Hot Cross Buns

Cake Yeast 1/4 Cup Warm Water Cup Scalded Milk 1/4 Teaspoon Salt 1/2 Cup Sugar

1/2 Cup Shortening 4 1/2 Cups Sifted Enriched KING FLAKE FLOUR (about) 3 Egg Yolks

Soften yeast in water. Add scalded milk to salt, sugar and shortening. When lukewarm add yeast and 11/2 cups flour. Beat well and let rise until very light. Add egg yolks and remaining flour. Knead lightly and let rise until doubled in bulk. Roll out dough to 1-inch thickness and cut into rounds. Place 2 inches apart on greased baking shhets and let rise. Glaze the surface of each bun with a little egg white diluted with water. With a sharp knife cut a cross on top of each bun. Bake in hot oven (400°F) about 20 minutes. Just before removing from oven, brush with sugar and water. Fill the cross with a plain frosting. A cup of raisins may be added to the dough if desired. Makes 21/2 dozen.
