As all regular broadcasting frequencies will be off the air (in the case of any "Alert") instructions may be obtained through the Central Radio Service, which will issue instructions over two frequencies, 640 and 1240 on your radio dial.

Baird, 42, who was killed instantly early Monday morning when he lost control of the vehicle and it crashed into a tree at Foxes Corner, about two miles north of here on Lincoln Lake road. Investigating officials stated the car skidded 150 feet before striking the tree, in front of the Edwin Mueller place, and traveled another 50 feet sideways after the impact. Funeral services were held at Roth's Chapel Wednesday afternoon, with burial in Oakwood cemetery. Dick, a graduate of Lowell High school, was a member of the Lowell Sportsmen's club, and Moose lodge No. 809. Until recently he and his brother, Charles, had operated a roofing and building business in Lowell, but the partnership was dissolved the first of the year when Charles purchased a lumber business in Hopkins. Besides Charles he is survived by his wife, Verne; two sons, Allen and Bruce, who live with their mother, Mrs. Essie Baird, R-1, and his parents, Mr. and Mrs. James Baird, E. M-21.

William C. Hartman, 74, Veteran Lowell Druggist Dies Suddenly Thursday

Veteran Lowell druggist William C. Hartman, 74, was stricken last Thursday afternoon while at his store on Main st. "Will" as he was known to most persons, although in ill health for many months, had accompanied Mrs. Florence Snay to the store where she was meeting with a salesman to order the new school books for the 1955-56 year. Mrs. Snay, who has worked for Mr. Hartman many years, and has faithfully operated his store since his illness, summoned aid immediately, but the attack was fatal.

Funeral services, under the auspices of the Lowell Masonic Lodge, were held Saturday afternoon at Roth Funeral Home, in interment in Oakwood cemetery.



Mr. Hartman was born in Marcellus and in 1903 came to Lowell to work for W. S. Winegar, and in 1923 became a partner with Mr. Winegar in the drug store. In 1930 he purchased the entire interest, and the store has been known as the Hartman Drug Store since that time.

In July of 1918 he was married to Clara Loretta Lampman of South Lowell; she predeceased him in death on May 2, 1950.

He was a life member of the Lowell Masonic Lodge, of the local Eastern Star Chapter, and also of the Odd Fellows. He was also a member of the Lowell Board of Trade. He was a veteran of the Spanish American War.

Mr. Hartman is survived by several nieces and nephews.

McGraw Tire Co., he was servicing the tire of an earthmoving machine at the Schuster Company garage in Grand Rapids when the rim of the huge tire he was inflating flew off, striking him in the face. Dr. H. J. Kreulen, medical examiner, said Mr. Seese suffered a compound skull fracture.

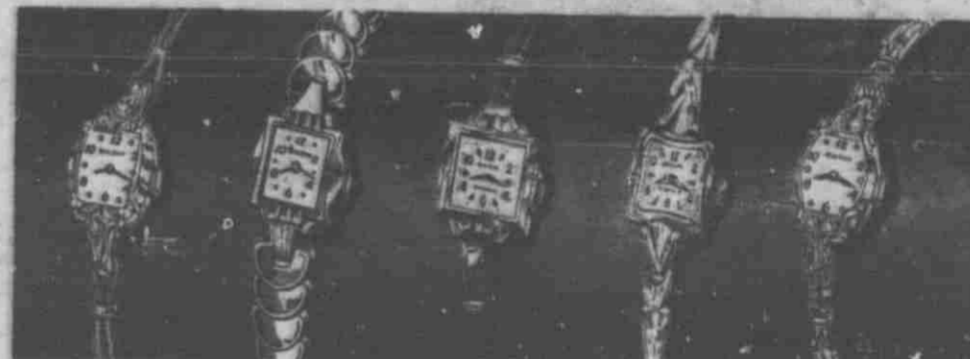

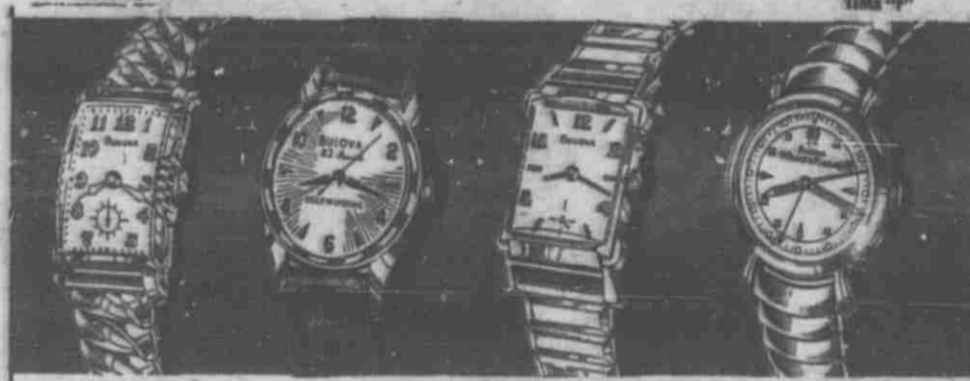
