Announce Many Appointments Council Approves \$84,500 Budget For 1956; Sets 8 Mill Tax Levy

At their regular meeting Monday evening, the Lowell Village Council okayed an \$84,500 budget presented by the finance committee William Jones, Jay Boelens and Jack Fonger.

The Council voted a tax millage of 8 mills to offset the difference between the income of the village and the planned expenses of the budget. The 8 mills is to be figured on the state equalized value rather than the actual amount on the Lowell assessment rolls, as in

Flood?

The Grand River will crest at 16 feet by Sunday noon, according to a bulletin received Wednesday morning from the U. S. Weather Bureau. Businesses along the Main street of Lowell bordering on Flat River, have been notified of the danger of flood, inasmuch as the flood level is 15 feet. The Cities Service plant, southeast of Lowell has also been warned. The only residential areas to be affected will probably be the southeastern section, near the Lowell Lumber Company.

The high in March, on the 9th was 15.11; on April 6th the river reached 10.87 and Wednesday morning's reading was already at 13.66.

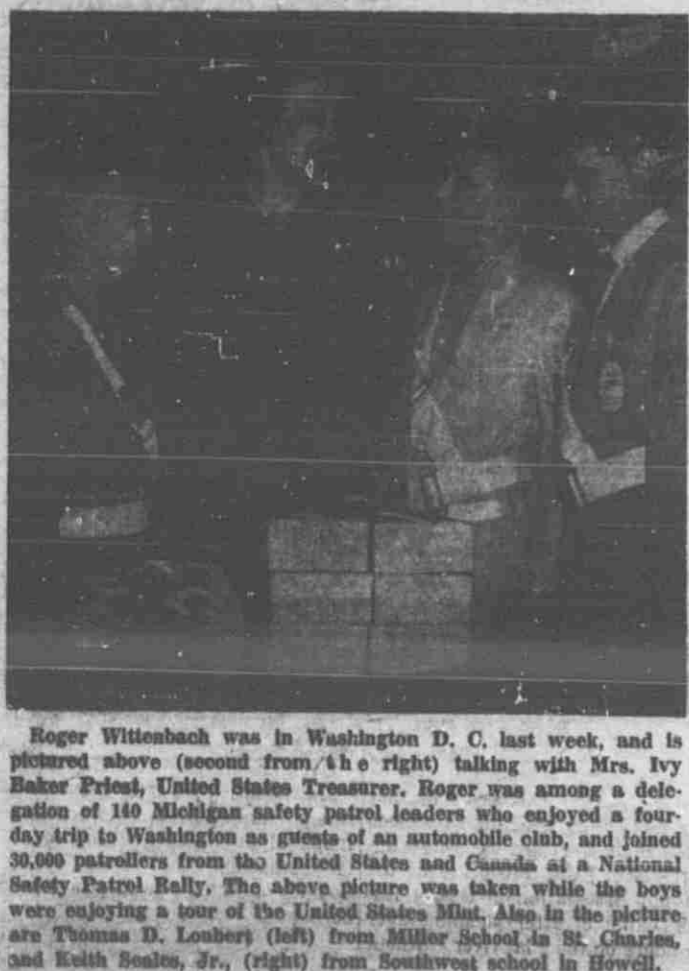
We know her many friends here will be happy to hear of her accomplishment.

Funeral services for Fred J. Ford, who passed away Tuesday at the Lowell Rest Home, will be held at the Roth Chapel Friday afternoon at 2 o'clock. Rev. J. Marion DeVinney officiating. Interment in Allon cemetery.

Mr. Ford, who was 90 years of age, was a member of one of the pioneer families of the Grattan and Lowell township area. He is survived by a son, Roye V., two grandchildren and 2 great grandchildren.

Second Place in G. V. Track Teams Wins

Lowell nabbed a second place standing in the Grand Valley conference track meet held Tuesday night at the Godfrey-Lee field.

East clinched the Valley crown with 11 points, but Lowell follows with 9.

