Baccalaureate In addressing the seniors and some four hundred guests Sunday night on the theme "Doors Into Life," Rev. Norman Woon, pastor of the Lowell Congregational church, based his remarks on three texts taken from the words of three preachers. The preachers and their quotations were: George MacDonald, eminent Scotchman, "The Door into life generally opens behind us"; Jeremiah: "If you have run with men on foot and they have tired you out, then how will you keep up with the horses"; and Eliphaz in the Book of Job: "Thy Words have kept men on their feet."

Rev. Woon explained that parents, teachers and folks in every walk of life had opened the door to the graduates and that the future was in their hands. He called attention to the fact that life was competitive—in the words of the eminent psychologist, William James, was "sweat and effort", and he also asserted that as we reached our goal, there were other goals to conquer.

He insisted that the successful person never reached the stage of do-nothing but that pace of life quickens as we grow older. Rev. Woon also pleaded with the graduates to be ready to help others with words of encouragement and by so doing we are bound to strengthen ourselves. He concluded the excellent address by observing the words of Jesus have kept men on their feet and have been the source of inspiration to countless millions.

Board Approves Bond Resolution School to Handle Sale of Textbooks; Thirty-two Teachers Signed

Plans progressed for the construction of the new Lowell elementary school with the approval of the bond resolution by the school board in their regular meeting Monday night. The resolution, drawn in detail by school attorney George R. Cook, will now go before the State Finance Commission for final approval, then be submitted through financial papers to prospective bond purchasers.

The board also approved plans and specifications for the proposed building, authorizing School Superintendent, W. W. Gumsert to work out final details with the architectural firm of Robinson, Campau and Crow.

Will Handle Book Sale The handling of school textbooks when school resumes in the fall was discussed at length. The school will take over all Lowell textbooks now that the Hartman drugstore will not be open for business. Mr. Gumsert told the board that there is no uniform system throughout the state for the school handling of texts, but plans must be worked out for both new and used books, and that the board would have to decide whether the school should rent or sell them. The board concluded that renting books entailed too many problems of distribution and upkeep. Plans were laid to continue handling the books on a sale basis.

Just New Texts Dr. Thomas Hill, board member, suggested that the school sell only new texts, with used books being offered for sale by individual owners each fall for a short period through some organization, such as the PTA, on a slight handling fee basis. This way, book owners could try to sell their books at a price they themselves set. Board President C. H. Runciman pointed out that the major drawback to this plan might be that some parents would not be able to sell their books, and it was necessary for some families to sell last year's texts to realize enough money for the purchase of the books to be used during the current school year.

In a vote on the question, all board members agreed that the school should take over selling new books, and deferred the question of used texts until the situation can be studied more thoroughly and presented at the next meeting.

Hire 32 Teachers The board also formally hired 32 teachers to fill class room duties for the coming year. The teaching staff is complete except for some vacancies in grade positions and one or two high school openings which will be filled during the summer.

In other votes the board authorized the moving of the school gas storage tank, the replacement of a hot water tank and stove and agreed to textbook changes recommended by the teaching staff.

Horse Show Here This Weekend

The Grand Rapids Riding Club will have its 15th Annual Charity Horse Show at the Lowell 4H Fair Grounds, June 11 and 12.

About 300 horses of all types will enter the horse show. This year the event is sponsored by the Kent County Humane Society. There will be five performances beginning June 11th at 9 a. m., one at 1 p. m. and 7 p. m. The Sunday performances will be at 1 p. m. and 7 p. m.

An outside ring is provided for the Jumping Class which is one of the highlights of the show. A Jumper is graded on its performance in jumping as to the knockdown or failures. Jumping horses may be any breed, they have no qualifications as to type or conformation.

The Riding Club will schedule many other classes, all highly competitive. There will be classes for five-gaited horses, Tennessee Walking horses, Quarter horses, Western Stock, Palominos, equitation and pleasure class. Donald Cederlund is chairman of the show, and Gerrit Buth is president of the club.

Ordinance

AN ORDINANCE TO AMEND THE ORDINANCE ENTITLED "AN ORDINANCE TO PRESERVE THE PUBLIC HEALTH"

Section 1. The ordinance entitled "AN ORDINANCE TO PRESERVE THE PUBLIC HEALTH" passed May 1, 1953, is hereby amended by adding the following sections to be known as Sections 4, 5, 6, 7, 8, 9, 10, 11, 12, 13, 14 and 15:

Section 4. Garbage and Refuse Collection. Inasmuch as the collection of garbage and refuse is available to every resident of the Village of Lowell it is hereby declared to be unlawful to dispose of any garbage or uncombustible refuse in any manner which shall create a health hazard.

Section 5. Waste Material. No waste material shall be stored for collection in any manner that will create a fire hazard. The judgment of the Chief of the Fire Department shall be the determining factor as to the acceptability of any given method of waste storage.

Section 6. Piles of Lumber, Trees and Branches. The accumulation of piles of lumber, trees or branches or other refuse which may serve as a breeding place for rodents and insects, is declared to be unlawful. Should the owner refuse to remove such lumber, trees or branches after written notice so to do by the Village of Lowell, the Village may remove the same and charge the expense thereof to the owner. Should the owner refuse payment thereof, the Village may levy a special tax therefor against said owner's real and personal property.

Section 7. Pollinating Grasses

Section 8. Stagnant Waters. Areas within the Village limits with marsh or stagnant waters, which permit the breeding of insects and mosquitoes shall be controlled by the owners thereof either by spraying or filling such areas. If such areas are not sprayed or filled by the owners, the Village of Lowell is empowered to spray, treat, or fill such areas and charge the owners for the expense thereof. If such owner or owners refuse to pay such expense the Village may levy a special tax therefor against the owner's real and personal property.

