- 4 Cups Sifted Enriched King Flake Flour
- 2 1/2 Teaspoons Soda
- 2 1/2 Teaspoons Salt
- 1 Cup Shortening
- 1 Cup Sugar
- 1 Cup Molasses
- 3 Eggs
- 1 Tablespoon Vinegar
- 2 Teaspoons Shredded Orange Rind



Sift together flour, soda and salt. Cream together shortening and sugar until light and fluffy. Add molasses, eggs and vinegar. Mix well. Add flour mixture and orange rind to creamed mixture and mix until smooth. Chill dough. Roll out 1/4 inch thick on floured board or pastry cloth. Cut with floured cookie cutter. Bake on ungreased baking sheets in moderate oven (375°F.) 10 to 13 minutes.

Note—Dough may be dropped by teaspoonfuls on ungreased baking sheets. This method gives a softer, somewhat chewy cookie.

Makes about 5 dozen 3-inch cookies.

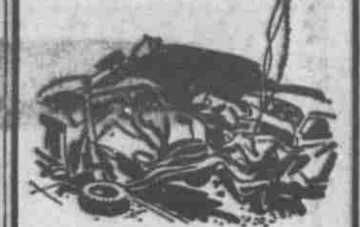

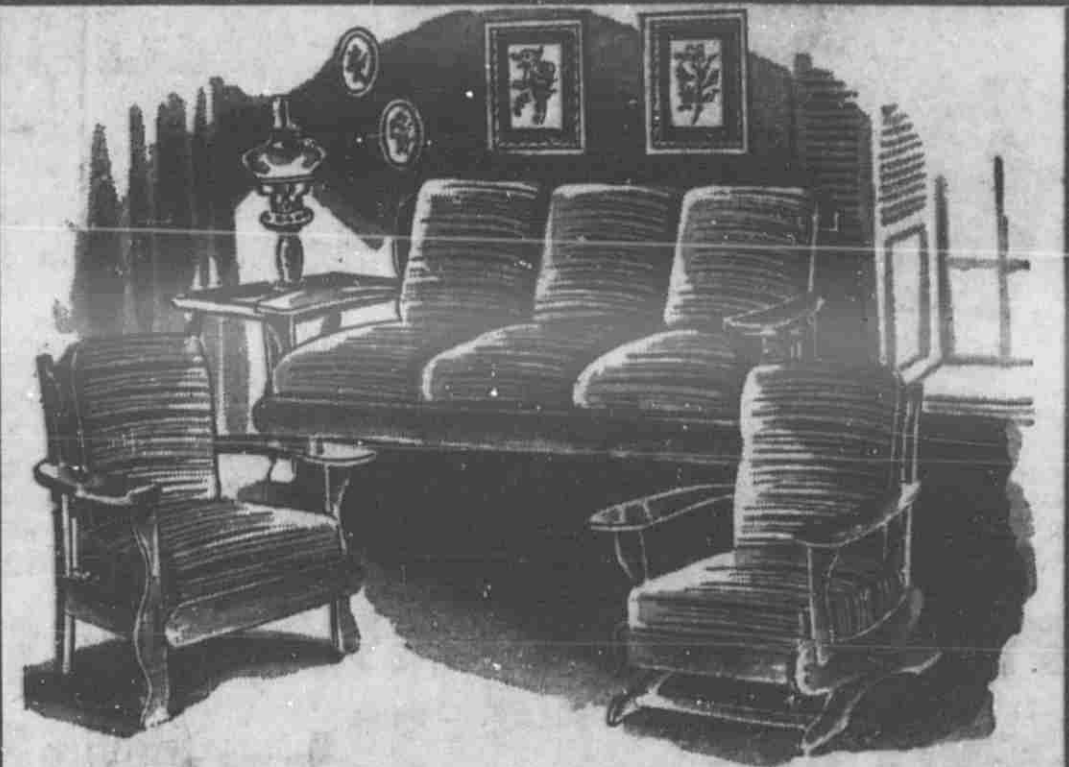