Lowell's medley relay team of Carigan, Henderson, Whitaker and L. Fasse broke their school's record dropping it from 2:40.1 to 2:37.7. The old record was set in 1948 by H. Johnson, G. Newell, D. Nellis and R. Wetland.

Lowell met Lee High in the conference, and swept all events but one, the 880 yard relay. The outstanding Freshman relay team of C. Ryder, D. Harris, G. Watrous and T. Kutchev established a Grand Valley record for the 880 Frosh relay with a time of 1:42.9.

Nine School Districts Vote Wednesday on School Consolidation

Wednesday culminates over two years of work by a citizens group to consolidate nine school districts in the Ada-Cascade-Eastmont area for the building of one large high school.

Voting today is being held at the Ada, Cascade, Martin and Orchard View schools, and to decide whether or not the residents desire such a step.

The nine school districts comprise a total valuation of \$10 million which is the minimum valuation required by the State Department of Public Instruction, before a consolidated high school may be constructed.

Public opinion seems to favor the merger of the high school, and the elementary classes will still be held in the individual neighboring communities, near the homes of the students.

William Morrison Dies Friday Morning
Funeral services were held Monday afternoon at the Roth Chapel for William Morrison, 64, who passed away sometime Friday morning, May 4, at his home near the Rutherford Canning factory.

He was found Monday by Dick Rutherford and another employee of the Rutherford company, for which the deceased worked.

Mr. Morrison had also been employed by the village of Lowell, and by the Superior Furniture Company. He had lived in Lowell about 35 years. He leaves no close relatives.

Driver-Training Course Will Be Offered During Summer Months

Because of the new law enacted by the Michigan legislature, providing that all boys and girls under 18 years of age must successfully complete a driver and traffic training course before they may secure a Michigan driver's license, the Lowell public schools will be offering their driver-training during the coming summer-vacation period, according to a bulletin which has been sent to all parents of High school students by Superintendent W. W. Gumsier.

This law will become effective as of February 1, 1957, and inasmuch as the school cannot guarantee they will be able to accommodate all students desiring this training during the school year, it is their wish that as many students as possible take advantage of this summer course.

The course includes 30 hours in class and 8 hours in the training car, of which 6 hours must be spent behind the wheel.

Carroll Burch and Jack Howe are the teachers to contact if you wish to take advantage of this service, and are between the ages of 16 and 17, inclusive, and have no driver's license. Children of 14 and 15 may take the course, but until they are 16 years of age will have to be issued a temporary driver's permit or restricted license, which means they may drive only with parents who have licenses.

Mr. Gumsier also stated they will offer the course a limited number of adults (18 years or older) at the regular charge of \$25.00. If interested, contact Mr. Howe or Mr. Burch.

Church to Hold Homecoming Friday



Lowell Congregationalists will hold a homecoming this Friday, May 11, to celebrate the 100th anniversary of the founding of the local church. Organized in 1856, the group originally started in Lowell as a Congregational Missionary Society in 1851. The building pictured, located at the corner of Hudson and Spring streets, was completed in 1861, and the parish house added in 1921.

Ticket Fifteen Speeders in April

Justice of the Peace Howard J. Rittenger reported a busy month in April, with a total of \$740.30 in fines and costs collected in the 49 cases heard.

Fifteen of the offenses were speeding, due to the increased efforts this past month to crack down on speeding in the village.

A breakdown of the violations includes 4 State Highway Department violations, 18 township, 21 village and 6 warrants handled.

The term "village violation" means the breaking of a village ordinance; "township violation" is used to denote offenses of the township, county and state level.

Village matters netted \$399.60 of the above-mentioned total, while township cases brought in the balance of \$340.70.

Besides the speeding violations, other violations consisted of: 4 overloaded violations; 5 no-operator license; 3 no muffler and defective brakes; 3 reckless driving; no chauffer license; 3 failed to yield right of way; improper overtaking and passing; 2 unnecessary use of horn; 2 disobeyed stop sign; 2 turn in no-U-turn zone; obstructing traffic; backing to interfere, and accident.