Section 9. Manure, Apple Pulp and Other Organic Material. All manure, apple pulp or other organic materials shall be confined to such uses as shall not create an insect breeding area or offensive smells. The presence of flies breeding in any such area shall constitute sufficient evidence of a health hazard. The written complaint of three neighboring residents shall constitute sufficient evidence of a nuisance and health hazard.

Section 10. Holes, Excavations, Pits and Ditches. Holes, excavations, pits and ditches in which water may accumulate and stand shall be filled, covered or barricaded by the owners thereof. This is to prevent danger from contamination and danger due to persons falling thereon.

Section 11. Earth and Sand Banks, Loose Earth, etc. All earth and sand banks, loose earth or other irregularities in the ground which may slide or topple upon children or adults shall be eliminated, securely fenced, or barricaded by the owners thereof. This is to avoid injury to persons.

Section 12. Old Machinery, Junked Automobiles and Other Dangerous Objects. All old machinery, junked automobiles and other dangerous objects shall be removed or securely fenced or barricaded by the owners thereof—this to prevent danger and injury to persons, including children.

Section 13. Abandoned Buildings, Including Sheds and Other Buildings. All abandoned buildings, including sheds and all others, shall be torn down, repaired or securely boarded up by the owners thereof—this to prevent people or children getting into the same and becoming subject to injury. Written notice may be given by the Village at any time to the owners of such abandoned buildings, sheds, etc., so to tear down, repair or secure the same.

Section 14. Any person or persons violating this ordinance shall be punished by a fine of not exceeding One Hundred Dollars (\$100) and costs of prosecution, or by imprisonment in the Kent County Jail for a period not to exceed ninety (90) days, or by both such fine and imprisonment in the discretion of the court.

Section 15. This ordinance is hereby declared to be immediately necessary for the preservation of the public peace, health and welfare of the people of the Village of Lowell and is hereby ordered to take immediate effect.

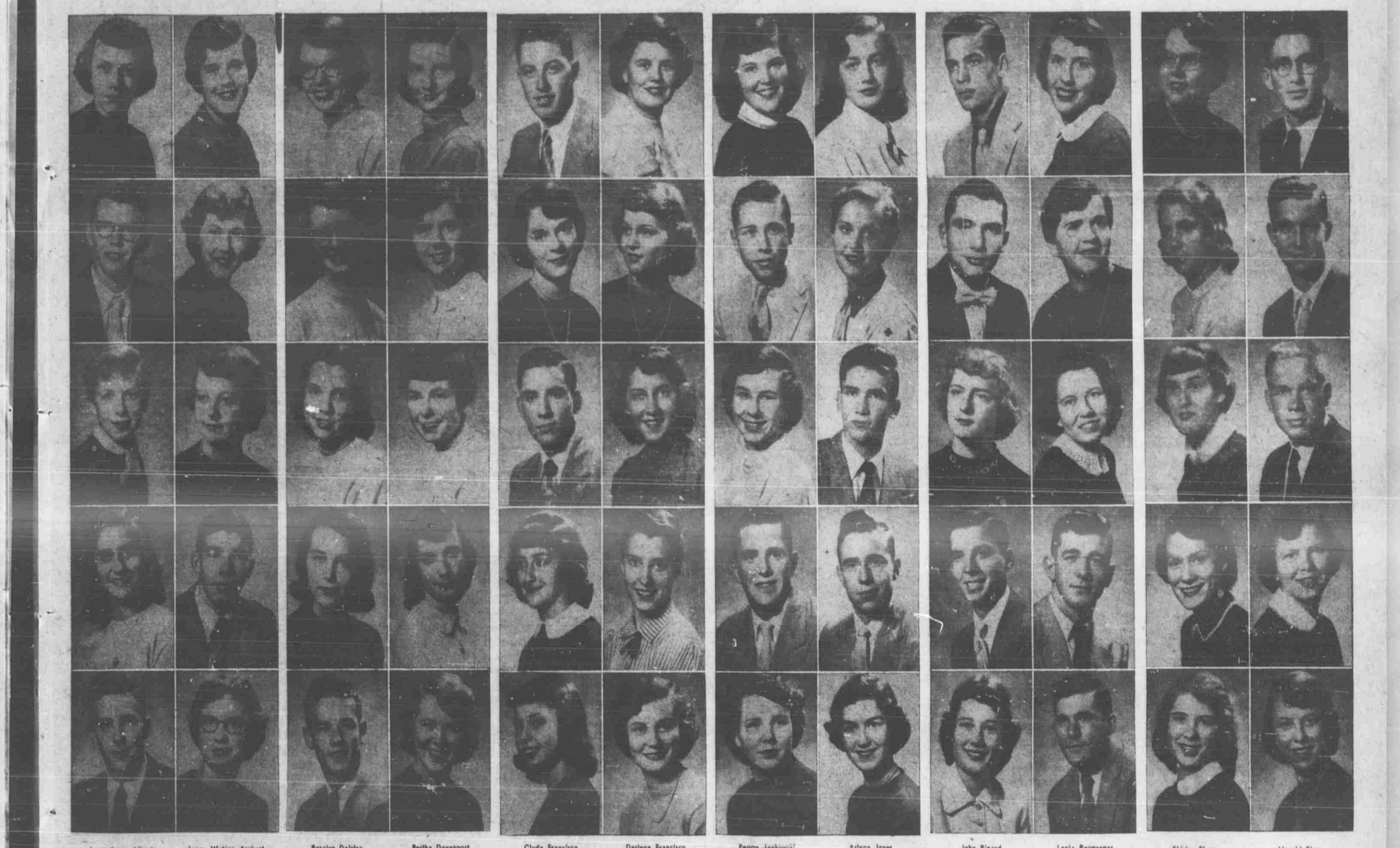
