

## Lowell School Bus Takes Nose Dive; No Passengers



Last Friday afternoon, after delivering its load of students home to enjoy a week's vacation for the Easter holiday, this Lowell school bus took a nose dive into the Lundberg cattle viaduct under M-21, just west of Lowell. The accident occurred about 5 o'clock when Orval Jessup, instrumental music instructor who was driving the bus back to Lowell, hit the rear of a car driven by Chester Henry Swanson, \$211 Cascade road, Ada, as the Swanson car slowed down to make a right-hand turn into the Melody Farm driveway. Thick wet snow blanketed this area Friday, and the roads were slick, Mr. Jessup told authorities investigating the accident that he was unable to go around the Swanson car because of an oncoming vehicle. After striking the car ahead he lost control of the bus, and it swerved across the road, into the left ditch, and nosed down into the underpass. The left rear of the Swanson car was damaged to the extent of \$50-\$100 according to Frack Stephens, who investigated the accident for the county sheriff's department, and ticketed Mr. Jessup for falling to stop within an assured clear distance ahead. Weither Mr. Swanson nor his wife, who was the only passenger in the car, were hurt; Mr. Jessup also escaped without harm. At a meeting of the school board Tuesday it was decided to repair the 6-year-old bus, inasmuch as estimates of damage in the neighborhood of \$400 were not felt to be excessive. An auxiliary bus will be available to transport students until the damaged vehicle is ready to go back into service.