The six warrants were one for simple larceny, 2 for having beer in car, a threat with revolver, reckless driving and jail sentence, operating motor vehicle in reckless manner and leaving scene of accident. The latter violation surrendered his driver's permit and was put on probation.

William Barton Dies At Moosehaven
William J. Barton, a former Lowell resident, and a life member of the Lowell Moose Lodge 809, passed away in Orange Park, Fla., Monday May 7.

Mr. Barton had been a resident of Moosehaven, a home sponsored by the Legion of the Moose for their aged brothers and wives, since 1931.

He had been very active in the community life there. His illness had been brief.

Only local relative of Mr. Barton is a nephew, Maynard Barton, of M91, south of Lowell.

Funeral services were held Wednesday, with burial at Moosehaven.

History of Church
When the above building was dedicated it was free of debt. The land was donated by Dr. Arber Richard, a local physician; Rev. S. Hemenway the first pastor of the Lowell Church, and Rev. D. L. Eaton was the minister at the time of the building's actual dedication.

Thirteen years after the building of the church many necessary and extensive repairs were needed, and the society found itself in dire need. At this time Rev. D. L. Eaton returned to Lowell, and served the church three years without pay, keeping the church together, and allowing the society to finance the needed repairs to the building.

Thirty-one ministers have served the Lowell Congregational Church, and a local merchant, R. D. Stocking, was its organist for fifty-four years, from 1880 until his death in 1934.

See Actual Films of Tornado Register 100 Volunteers at Mass Meeting to Organize Civil Defense

Two hundred citizens of Lowell and surrounding communities attended the Mass Civil Defense meeting called by Village President Peter Speerstrat Tuesday evening, at the city hall. They heard an address by Captain Clarence Randall of the Kent County Sheriff's Department, who is "Mr. Civil Defense" himself, according to Lowell Police Chief Frank Stephens who introduced the speaker.

Area Catholics Join Development Fund Drive

Members of Catholic parishes in the Lowell area will participate in the 1956 Diocesan Development Fund Campaign starting next Sunday.

The campaign was inaugurated last year by Bishop Allen J. Babcock to obtain revenues to finance the education of young men to the priesthood, the Catholic Charities program and missionary activities in the Diocese.

In a printed report distributed in parishes last Sunday information was disclosed that \$387,000 was expended last year by the Fund. Largest amount spent was \$20,365.00 for athletic activities building at St. Joseph's Seminary in Grand Rapids.

Register 100 Workers
Registration cards were presented to everyone entering the meeting, and of the 200 present 100 turned in cards showing at least 2 types of civil defense work which they would like to volunteer to do.

The card contained 15 divisions: Police protection, G. O. C., Communications, Staff and Organization, Street Clearance, Decontamination Squad, Fire Fighting, Rescue Squad, Housing, Home Nursing, Nurses Aid, First Aid, Mass Feedings, Office Work and Record and other work.

In regard to the "decontamination squad", Lowell may well be one of the first civil defense units in Kent County to have such a group. Lowell Laboratories, under the direction of Frank Battistella, offered the use of a decontamination machine to the Lowell unit, and Mr. Battistella has agreed to train and organize a squad to do this work.

Fourteen station wagons have been listed, as available for ambulance work in disaster, and an ambulance squad is being formed, headed by Jerry Roth, Don Beachum and Ed Kiel.

Three separate file systems will be set up of the civil defense system, each one to be kept in a different place, to avoid losing all records in the event of a disaster. For the present, however, Frank Stephens stated the meeting place in the event of trouble will be the City Hall. Until a county-wide warning system can be worked out and made uniform, Lowell's signal of impending danger will be the ringing of church bells, sounding of the fire siren, and factory whistles.

In a brief message about G. O. C. Lieutenant Thorne made a very pertinent remark: "It's better to have Civil Defense without disaster than a disaster without Civil Defense."

Miss Hallie DeVoe, 86 Buried Here Wednesday
Miss Hallie DeVoe passed away at the Lowell Rest Home, Monday morning, May 7, at the age of 86. Rev. D. E. Wetzl officiated Wednesday afternoon at the funeral service, held at the Roth Chapel; interment was in Oakwood cemetery.

