Definite Safety Measures Taken During 1955-56 for School Children

A program sparked by the Lowell Parent-Teachers Association to promote better safety conditions for the school children has resulted in definite improvements in many ways during this school year. The School Safety Council, with Jack Howe as spokesman, reported the fine results to the April meeting of the P. T. A. and also the Village Council were informed at their regular meeting last Monday night of the success of the program.

Mr. Howe, with Carroll Burch,

Superintendent W. W. Gumber and Police Chief F. L. Stephens, were named to the Safety Council of the School when the P. T. A. submitted their recommendations for needed safety measures early this year. The School Council has worked with the P. T. A. and Village Council since that time.

Two regular meetings of the P. T. A. last Fall were devoted entirely to the problem of promoting better safety conditions, and as a result the safety committee of the P. T. A., chaired by Mrs. Harold Nash, came up with 7 needed improvements. Of these Mr. Howe reports definite improvement in 6 instances.

Mr. Howe reports these results:

1. The P. T. A. recommended controlling traffic on Lafayette street. This street is now going to be closed during crucial hours of the school day, for a 2-week test period (see story of Monday Council meeting on first page of this week's Ledger).

2. It was recommended that buses be delayed in departing from Lafayette st. while other buses are still loading. This step is now being followed.

3. The P. T. A. suggested yellow lines at cross walks near the school be extended to allow unobstructed view of oncoming cars. Mr. Howe, who is also sponsor of the safety patrol of the school, states that weather permitting all yellow lines at cross walks are to be extended and repainted as suggested.

4. Recommended policing of streets adjacent to school for "hot rod" drivers has resulted in many tickets being issued.

5. A traffic signal light is being installed at Main and Hudson the week of May 21, to provide the safe passage across Main street for children in the southwest section of town as recommended. For the children of the southeast section a blinker light is being secured (see Council story) by the P. T. A., with the assistance of other Civic groups in the community, will maintain this safety measure.

6. Recommended supervision of playgrounds has been satisfactorily handled by cooperation of the parents and teachers.

7. The last step suggested, that of deputizing citizens,
