July 23-28 Set For '56 Showboat; View 2 Problems

Dates for the 1956 Showboat have been set for the week of July 23 through July 28. This week was decided at a recent meeting of the directors of the Showboat Corporation.

The directors re-elected Norman E. Borgerson as president of Showboat corporation for 1956. Others named to office were: Elmer Schaefer, vice-president; Theron Richmond, secretary; Dan Wingeier, treasurer; and C. H. Runelman was named chairman of the Showboat entertainment committee.

Two Main Problems

Mr. Borgerson stated the directors have two main problems under study this year, namely, a new seating and ticket pricing system, and the planning of a special feature for the Monday night's show, to attract better sales. Empty seats on the first two nights of Showboat have been a problem in the past, coupled with the necessity of turning away people at the end of the week.

Give \$200 to Pool

The directors voted to donate an initial \$200 to the Community Swimming Pool Fund, and S. J. Wingeier was named liaison agent between the Showboat and the Lions Club to work on the project.

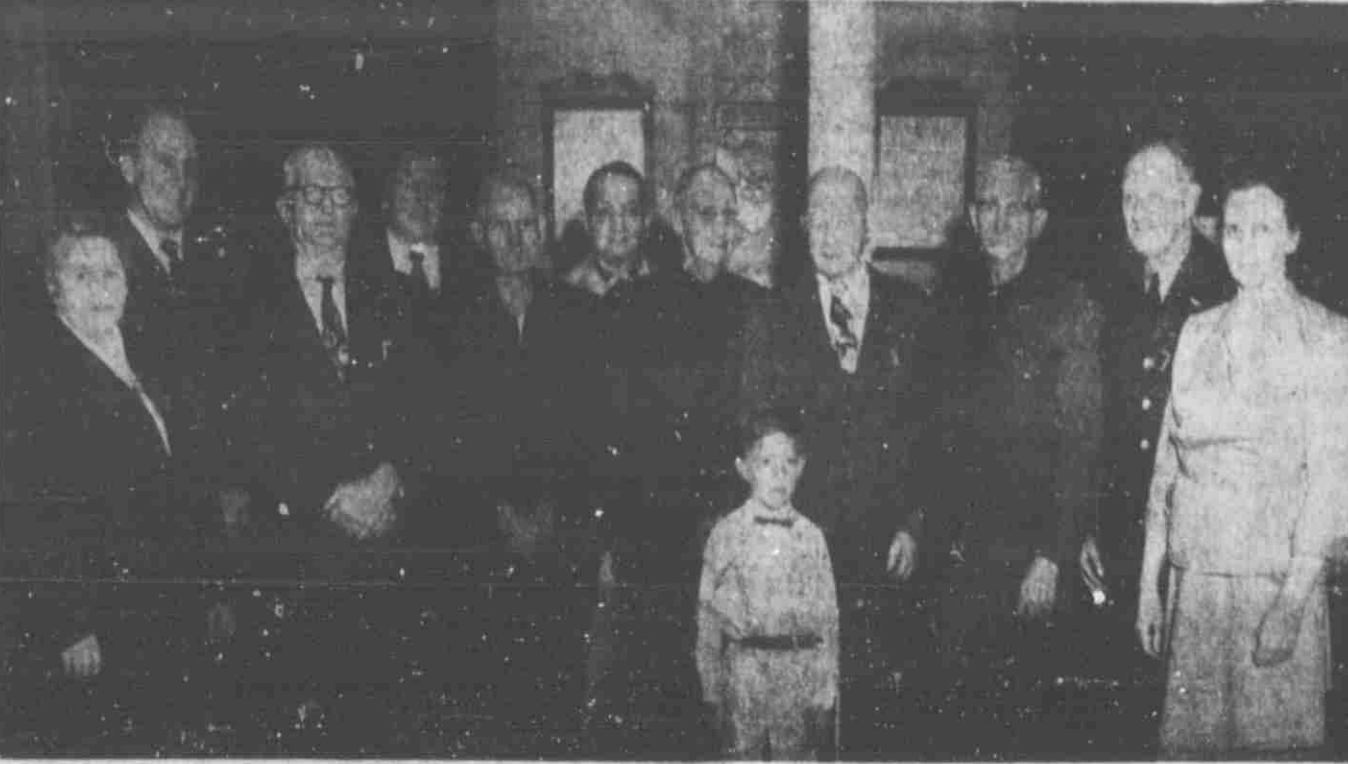

Village to Receive \$3,888.90 for Streets

Lowell is to receive, as its share of weight and gasoline taxes, collected during the last three months of 1955, \$3,473.38, with an additional \$415.52. The latter figure is our share of the total \$8,476,267.06 raised by the Act 87 just passed in 1955, raising the tax from 4 1/2 to 6 cents on certain types of trucks.

This money is allocated for expenditure by incorporated villages and cities for expenditure on their roads and streets. Other cities in this area, and their share of the proceeds of both taxes, are: Clarksville, \$849.10 plus 101.59; Freeport, \$1,361.29 plus \$162.84; and Saranac \$1,815.68 plus \$217.21.

Kent County also gets a portion of the net proceeds collected for work on county roads, and their cut is \$465,039.38 and \$56,671.04, compared with our neighbor, Ionia's \$95,030.28 and \$11,710.58.

Five Trustee Candidates Contest in Primary Election Monday

The five persons pictured above are all candidates for the three positions on the Citizens ticket for a two-year term on the village council as trustee. The voters will decide Monday, Feb. 20, at the village primary, which of the five will appear on the general election ballot for the Citizens party on March 12.

