## Death Deals Double Blow Richard Wester and Chicago Buddy Die as Car Flips; Girl Injured

An Alto youth and his former Army buddy were killed late Saturday night, and a 16-year-old girl was injured, when the car in which they were riding went out of control on Riverside drive, just north of the Lowell village limits, skidded, hit two trees, flipped end for end, and landed upside down on the lawn of the Robert B. Weaver residence.

A road-block Tuesday evening at the corner of M91 and M21 in Lowell, was instigated by Lowell Police officers in an alert caused by the escape of a 19-year-old convicted murderer from Ionia Reformatory earlier in the afternoon.

James Vincent Ecker, serving a life sentence, managed his escape in a carton holding a desk made in the reformatory furniture factory; he cut a hole in the carton while it was enroute by truck to the railroad station. As of Wednesday morning he had not been apprehended.

Parking on Main st. has been blocked in certain areas during the week in order to repaint the parking spaces, and yellow curb lines for no-parking areas.

Richard Wester, 22 of Alto, and Donald Johnson, 22 of Chicago, were killed instantly. The coroner's report named the cause of Richard's death to be traumatic shock and fractured neck; the Chicago boy's death was listed as multiple fractures, brain damage and traumatic shock. Both bodies were thrown clear of the wreckage.

Miss Doris Kiste, daughter of Mrs. George Richter, Nash ave., was found beneath the wreckage; she is a patient at Blodgett Memorial hospital in Grand Rapids, suffering bad face cuts; hospital authorities reported her condition as "good" late Tuesday.

George DeGraw answered the call concerning the accident at 11:45 p. m., and Police Chief Frank Stephens, Sheriff's Deputies Rigney and Moreau conducted the investigation. The car, a 1952 model hardtop, was registered under Donald Johnson's name, but as of this writing it is not certain who was actually driving the vehicle when it went out of control. This will not be determined until Miss Kiste is able to be questioned.

The two boys were Army buddies, and had only been discharged from service this Spring. Wester had been working for the Newell Mfg Company here, and his Chicago friend had been a frequent visitor at his Alto home.

Funeral services for the Alto boy were held at the Roth chapel Tuesday afternoon; interment in Bowne Center cemetery.

Richard is survived by his parents, Mr. and Mrs. Julius Wester; his paternal grandparents, Mr. and Mrs. Henry Wester; and maternal grandparents, Mr. and Mrs. John Anderson, all of Alto.

### Exploit Qualifications Of School Elector

In another column of this paper will be found the official notice for the registration of electors who are not now qualified but who wish to qualify for the right of franchise in Graded School District Number One, Township of Lowell. A school elector, who lives in the district, qualifies or loses the right to vote as he qualifies or loses the right in the village or township.

Each year the secretaries of these units of government notify the secretary of the Board of Education to add or subtract from the list of voters maintained by the school district. The law, however, provides that the secretary of the Board of Education must announce the registration of those who wish to qualify for school elections by the village and township clerks.

It is to be noted that voters who are now qualified in either of these two units are qualified in the school district also.

### Vote June 25 on Wheat Referendum

Polling places for the June 25 wheat referendum have been established in 24 wheat growing communities in Kent County. Chairman Harold Storey of the Kent County Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation Committee advises.

Official polling places for Lowell township is the Alto Library which also serves Bowne and Caledonia townships. Malone's store in Parnell is the designated place for voters of Ada, Cannon, Grattan and Vergennes townships. The polls will be open from 8:00 a. m. to 7:00 p. m. A referendum committee of three wheat growers eligible to vote in the referendum have been named in each community to conduct the referendum. Any wheat producer who will have more than 15 acres of wheat for harvest as grain in 1956 is eligible to vote.

According to Mr. Storey, Kent County has a total of 425 wheat farmers having an allotment of more than 15 acres who are eligible to vote in the referendum according to records on file in the Kent County ASC Committee Office. Each of these have been notified of the farm wheat acreage allotment for 1956. Growers not listed may vote and their vote will be counted if they can establish their right to do so.

### Railroad Landmark Closes in Segwun



With over 50 years of service keeping trains on the Grand Trunk Railroad and the Chesapeake and Ohio from meeting at the track crossing, Malta Tower, located in Segwun, gave way to progress last Monday at four p. m. when a new "automatic interlocking plant" (left) took over the duties of the five operators who manned the tower on an around-the-clock basis. M. R. Wood (insert picture) was the last full time operator to be stationed at the tower.