Miss DeVoe was the daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Henry Jackson of Ionia. She was later adopted by Mrs. Hattie DeVoe of Lowell. She made her home here with Mrs. Phil Hartley for the past nine years, but after Mrs. Hartley's death last fall became a resident at the Lowell Rest Home.

During an earlier residence here she was an active member of the Lowell Methodist Church.

Only cousins and nieces and nephews survive; among them are Mrs. Gladys Hartley, Melbourne Hartley, Mrs. Carl Havens and Mrs. Jack Bannan, all of Lowell, and John Havens of Detroit. Her other relatives live in Belding, Delton, Grand Rapids and Mr. Fleasant.

This year's third-annual Grand Valley Council race was the closest one, with the Delton canoe, Troop No. 50, finishing only scant minute behind the Lowell lads. Third place was taken by Troop 2276 of Standale with a time of 6:24. The Delton troop won the race on the Thornapple last year, and Lowell came in third. The local boys were first in the race on Grand River two years ago.

One outstanding factor in the 40 mile race last Saturday was that only five of the starting 25 canoes failed to finish the race. One stalwart crew, from Troop 228 of the Latvian Association in Grand Rapids, came in after paddling over ten hours on the Flat River, without giving up even though they knew the race, for them, was lost.

Over 100 explorer scouts from Ionia, Kent, Mecosta, Montcalm, Allegan and Ottawa Counties participated in the race—these counties composing the Grand Valley Council of which Lowell is a member.

