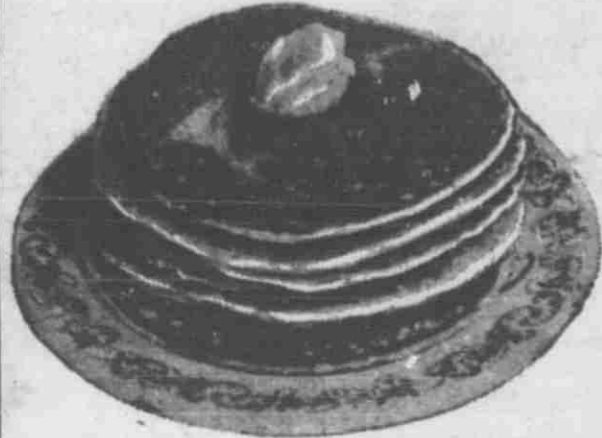
