The Grand Valley Track Conference was won by East Grand Rapids Friday, Grandville was second, Lee third, Lowell, fourth, Godwin fifth, Wyoming Park sixth, and Rockford seventh. In taking fourth Lowell placed well in several events. Bob Carigan, sophomore, won the mile with the excellent time of 4:49; Leonard Fase, a sophomore, won the low hurdles and placed in the high hurdles. Leonard has broken both high and low hurdle records several times this year. His time of 16.1 is best for the high hurdles and 21.2 is best for the low hurdles. His brother Keith placed fourth in the low hurdles. George Graham placed second in the 3/4 mile with a fast 53.8.

The Lowell sprint Medley team of Dick Stauffer, a senior; Wellington Miller, a freshman; and Leonard and Keith Fase took fourth place. While Dick Stauffer, Keith Fase, George Graham, and Jerry Pollock comprising the 880 yard relay team took fifth.

May 17 (Tuesday) Lowell is host to Ionia, Saranac, and Caledonia in a four-way track meet. This is the first official meet to be run in Lowell this year and should give the local people a good chance to see some of their stars participate. The meet will begin at 4 p. m.

## Sales Tax Return to Village and Townships

Kent county's first quarterly share of the state sales tax rebate for cities, villages and townships is \$536,223.12, Thomas Vidro, county treasurer, reported Thursday.

The sum is based on \$1.86 per capita, up 6 cents from the \$1.80 per capita that brought the county \$518,925.60 for the corresponding quarter a year ago.

The Townships' share will be distributed as follows: Ada, \$3,656.76; Bowne-Alpine, \$5,284.26; Bowne, \$2,049.72; Cannon, \$2,976; Cascade, \$3,145.26; Caledonia, \$2,667.24; Grattan \$1,900; Lowell, \$2,497.98; Vergennes, \$1,413.60. Villages of Caledonia, \$1,151.34; Lowell, \$4,975.26.

## Sixteen Bids Received School Board Accepts Four Bids To Remove Homes for New Building

At a special meeting of the Lowell School Board Wednesday morning, bids for the removal of four houses located on the site of the new Lowell elementary building were opened and voted on.

A total of 16 bids on the four houses were received and the following bids, subject to contract requirements for their removal. The Kinyon house, successful bidder, George Hale. The Wheaton house, successful bidder, E. A. Davis. The Doane house, successful bidder, John Farhni. The Noyes House, successful bidder, Alvin Ketchum. A total of \$501.50 was realized by the school for the sale of the above houses.

## Will Draw Contract

The board instructed Superintendent of Schools, W. W. Gummer to have school attorney George R. Cook draw up contracts with the successful bidders. The Noyes and Doane houses are to be removed by the 25th of June so that construction of the new school can get under way. The Kinyon house and the Wheaton house are to be removed at a time agreed upon by the school board.

The board also instructed Secretary D. A. Wingler to place all bids in the minutes of the school board, and if for any reason any of the successful bidders cannot meet with contract requirements, the contracts will then be awarded to the next highest reliable bidder.

In other business the board voted to accept the resignation of Miss Carolyn Engle, counselor and commercial teacher, who plans to be married. The board voted to send Miss Engle a letter of commendation for her excellent work at the school and all the extra duties she willingly assumed.

At Godwin last Thursday Lowell was victorious with a score of 4-1.

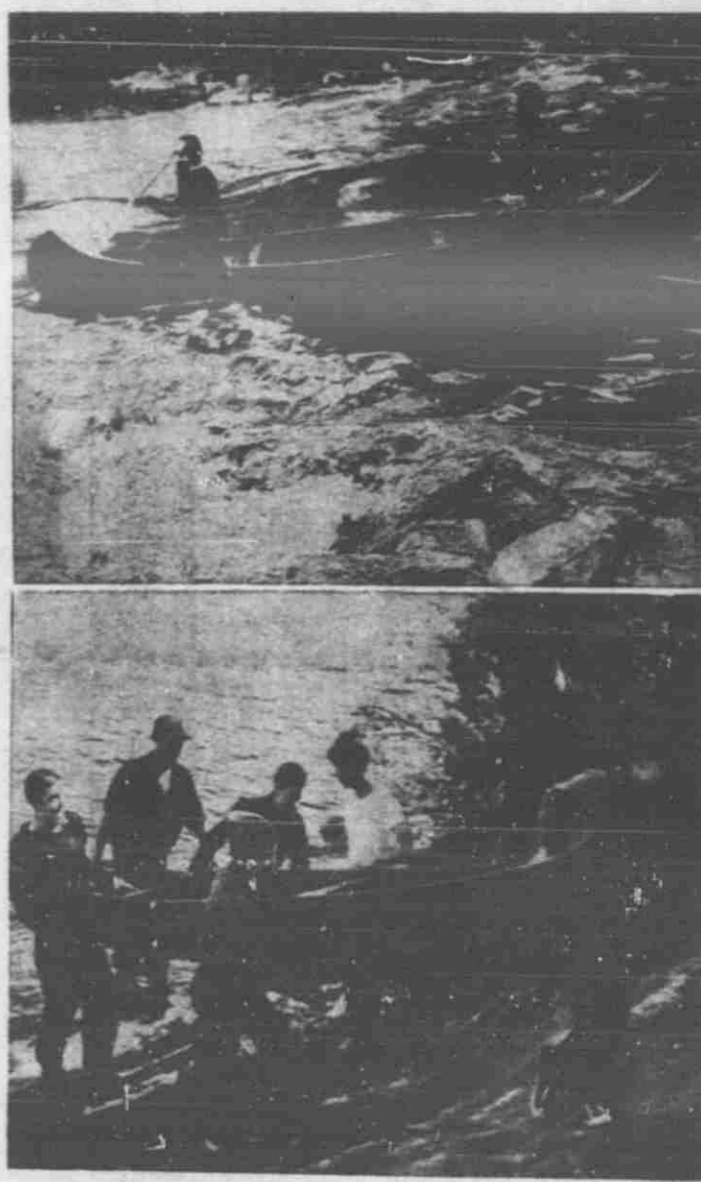

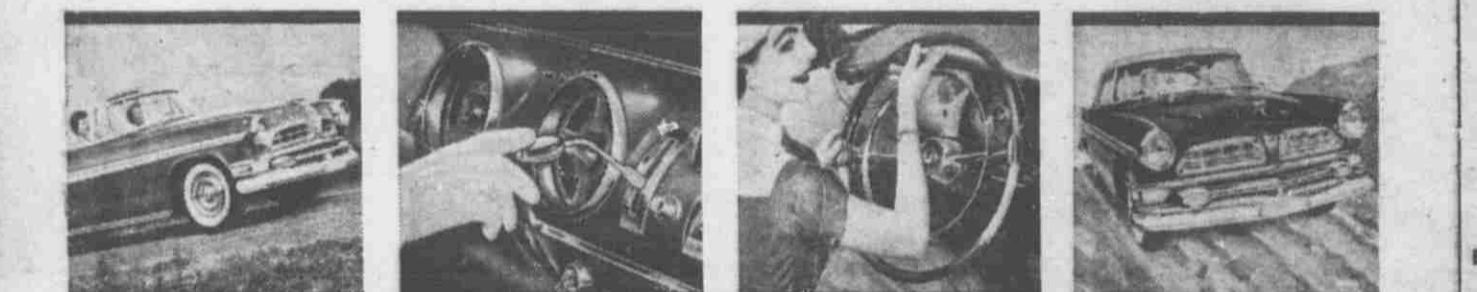
