





Beat eggs until thick and lemon-colored. Gradually beat in sugar and nutmeg. Blend in shortening. Add flour alternately with milk, using only enough flour to make a soft dough. Turn out on lightlyfloured board or pastry cloth. Knead gently about 30 seconds. Roll out about 1/2 in. thick. Cut with floured doughnut cutter. Fry in deep fat (375 degrees F.) until brown, a b o u t 11/2 minutes on each side. Drain well. While still warm, coat with granulated sugar. Makes about 3 dozen doughnuts.


