New Elementary School Proposal to Be Submitted To Lowell Voters in Special Election April 18

In a unanimous decision Monday night, the Lowell School Board voted to have a \$250,000 bonding issue drawn up for the construction of a new elementary school building, and submitted to the voters at a special election to be held Monday, April 18.

The board voted to request a five mill levy on the state equalized value of property, to be placed into effect January 1956, when a similar 5 mills now being levied will expire. This will have the effect of extending, but not increasing the present taxes for a term of approximately 15 years to take care of the cost of the new school and meet with present state laws covering bonding procedures. The present 5 mill levy was made against property on the State Equalized value last year, which is approximately \$4,987,000 for Lowell township and produced \$25,000 in necessary revenue for the school.

Committee Report to Ada-Cascade Area on School Situation

Representatives from the school districts in the Ada-Cascade area met at a public meeting in the Ada High School gymnasium Tuesday night to hear reports of committee heads studying the school situation.

Committee findings will now be incorporated into one general report to be presented to state educational advisors. One member from each committee and one member of each school board in the districts affected will form a combined committee to discuss with state advisors ways and means of furthering the educational program.

It is the proposed aim of the committee members to put the question of consolidation into one school district before the voters sometime next fall. Long range plans include working towards the building of a high school to serve the entire area. At present, the expansion on the elementary level in each district has used much of the available bonding power.

Voters Favor Fluoridation, 359 - 141; Elect Laura Shepard Village Clerk

The proposal to install a system of fluoridation of the Lowell drinking water through the Municipal Water Plant, won out in the Village Annual election held Monday. The vote in favor of this proposal was almost 3 to 1. The 1st precinct voted 183 in favor of the proposal with 84 against; 2nd precinct tally was 176 for and 57 opposing. This same plan, when presented to the village voters last year, was turned down by a vote of 118 to 128.

All incumbent Village officers were re-elected: President W. A. Roth, Treasurer, Esther M. Fahrni; Assessor Harold F. Jefferies and Trustees M. Jack Fonger and Carl Munroe.



Frank Battistella, owner of Lowell Laboratories, was elected to serve the third Trustee post formerly held by Herbert Elzinga, who did not seek re-election this year. Mr. Battistella, a research chemist, has lived in Lowell since 1949. He and his wife moved here from Manistee where he operated a chemical plant and research laboratories. The new trustee has been very active in civic affairs, having served the Rotary Club as its secretary for two years, and is secretary of the Lowell Community Fund. He has one son, a chemical engineer at Paducah, Kentucky; also two grandchildren.

Mary Ann Gwatkin, who indicated an inability to assume the trustee position for which she had filed on the People's ticket, received 85 votes.

Laura Shepard Wins In the contest for Village Clerk, a very close vote gave the position to Mrs. Laura Shepard, the People's party candidate. The total vote was 256 for Mrs. Shepard against 250 for Lydia Johnson, Citizen's Party nominee, and present Village Trustee. Precinct 1 favored Mrs. Johnson with 143 votes, and giving Mrs. Shepard 130; however, in Precinct II Mrs. Shepard maintained a greater margin of 126 to 107, giving her a 6-vote lead over her opponent.

Total vote cast of 525 is a good number for Lowell Village elections, second only to the spirited 1953 election when 583 citizens turned out to vote on the two full party slates offered.

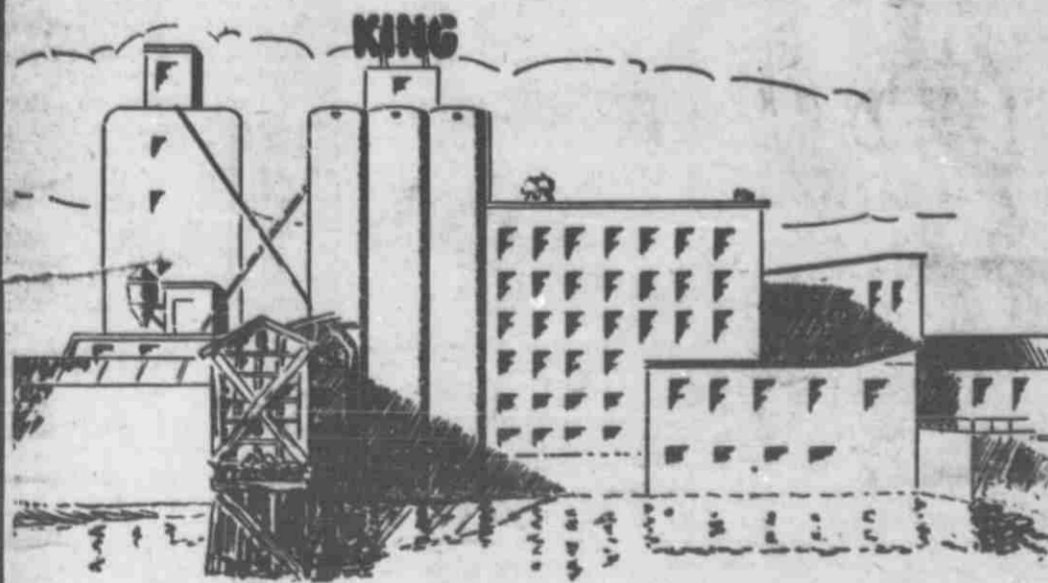

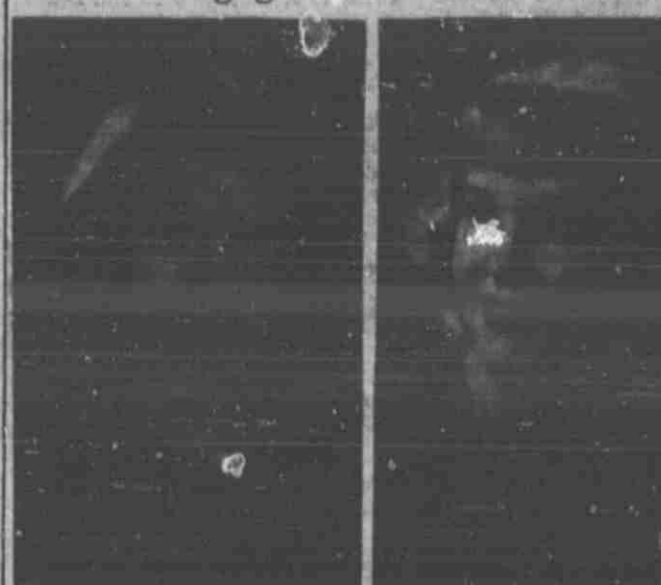
