Happenings In Lowell's Past...

The first steamboat, the Paragon, was launched in the Grand river in 1838, and ran through Lowell, between Grand Rapids and Lyons.

One of the best ice skating rinks in Michigan was located here in Lowell in 1884, when skating was "the rage".

The gristmill on the East bank of Flat river, South of Main Street at the end of the bridge, is Lowell's oldest landmark, built in 1847.

Lowell was founded in the Spring of 1831, by Daniel Marsac, a "Free Trader" of French lineage.

People We Are Proud Of

MR. RALPH SHOEMAKER is the State Traffic Safety Engineer in charge of eleven counties. He distributes safety signs and signals over 1,700 traffic miles. Mr. Shoemaker started at the bottom, working his way up, and attained his present position after taking a civil service examination.

MR. E. C. FOREMAN is a former professor of poultry at Michigan State University. The records in egg production made by his hens put him near the top in the United States. Mr. Foreman is in demand as a judge and authority on poultry.

MR. RUDI MITTAG was on the German ship Admiral Graf Spee when it sunk off the coast of Argentina. The German crew sunk the ship themselves rather than be captured by the British and then took refuge in Argentina. He is diesel plant foreman at the Municipal Utility Plant.