Thousands of Lowell residents for more than half a century have probably at one time or another taken a trip around the bridges crossing Grand river, and passed through Segwun without noticing Malta tower, or at least without thinking about the important functions carried out at the post.

Day and night for the past 25 years there has always been a telegraph operator on duty, relaying messages down the line.

Prior to 1930, Malta operated with levers whose sole function was to keep the crossing clear. In that year, telegraph operators were installed and Malta was a relay station for passing on orders, and sending out telegrams during the evening and night hours.

Progress first took its toll more than a year ago, when telegrams were sent into Grand Rapids and billed with monthly phone bills. Now the tower will be completely abandoned and probably torn down as the shiny new interlocking plant with \$30,000 worth of wiring assumes automatic control of the intersection.

There have been few changes in operators at the tower over the years since railroad men have a strong loyalty to the railroad. Until the last few years there were only three operators on duty until two additional men were added so that all work could only a five-day week.

Robert G. Crouch holds the distinction of the most years of duty at the tower, with twenty-four and one-half years before he transferred to Grand Rapids last fall.

M. R. Wood, who has been stationed at the tower for the past twelve years will now go into semi-retirement along with the demise of the tower. Mr. Wood completed 50 years of service with the C & O Railroad last May, and will continue working on a part time basis, filling jobs as a replacement as needed.

Other operators, Dale Page, Ralph Mullen and Emil Paulsen, have been transferred to posts elsewhere with the railroad.

Mr. and Mrs. John Schneider are very efficient sponsors for this group of young people.

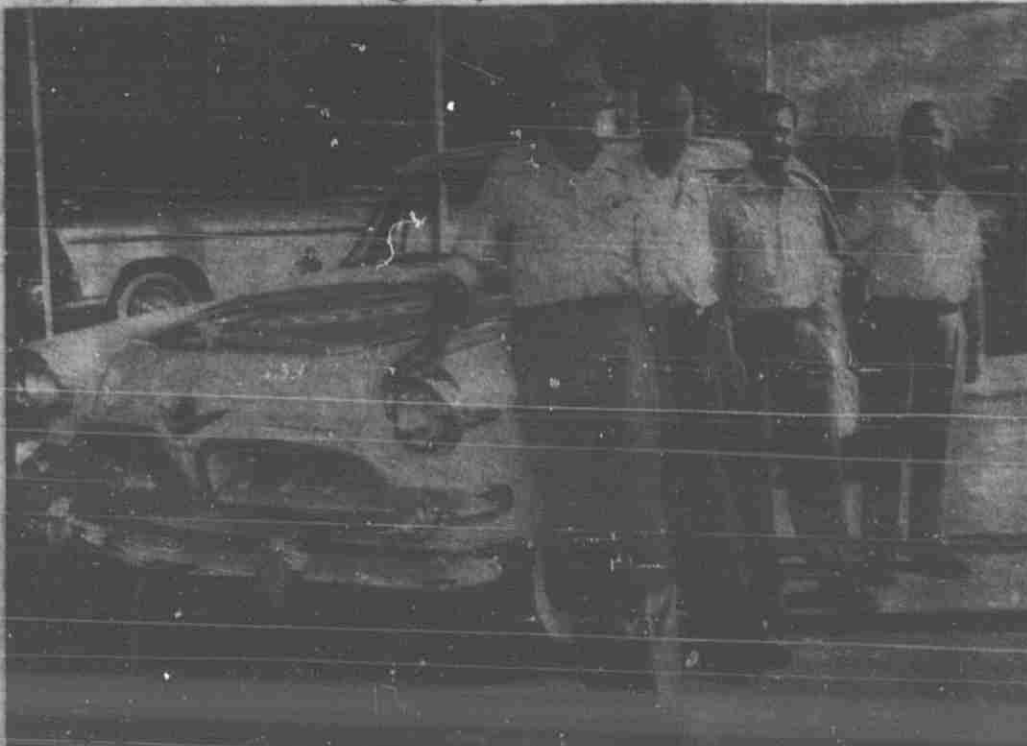
