The Lowell Village Council in a late meeting on Tuesday night took preliminary action to bond the village for construction of water and sewer mains on most of the village streets not now having that service. Attorney R. M. Shivel discussed the proposed bond ordinance with the council. In the preliminary plans sewers are planned for: Grove, Beach to West; Foreman, Beach to West; Beach, Foreman to North; Suffolk, Riverside to Amity; Amity, Suffolk to Mercer; Howard, Riverside to West; Spring, Smith to Vergennes; Myrtle, Grand to Ot-

tawa; Brush, Creek to Ottawa; Hudson, Grand to Boves; Boves, Hudson to John; Center, Main South; Center, Main to Heffron; Sibley, Main to West; West, Sibley to Heffron. Sherman, Washington to Monroe; Grant, Washington to Monroe; Washington, Grant to Fremont; Jefferson, Bend North; North, Jefferson to Jackson; Jackson, North to King; King, Monroe to Washington; Jackson, Front to Kent; Division, High North; High, Division East; James, Main North, Division, Main South; Washington, Avery to North.

Two Bids Opened For Lowell Paving

Bids were opened in Lansing Wednesday for the bituminous concrete paving of Highways M-91 and M-21 in and approaching Lowell. Only two bids were received, from Grand Rapids Asphalt Paving in the amount of \$99,001.15 and the Michigan Corprovia Company for \$100,063.33.

The Ledger went to press too soon to report to whom the State Highway Department let the job, but Municipal Utilities Superintendent Thomas Moore was in Lansing for the opening of the bids, and therefore was able to report the above information.

This work, which is to be completed by November 15, will cover Main st. with bituminous concrete, and will extend east on M-21 about a half mile out of the village; and on M-91 (Hudson st.) resurfacing will extend from Main to Spring st.

Dairymen Still Use Scrub Bulls

Twenty-four per cent of Michigan's dairy farmers still are using scrub bulls. That's what a Michigan State University survey indicates. MSU Extension Dairyman Donald L. Murray, who compiled the survey information, said the results also indicated that:

Thirty per cent of the 236 farmers surveyed were using artificial breeding, 28 per cent were using registered bulls with production records on their ancestry, 18 per cent used purebreds with little or no information on production of ancestry.

That means 58 per cent were using the services of well bred bulls and 42 per cent had sires of unknown quality.

Murray termed this an improvement over the number of scrub bulls used by Michigan dairymen 20 years ago. But he expressed surprise at the large number of inferior sires in use.

Our Congressman Visits Gruenther At NATO Headquarters Near Paris

What actually happens when a member of Congress appears at NATO headquarters for a conference with General Gruenther and his allied nation staff? After the half-hour drive from Paris you arrive at the area in an American-made car which gets through the well-guarded gate without difficulty. Flags from all the NATO nations are flown on the lawn in front of a functional-type building. Without delay or formality you are whisked directly to General Gruenther's private office which is about the size of a modest American home living room. Charts and maps of Europe from the Scandinavian countries to Turkey cover much of the wall space.

General Gruenther himself is a friendly, informal person of medium build but trim build. He is most anxious to lay before you the full picture, not only the progress which has been made in 4 years, the headaches now, but also the future good and bad. The General has appeared before my committee several times in Washington plus the conference at NATO headquarters. On each occasion I have been impressed with his vast knowledge of not only the military situation but the interrelated economic and political problems involving the U. S. and our European allies. He is candid and factual to the highest degree.

Such a conference lasts about an hour. He points with pride to the progress NATO has made to the defense of the Free World. Among many he mentioned one simple but dramatic case. Four years ago when NATO was in its infancy it took General Gruenther 12 hours to get Oslo, Norway on the telephone from Paris headquarters and part of the telephone lines went through the Soviet Zone of Germany. You can visualize how the Russians could easily tap the wires in those hectic days. Today a phone call from NATO headquarters goes through to Oslo in three minutes with no assistance or rather interference from the Soviets.

These conferences with NATO commanders didn't end my day. For four hours I had several conferences and briefings on strictly U. S. Armed Forces matters in the European Theatre. Personnel, fiscal and accounting problems rather than strategic military matters took up most of my time in those meetings. Needless to say the day, a full one, was both interesting and productive.

Swamped With Beginners School Enrollment Up Over 5% As Record 1114 Register Here Tuesday

Total enrollment in Lowell Public Schools Tuesday, opening day, showed an increase of more than 50 students over last year. The greatest increase is found in the early grades where the kindergarten is swamped with 82 youngsters, the largest group ever to enter Lowell schools.

From the kindergarten to the 8th grade there are 547 students, and the high school enrolled 433. Last year the public school accepted 935 students, and this year the figure will no doubt rise over the 980 students registered Tuesday afternoon.

Nation Notes Rise In Households; Cause: Economics

The Census Bureau has just reported that 900,000 new households were formed in the United States in the 12 months ended last April 30. But, as the Bureau hastened to add, the number of really new households wasn't that large. The figure was inflated by the fact that a lot of old households were just sorting themselves out.

The new-household figure was 50 per cent larger than the previous year's reported rise, and nearly 100,000 greater than the average for the first four years of this decade. Yet it is far below the 1,525,000-a-year average of the "undoubling" years right after World War II ended.

The significance of the report must be found in economics, rather than in population figures. A household, to the Census Bureau, is a set of related people who occupy one dwelling unit. One-third of last year's 900,000 new households, for example, are recorded as headed by women. Those, in most cases, are simply families headed by widows or divorcees who had been living with relatives to save expenses. Now they have better jobs—or the children find jobs, in these full-employment days—and they move out and set up their own households.

Married couples living with relatives have also dipped to a record low of 3.5 per cent. This figure has been falling steadily since 1947.

All in all, it looks as if worry over the vast supply of new housing were premature, as long as incomes hold up at present levels.

Read Fine Print On Food Labels

To conserve the family food dollar when buying pre-packaged meat it is well always to read the fine print on the container and it is also profitable to do some comparative figuring. This is the advice to meat-conscious housewives from G. S. McIntyre, director of the Michigan Department of Agriculture. The responsibility of food sanitation, proper labeling of edibles, grading and marketing is entrusted to the Bureau of Foods & Standards within the Department.

Fancy Description
Department inspectors are currently encountering a brash of cases where ground beef or hamburger is being pre-packaged and sold as "steaks". Often fanciful descriptions and coined names crop out on the labels.

The Michigan Department of Agriculture is demanding proper identification of the pre-packaged product and proper labeling. But the housewife can do something about this herself. She can carefully read all the print on the package. Declaration of contents plus net weight or numerical count must show. Read the fine print!

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Grandpa Isn't Foolin'; "Good Old Days" Were Mighty Rugged Ones

Grandpa isn't just spinning yarns when he talks about "my rugged days in school." Fact is, according to Michigan Department of Health records, young folks can thank their lucky charms that it's 1955, not 1900.

You see, back a half century ago, about one death out of every three was someone 15 years of age or younger.

Diseases going around at the turn of the century often meant much more than a few days out of class. Liphtheria, for one example, hit 2,706 Michigan people in 1900, compared with only 57 new cases reported in the state last year. Measles and whooping cough combined killed 650 in 1900 but took only 34 Michigan lives in 1954.

Sanitation, immunization and modern treatment methods are given the credit for cornering the ails, but no communicable disease can be counted completely out. Most of the diseases, may be merely marking time, waiting for the pressure to let up. One of the worst hazards is complacency. The rugged days of Grandpa's youth may never return. But if the one-time communicable disease killers should slip back to power, they could make rough going for generations now in Michigan classrooms.