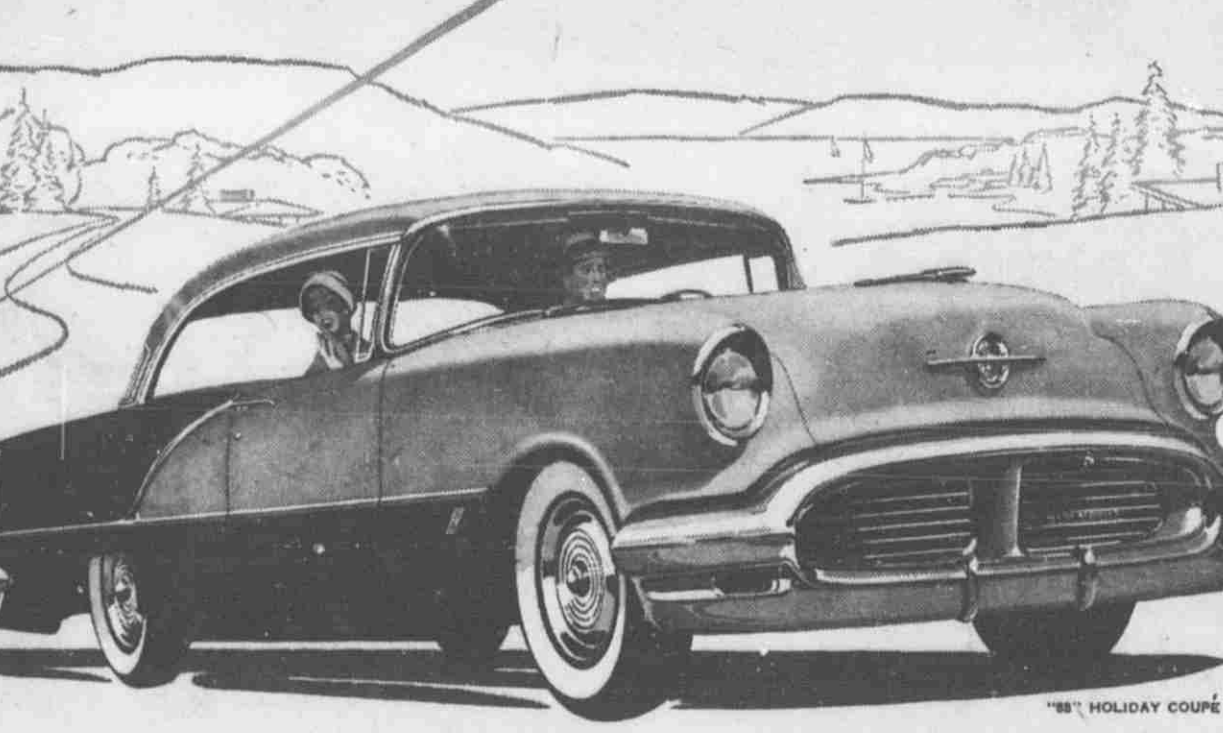

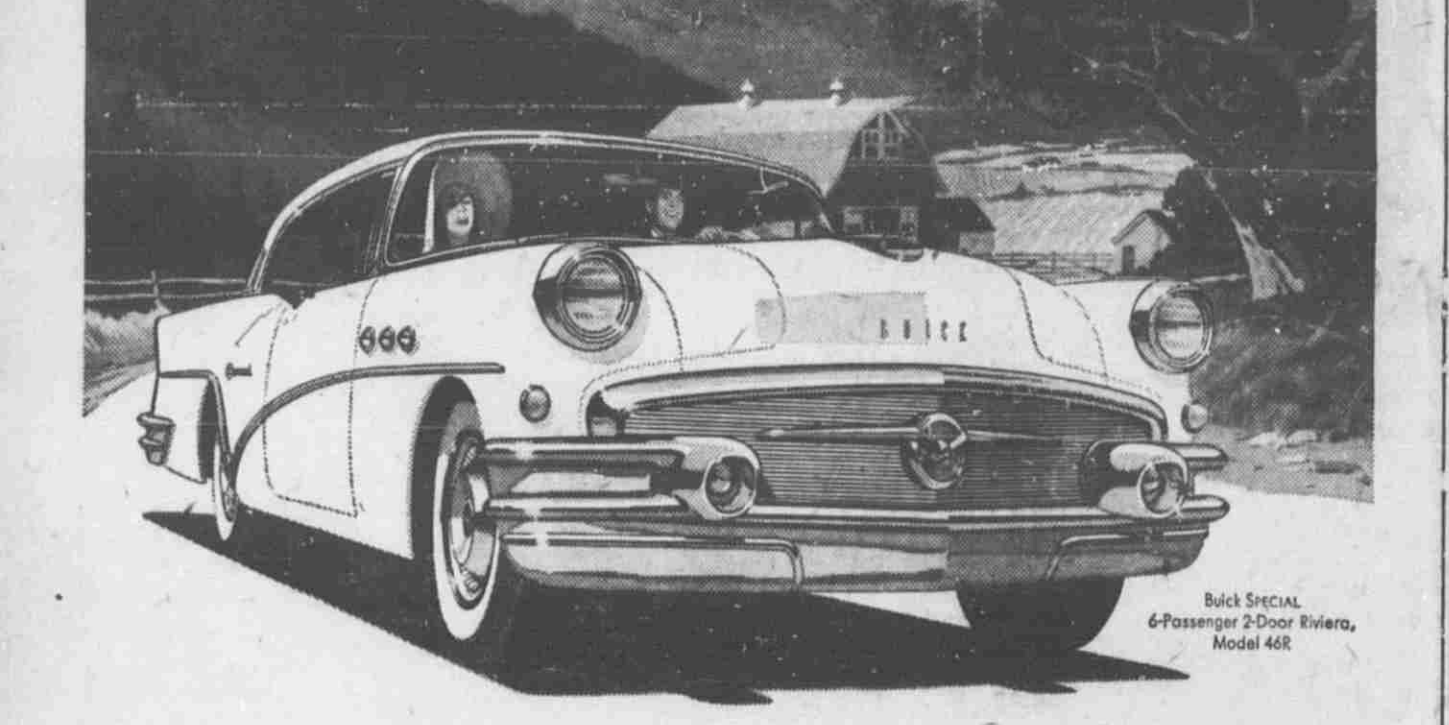