Aside from the contest mentioned above, there are also two candidates on this ticket for the job of assessor, namely, Clinton W. Johnson and Leo Sullivan.

A complete slate of candidates lacking only a treasurer, have been filed by the Peoples Party, with no contest, and only the allotted number of candidates have filed for the positions of village president, and treasurer: on the citizens ticket. The Citizens party has no candidate for village clerk.

Filing for Peoples Party are Peter Speerstra, 4th president; Laura E. Shepard, incumbent, clerk; Theo E. Bailey, assessor; and three village trustees, William M. Jones, Jr., Jay Boelens, and G. R. "Butch" Thompson. Dr. Orval I. McKay will seek the presidency on the Citizens Party, and Esther Fahrni incumbent treasurer is seeking re-election.

Meet the Incumbents

Mrs. Lyla Johnson, pictured first reading left to right, is seeking re-election to a second term as village trustee. Mrs. Johnson, first woman to be elected to village council, has served the finance and budget committees, and was foremost in the movement to create a full-time clerk's position, rather than the part-time position it has been in the past. Mrs. Johnson has lived in Lowell 30 years, is the widow of L. E. Johnson, former village clerk, and has served the Township as Treasurer since 1943. She is a past matron of Cyclamen Chapter No. 94, O. E. S., and the Lowell Methodist church; was a school board member in Wayland during his residence there.

Jack Tornga will seek election to the position to which he was appointed last July, when Dr. D. H. Oatley resigned from the Council to move to Calumet. Jack has served as chairman of the water and sewer committee during his term, and is employed by the General Exchange Insurance Corporation in this area. A graduate of Michigan State's school of business administration and public service, Mr. Tornga states he is interested in improvement of streets, expansion of park and recreational facilities, and more effective traffic control.

Other Contenders

One of the three other candidates seeking election as trustee, but none of whom are incumbents, is Howard Clack, a Bible salesman for the International Book Company. He moved to Lowell five years ago from Grand Rapids. He is a member of the Cyclamen chapter No. 94, O. E. S., and the Lowell Methodist church; was a school board member in Wayland during his residence there.

Louis W. Kingsley, former village

clerk for six years, is also a candidate. He stated to the Ledger Monday that he is running for the Council because he feels he is experienced in the procedures of village activities because of his former duties as clerk, and as he is not in complete accord with all policies of the present Council, would like to take an active part in the government of the village. Mr. Kingsley has lived in Lowell since 1942, is a past commander of the Clark-Ellis Post 152, American Legion, a past master of Lowell Lodge F&AM No. 90, and served as vice president of the Lowell P. T. A. for two years.

Dr. Harold R. Myers, pictured extreme right, has been an osteopathic physician in Lowell for 14 years. Dr. Myers told the Ledger he feels that the people of Lowell should have more to say about activities of the village council, and should know more about what is going on. As a Lowell businessman he would like to become more active in the administration of vil-

Zoning Change in Cascade Township Rejected by Board at Monday Meet

It was "standing room only" at the regular monthly meeting of the Cascade Township board meeting last Monday evening. Approximately 60 residents turned out to hear the board's decisions on zoning variations in the township, recommended by the zoning board.

At last month's meeting of the zoning board, it was decided to make the following recommendations to the township board: 1. US-16 to be rezoned commercial except for one-half mile southeast of the Cascade bridge and a small area south of Burton st. 2. Change Walker property on Laraway Lake rd. to commercial and allow the American Legion to build a clubhouse at that location; and 3. to rezone the A. E. Kern property on US-16 to commercial for the purpose of building a motel.

Residents along US-16 were well represented and voiced immediate dissent to the first proposal before the board. Supervisor Gerrit Baker allowed the property owners a voice and a petition against the proposal was drawn up and circulated through the audience. It was signed by all US-16 residents present and several other property owners who also attended the meeting. This petition will become part of the township records.

One of the board members, Miller Cook, mentioned the advantages of rezoning the highway and stated that only a large commercial section in the township would present the future tax rate from becoming a burden. Cook pointed out that new homes in the area would, although a definite asset to the community, only serve to bring in more children and cause the school tax to spiral constantly upward. He mentioned the Rogers school district in Grand Rapids as an example, where because of lack of business and industry, the tax rate is now 85 mills.

The board decided, because of the general sentiment of the property owners present, to disapprove the proposed variation by the zoning board.

Supervisor Baker pointed out that the matter of rezoning this section of the township could again come before the board if a petition circulated by citizens of the township.

Also Rejected Others

The remaining recommendations from the zoning board were also turned down by the board after the reading of an opinion from Judge Dale Souter. The opinion of the judge concerned the legality of spot zoning in the township and as a precedent, the case of a proposed boat launch within the township was mentioned. The board took the position that if spot zoning was illegal in that instance it was consequently illegal in the case of the Walker and Kern property also.

Designate Precincts

Under the new State election laws, any township having 800 or more registered voters, must be divided into two precincts. In compliance with the new ruling, the Cascade board used US-16 as the dividing line for the township. Precinct 1 consists of the area North of the highway and Precinct 2, South.

Two voting places will be in operation at the next election, residents of the First Precinct voting in the Town Hall and those from the Second Precinct voting in the Township Firehouse.

Baker stated that all electors will be notified of the change by mail.

The board expressed their appreciation for the work done by the Volunteer Firemen and the good job they have done in keeping fire loss to a minimum in the Cascade area.


