Think Lightning Killed Steer Found in River

The carcass of an 800 pound steer was found in Flat river Tuesday morning at the King Mill Dam in Lowell. The critter was from a herd of 100 Herefords owned by H. M. Hendricks who operates the Riverview Farms two miles north of Lowell on Flat River road. The steer was removed by wrecker and buried.

Mr. Hendricks did not know that the animal was missing from the herd until he was notified Tuesday. It is assumed the animal must have been struck by lightning while standing in the river. The carcass was seen floating in the river Monday evening before the severe electrical storm hit Lowell, and its state of decomposition was such that it may have been killed in the severe storm a week ago, Monday, August 22.

Runciman to Ship Beans Through Muskegon Port

The name "Runciman" is making the news over in Muskegon where that town's paper, "The Chronicle", states the Port of Muskegon will be handling shipment of approximately 2,000 tons of navy beans for C. H. Runciman Company for consignment to Antwerp, The Netherlands, and other foreign ports. The beans will be shipped through the Muskegon port, via the Seaway, and then overseas.

Previous exports have been handled by rail to Montreal, thence overseas, the story continues, and use of this West Michigan port by the Lowell firm was quoted as "very gratifying" by the members of the Muskegon harbors department.

It is estimated that the Runciman company can save approximately \$6 a ton in shipping costs by using this port rather than their former method of export.

Announce Change In School Hours

Superintendent of Schools W. W. Gunser has announced that high school and grade classes will open a quarter of an hour earlier this year. Recitations will start at 8:45 a. m., rather than 9 o'clock.

The grades through the eighth will have a noon hour of from 11:45 to 1:00, and the school hot lunch program will serve these students between 11:45 and 12:15. The noon hour for the high school students will be from 12:15 to 1:00, and the school hot lunch program will be open to these upper four grades during this entire period.

Special Period

There will be a special 20-minute period during the day for the high school and an effort will be made to have all "extra activities" held at this time. The period will also enable students to confer with teachers about their various problems and lessons.

The grade classes will be dismissed at 3:30 and the high school at 4 o'clock as heretofore.
